### Emergency grant

The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services awarded the Rio Grande Council of Government a \$46,408 federal grant on Sept. 8, according to Congressman Silvestre Reyes. The culminating activity was a 45-minute school assembly, which began with an a cappella

duet performed by TIS nurse Miranda Peck and 5th grade student Celeste Hernandez. Ms. Cantu then showed a 6-minute video of the 9/11 attacks on the World Trade Center buildings. Then, firefighter Raul Gonzalez spoke about the rescue efforts of the New York City firefighters. The event was capped with the announcement and recognition of the best-judged artwork and decorated doors.

Despite the serious tone and somber mood felt by all, especially during the video presentation, TIS Principal Rudy Barreda said he was glad Rosales and Cantu created an event to teach students about 9/11.

"Our students were only five or six years old in September of 2001, so most have little or no actual recollection of the event.

The fifth anniversary of the attacks was the perfect time to teach the students about 9/11 and its significance in American history," Barreda.

## City appoints Canutillo ISD executive director to Ethics Review Commission

CANUTILLO — Yusuf Farran, P.E., R.S., executive director of Facilities and Transportation for Canutillo Independent School District, was appointed

by El Paso Mayor John Cook to be a member of the City Ethics Review Commission.

Farran will join the nine-member review board that serves as an advisory body to the mayor and city council on matters concerning ethics in city government.

Farran is a current member of the El Paso City/County Board of Health, the Texas Society of Professional Engineers, and the El Paso Community College Foundation. He has also served on the El Paso City Water Conservation Advisory Board and the El Paso City Plumbing and HVAC Board of Appeals.

Farran has over 20 years of civil, environmental, and sanitary engineering experience. He earned a bachelor of science in mechanical engineering and a master of science in civil/environmental engineering degrees from the University of Texas at El Paso.

In March of 2004, Farran was hired by CISD to be the district's first construction administrator. In March 2006, he was named executive director of Facilities and Transportation when CISD created that new position.

Before joining CISD, Farran was the construction project manager for Ysleta ISD. He has also worked for the U.S. Section, International Boundary and Water Commission (IBWC), where he was the division engineer for the Environmental Management Division.

While working for the IBWC, Farran helped develop the first inter-agency agreements between the United States Environmental Protection Agency and the United States Section of the IBWC, which facilitated the transfer of \$46 million from the U.S. President's Border Budget for U.S./Mexico Border wastewater infrastructure projects.

In his current position, Farran oversees CISD's construction projects, facilities and transportation operations. The District is currently in the process of constructing two new elementary schools and completing various renovation projects at the seven existing campuses.

"My goal for the District's facilities and transportation division are twofold: For the facilities department, I want to consistently increase the operation and maintenance programs' efficiency. For the transportation department my goals are to establish an effective, safe route system and an efficient equipment and vehicle replacement schedule," said Farran.

# Thin air

Now affection has shifted dramatically. With the advent of the computer age it seems that power, wealth and prestige can be derived from nothing more than a flickering passage of an electronic blip on a power line or a microwave bounced off the landscape — untouchable, invisible, but ever so powerful.

Information, be it good, bad or indifferent, is the product America trades in these days, with the massive interconnected network of about a bazillion computers and databases pumping it out faster than it can be sucked up by thirsty-fingered computer handlers.

It's only natural that lawyers should log on. A major money source derived from the internet is advertising, which has, admittedly, always been a little ethereal in nature but it has become even more so having been linked with the internet.

The way it works these days is that big companies like Yahoo and Google provide what is called a "search engine" to help you access the internet. All you have to do is type a few words on your computer screen and these big engines call up a seemingly endless array of sources providing information about your desired subject — mostly provided at no cost.

But this ready access to the human mind was inevitably too good to be ignored, so the first thing you know web companies started selling advertising to other companies to be displayed alongside the information requested by a customer.

Now, everybody knows that advertising is only as good as the number of potential customers who are actually exposed to it. A billboard on the side of the road is only as good as the number of passing

motorists who are going see it. Businesses tend to buy ads in magazines or sections of the newspaper that cater to interests similar to their products.

You know, a kind of economic profiling.

So internet companies started putting ads on their websites at a minimal price — sometimes even free — but then charged these advertisers based on the number of times web surfers "click" their mouses on the ad looking for more information. These charges are made even if no sale results from the ad being viewed.

Thus was created fertile ground for a whole new genre of misconduct.

They call it, naturally enough, click fraud.

So some lawyers gathered up a wad of mostly small advertisers and filed a class-action lawsuit this summer against the Google search engine on the grounds that it isn't doing enough to protect them from being charged for illegitimate clicks.

I haven't exactly ascertained how you determine whether a click is an illegitimate or legitimate click — maybe they have a computer DNA testing or something — but these little guys, via their lawyers, cried foul.

So Google made a proposal that is as ironic as the lawsuit itself. In return for the loss of thin air, Google proposed to pay them back — with thin air. About \$60 million worth. And you guessed it. The only ones actually getting paid cash are the lawyers — they get \$30 million.

Now, I don't know about you, but I find it a little unnerving that a transaction of this magnitude was generated from, basically, nothing.

As this nation's manufacturing plants close down, our agriculture industry wanes and food-producing ground is sacrificed to profits offered by urban sprawl we are becoming the world's biggest consumer instead of the world's biggest producer.

It's scary to realize that the matrix of the fastest growing industry in this country is nothing more than thin air.

### A four-day tour of the Middle East

Earlier this month, with unrest and violence still plaguing the region, I traveled to war-ravaged Lebanon and Israel to meet with officials on both sides of the conflict to promote a peaceful solution. This House Intelligence Committee delegation also included Reps. Ray LaHood of Illinois and Charles Boustany Jr., of Louisiana

**Day 1 - Fri., Sept. 1, 2006 - Cyprus**  
We visited with the crew of the USS Mount Whitney, which is currently moored in Cyprus. They spearheaded and coordinated the evacuation of U.S. citizens from Lebanon, and are now awaiting additional orders. While on board, I met with about 20 Texans, including El Pasoans, and told them how proud we are of their service to our country.

**Day 2 - Sat., Sept. 2, 2006 - Lebanon**  
We helicoptered into Beirut, Lebanon to meet with Prime Minister Siniora, who provided us with the Lebanese perspective of the conflict

and asked support for Lebanon's Seven-Point Plan to resolve the crisis. We then met with Saad Hariri, the son of assassinated Prime Minister Rafik Hariri, a member of the Lebanese Parliament who has a controlling coalition. We laid a wreath at the Hariri Memorial.

After a tour of damaged areas and the Children's Cancer Center of Lebanon, we had lunch with members of Parliament, business leaders and U.S. Ambassador Feltman. We discussed the Israeli blockade, Lebanon's Seven-Point Plan, the Shebaa Farms area, and continued support to ensure a strong Lebanese government to counter Hezbollah influence.

**Day 3 - Sun., Sept. 3, 2006 - Israel**  
In Ramallah, we met with Palestinian Economic Minister Salam Fayad, who briefed us on a very aggressive and visionary plan that he hoped would retake political control from Hamas.

We then went to Jerusalem for briefings with our embassy intelligence staff, the head of Israeli

Mossad and the head of Domestic Intelligence Shin Bet.

**Day 4 - Mon., Sept. 4, 2006 - Israel**  
We met with Foreign Minister Tzipi Livni from the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs, who discussed the economic impact of the recent military operations on Israel and their projected recovery plans. She also discussed Israel's perspective on the fragile cease-fire with Lebanon. She was impressive and very well-versed on all aspects of the issues.

Too many lives have been lost in the Middle East, and the war-torn regions have a long road to recovery. As members of Congress from different areas, we provided different perspectives and offered different suggestions, and we also learned quite a bit from our Middle Eastern counterparts.

Not long after our visit, Israel lifted its nearly two-month-long air blockade of Lebanon, which will help bring a measure of stability to Lebanon. This is an important step forward for the region, and I hope the start of many more to come.

# Two pedestrians killed in Sept. 10 accident

**EAST EL PASO COUNTY —** An evening accident on Sunday, Sept. 10 near Clint has left two people dead in a vehicle-pedestrian collision.

El Paso County Sheriff's Deputies were dispatched to a report of a motor vehicle accident involving two pedestrians at about 9:15 p.m.

A 63-year-old woman in a 2006 Ford Fusion reportedly was traveling east in the 14600 block of Texas Highway 20 when she felt "a hard impact to the right front" of her vehicle, officers said.

The force of the impact disabled the vehicle. The driver managed to move to the nearly inoperable vehicle to the side of the road and she searched the area without being able to find what she had hit. Officers said the area is very dark and visibility is limited to the headlights of a vehicle.

The driver flagged down a passing motorist for help and immediately called the Sheriff's Office. Deputies arrived on scene and discovered the bodies about 100 feet away from the point of impact. Spe-

cial Traffic Investigators were summoned to the scene and continue to investigate the fatality.

The deceased have been identified as Jose A. Quintana, 43, of San Elizario and Sonia Garcia, 29, also of San Elizario. Officers said they were pronounced dead at the scene by the Medical Examiner. The relationship between the two is still un-

der investigation, and it is unknown why they were on the roadway, officers said.

The driver of the car was identified as Alicia Madrid of Fabens, and no charges have been filed against her.

This is the 18th and 19th fatality of the year recorded by the El Paso County Sheriff's Office compared to 13 at this time last year.

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# SISD board approves budget, tax rate, bond sales

**EAST EL PASO COUNTY —** The Socorro Independent School District Board of Trustees unanimously approved a budget and tax rate for the 2006-2007 school year at a special board meeting on Aug. 29, 2006. The budget was set at \$395,340,874. The tax rate for the year was set at \$1.49 per \$100 valuation, down from \$1.63 per \$100 valuation last year.

"It's unfortunate, but our growth is never ending in SISD," said Board President Craig Patton. "Because of the tremendous growth each year, it requires us to build more new schools and hire more teachers to keep up with the large influx of new students. We don't want to do it. We don't like

to do it. But we have no choice. If we are to do our duty to provide classrooms and teachers to educate our children, we have to raise taxes to support this."

SISD's student population has nearly doubled in the last ten years. Each year, the District has seen its enrollment increase by approximately 2,000 students.

Socorro ISD has the lowest maintenance and operations tax rate among school districts in El Paso County. Only 18 percent of the District's budget is funded by local taxes, 73 percent by state funds, and 9 percent by federal funds. "We are working very hard to use our taxpayers' money wisely," said Mary Benham, Assistant Superintendent for Business Services. "We have been fortunate that our tax base has grown and we have been able

to save money by being awarded Instructional Facilities Allotment funding for our bonds."

At the same meeting, Board Trustees approved sales of the final bonds from SISD's 2004 Bond Issue. The bonds, which the District expected to sell over a five-year period, are being completed in three years. This comes as a result of the District's efforts to secure matching funds from the state which will cover 70 percent of the \$188.6 million bond passed by the Socorro ISD community in 2004. Interim Superintendent Charles Hart, Jr. gives credit to SISD's Board of Trustees for being supportive of these measures.

"The fact that the state is matching our bond funds means we are saving our community millions of dollars," he said.

### Foreign drugs: What you should know

In January of 2001, I was appointed chairman of the Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture, Rural Development, Food and Drug Administration, and Related Agencies. As Chairman, I am responsible for oversight of funding for the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), all of our nation's agriculture programs and the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In this role, I have discovered many troubling facts about imported drugs. We all want to save money and the price of prescription drugs can be high, but you need to ask yourself, is it worth your life?

Due to the rigorous controls mandated by the FDA, the overall quality of drug products that consumers purchase from accredited pharmacies in the United States is remarkably high. Due to these high standards, American consumers are confident in the safety and effectiveness of FDA approved medicines. However, medicines sold by foreign sources cannot be regulated and therefore, are not subjected to the same approval pro-

cess. Trusting medicines from foreign sources exposes consumers to countless unknown risks.

Recently, the FDA has identified numerous websites offering to sell prescription drugs directly to U.S. consumers from, what they claim to be, legal Canadian sources. These websites are fraudulent plain and simple. These websites claim it is legal for Canadian pharmacies to sell medication to American consumers. False. Often these websites claim the prescriptions are rewritten by a Canadian doctor and filled by a certified Canadian pharmacist. These claims are bogus as well. Writing prescriptions and then dispensing medication when the physician has not examined the patient is not only in direct violation of medical ethics and standards, it is dangerous. Consumers are at risk of suffering life threatening side effects, having severe allergic reactions, suffering from harmful drug interactions or taking inappropriately prescribed medications. Reactions to these medications can even be fatal.

We warn our children not to take candy from a stranger, but then trust a website with our own health? The truth is you have no idea what you will receive when you purchase medications from foreign sources. The drugs may be past their expiration date, counterfeit or even improperly manufactured products that are either too-potent or watered down. Consumers who have adverse reactions to foreign medications have little or no recourse. They may even sign product liability releases in order to purchase these dangerous drugs.

As a rule of thumb, the FDA advises American consumers to avoid buying any medical products online, no matter how reputable the website may appear. You simply do not know where these medications are coming from. In 2005, the FDA conducted an operation at New York, Miami,

we are opening up County government and making it more transparent," County Judge Dolores Briones said. "Time Warner will still broadcast our regular meetings on Wednesday, but now our own Information Technology Department (ITD) will video-record them."

Ray Sanchez, El Paso County's web master, described the new system to access County meetings through the Internet as "easy." Viewers may access the County's web page at [www.epcounty.com](http://www.epcounty.com),



linking to County meetings and from there to live meetings or archives. He recommends accessing the video through DSL or cable Internet connections, rather than dial-up service.

"The big advantage now is that El Pasoans can view live meetings, whether regular or special, as they are taking place from home, office or school," Sanchez said. "Plus, they can watch them through the archive system for 90 day, just by clicking on the date they need."

The County has been doing its own in-house production of live video recording, said Peter Cooper, ITD director. He added that his department recently began recording the County's meetings, including the special sessions and budget work sessions. These are now archived, and made available within the week to the public through the County Clerk's Office.

"We're also producing some promotional videos of county programs, which are coming out well," he said. "But we will be expanding in the future and getting higher quality videos with the new equipment that is coming in."

## Clint ISD students' scores improve the district's rating by state standards

EAST EL PASO COUNTY — The students of the Clint Independent School district have risen to the challenge of both the state (TAKS) standards and the federal (AYP) standards for academic performance by showing marked improvement across the board.

The District was given an "Academically Acceptable" rating by the Texas Education Agency (TEA) showing improvement in student performance on the Reading, Social Studies, Mathematics, and Science Texas Assessment of Knowledge and Skills (TAKS) tests. The rating is based on TAKS performance, state developed alternative test performance, completion rate for the class of 2005, the dropout rate for 7th and 8th grade students in 2004-2005, and required improvement. Frank Macias Elementary is one of just a few campuses in the El Paso area who received an "Exemplary Rating" with 90 percent of the students meeting the standard on all subjects tested. Desert Hills Elementary received a "Recognized" rating. The district's ten other campuses were all rated "Academically Acceptable".

The district has also met the challenge of the Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) standards of the federal government which evaluates the district and schools based on student performance in reading and mathematics on the TAKS test or other alternative test, number of students who participate on the test, how student groups perform, and the graduation rate for the class of 2005. Eleven of twelve campuses in Clint ISD "Meet AYP" standards.

## Clint ISD adopts budget, tax rate

EAST EL PASO COUNTY — At a special meeting on Aug. 29 the Clint Independent School District Board of Trustees adopted a \$69,917,853 budget for the 2006-2007 school year.

This budget makes allowance for the fast growth of the district. Clint ISD is expecting to hit 10,000 students this fall which is about 750 students more than last school year.

The budget also allows for a four percent salary increase plus step for all employees. The district now has the highest paying schedule for all teachers in the region.

The 2006 tax rate and rollback rate of \$1.68510 was adopted by the board as well. This rate includes a Maintenance and Operations rate of \$1.37010. The M&O rate includes the state required rollback and the four cent increase allowed without voter approval. By maximizing the funding available, the four cent increase will generate approximately \$250,000 locally and \$2.3 million from the state for the district.

The Interest and Sinking rate is \$0.3150 and includes a \$0.10500 increase which was approved by the voters in a Bond Election on May 13, 2006. Overall, the 2006-2007 tax rate is a decrease from the previous year of \$1.71.

also received the Governor's Education Excellence Award which is an incentive pay plan through a grant program ordered by Governor Rick Perry. The Texas Education Agency designed the plan recommending salary bonuses starting at \$3000. For the award, TEA

identified schools that have a high percentage of economically disadvantaged students and have demonstrated high levels of student achievement or marked student improvement. The Clint ISD schools selected have shown strong performance gains in the areas of math and reading. East Montana Middle School, Clint Junior High School, Frank Macias Elementary, Red Sands Elementary, and W.D. Surratt Elementary will together be awarded a total of \$650,000.

During a visit to Clint ISD, Dr. Shirley Neeley, Texas Commissioner of Education, praised the district for its stellar academic performance this

past school year attributing the success to the district's implementation of a benchmarking program. In addition to the benchmarking program, the district provided intensive teacher training, provided math, reading and literacy resources and support for all

curricular projects. "High expectations for everybody — teachers and students — and a clear focus on what Clint ISD wants to accomplish is the reason for our success," says Olivia Campos, Assistant Superintendent for Instructional Services. According to Campos the district has identified areas of need and will target the Limited English Proficient population, literacy development for all students, and math and science curriculum delivery. "We will take on a 'no excuses' attitude, work hard, and support our teachers who are the key component in the success of our students," says Campos.

It was beautiful — orange as far as the eye could see. Fans were cheering, fans were booing, bands were playing, pretty girls were dancing and mascots were — well — doing whatever mascots do.

If anyone had any doubts whether big-time college football had finally found its way to El Paso, all they had to do was be a part of the craziness at the Sun Bowl last Saturday.

The Sun Bowl was bulging at the sides as 51,827 rabid fans packed the old stadium to capacity, and then some.

It was the biggest opening day crowd in UTEP's history.

The fans of El Paso have sat through four decades of the worst kind of play the great game of football has to offer, and they are finally being rewarded for their insane patience.

The sight of college football being played the way it's supposed to be had to put a smile on every face at the game. Miner fans walked around the Sun Bowl aisles with their chests pumped out quite a bit more than normal as they showed the Tech fans that they knew how to put on a big-time college football event, too.

As for the game, it was apparent right from the start that the Miners were in for a tussle.

It was easy to see that Texas Tech was a definite step up in competition for the Miners. The Raiders were visibly bigger and faster, giving UTEP a peek of what life is like in the tough Big-12 conference.

But as they say, you can't consider yourself as one of the best unless you beat one of the best.

And the Miners accomplished everything they wanted except beating one of the best. UTEP's heartbreaking 38-35 overtime loss may be difficult to swallow now, but it proves that the program can compete with the upper echelon of college football.

And it was just three seasons ago that the Miners had lost 30 of 36 games.

I don't think anyone in the city ever thought the Miners would find themselves consistently flirting with the top-25 ranking. Most people were just grateful they were able to attend a game to watch the Miners play one of the better teams and not get blown out by halftime.

But one thing has to be said: What Mike Price has done for this program and this city cannot be underrated. He came to El Paso promising to put UTEP football on the national map and Mike Price has proved to be a man of his word.

He has the Miners ready to take on all comers. The rest of the season should be as exciting as any other in UTEP history.

After his dismal four-interception showing against San Diego State in the season opener, Jordan Palmer played about as well as he ever has, picking the Raiders' secondary apart.

Palmer looked like a different man, throwing the ball away when his receivers were covered and hitting them in stride when they were open. Palmer completed 34 passes for 334 yards and three touchdowns.

And Johnnie Lee Higgins Jr. had the game of his career with 13 catches for 162 yards and a couple of touchdowns.

After the Miners road victory over San Diego State, and their tough loss to Texas Tech, it isn't farfetched to think that UTEP could run the table the rest of the season.

One thing's for sure, the Miners will not face a tougher opponent than Texas Tech the rest of the season. That is, until they play in their bowl game.

Mike Price looks very comfortable here in El Paso and his family looks comfortable here. You've got to think that he won't be going anywhere for a while and that means the Miners will only continue to improve.

Remember, Price is just starting to insert some of his own recruits into the system. So far, he's been winning with the players he inherited from the Gary Nord regime. Imagine what things will be like around here when Price has his own team of recruits.

Get used to it, El Paso. Just like Don Haskins did before him, Mike Price is going to bring a lot of notoriety to this West Texas town.





"Sorry, but we're a planet now, and if you plan to come here you'll have to apply for a landing permit, hazardous waste permits, parking privileges" and on and on.


Let's admit the obvious: the Earth-moon relationship is headed for a breakup. We should dump the moon now and see if Pluto would like to become our new satellite.

# Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

**Q:** I have just taken over the financial responsibilities for my disabled father, who is in the early stages of Alzheimer's disease. I have never had to deal with government benefit programs before, and one of the questions I have not been able to answer is whether Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefit payments are taxable?

**A:** No, SSI benefit payments are not taxable. You can learn more about the SSI program and an individual's rights and responsibilities under the

program by visiting Social Security's website at [www.socialsecurity.gov](http://www.socialsecurity.gov).

**Q:** I recently moved in with my sister and she said I should tell Social Security about it because it may affect my Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefit payments. Is that true?

**A:** Yes, you should let Social Security know any time there is a change in your living arrangement. Where you live, who else is in the household and how you share household

expenses can all affect the amount of the monthly SSI benefit payment that you receive.

**Q:** I received Social Security disability benefits for several years, until my condition improved enough to let me try to go back to work last summer. Unfortunately, I have had a relapse and, once again, I'm unable to work. After I was initially approved for Social Security disability benefits, there was a waiting period before benefit payments began. Will I have to wait again?

**A:** No. Once you are determined to be eligible for benefits, there is no waiting period for benefits to resume

if your previous disability benefit payments stopped fewer than five years ago.

**Q:** I get Social Security retirement benefits and I need to show my new landlord proof of my income. Social Security accounts for most of my monthly income. Can you tell me how to get some proof of my income from Social Security?

**A:** The easiest way to get a proof-of-income letter is by visiting the Social Security website at [www.socialsecurity.gov](http://www.socialsecurity.gov) and selecting "What You Can Do Online" in the upper, left-hand column. Then click on

"Request a Proof of Income Letter." After you answer a few questions there, Social Security will mail a proof-of-income letter to your address. You should get it within 10 days. If you do not have access to the Internet, you can call Social Security's toll-free number at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) and ask a Social Security representative for help in getting a proof-of-income letter.


