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## DSHS launches website for organ donor registration

The Texas Department of State Health Services (DSHS) has launched a revised online organ donor registry to make it easier for Texans to register as organ, tissue and eye donors.

The Glenda Dawson Donate Life — Texas Registry, at [www.DonateLifeTexas.org](http://www.DonateLifeTexas.org), has information about organ donation and instructions for registering online.

Before the registry, there was no official state list in Texas of people who wanted to consent to being donors. For those who register, the list can help ensure their wishes are carried out after they die.

One donor can save or enhance the lives of more than 50 people with gifts of organs, tissues and eyes according to Evelyn Delgado, DSHS assistant commissioner for Family and Community Health Services.

The website should make it easier for people to get the facts about organ donation and decide if registering as a donor is right for them.

The web-based registry will help streamline

the donation process at a time when medical decisions and procedures must happen quickly. The registry helps make it faster to find out if a person who dies had wanted to donate organs, tissues and eyes.

Registration online takes less than five minutes. The donor information is protected. Only authorized organ procurement organizations and tissue and eye banks can access registrant information.

There is a critical shortage of organs available for transplants, with more than 7,000 people waiting for life-saving organs in Texas. More than 400 people in Texas died last year waiting for organ transplants.

The registry is named in memory of State Rep. Dawson, a kidney transplant recipient, who championed the cause of organ donation. The Texas Legislature mandated the creation of the statewide registry, which began Sept. 1, 2006, and stipulated in May that it be renamed in Dawson's memory.

## Tax Amnesty ends August 15

AUSTIN — Comptroller Susan Combs wants to remind taxpayers that the tax amnesty program, Project Fresh Start, ends Aug. 15.

"Time is running out for taxpayers to clear up unpaid, underreported or overdue taxes without fear of penalty or interest," Combs said. "Project Fresh Start is also a great opportunity for businesses operating without tax permits to begin meeting their tax responsibilities."

The 60-day tax amnesty began June 15. It applies to taxes and tax reports originally due before April 1, 2007.

The Project Fresh Start amnesty period applies to sales tax, franchise tax and all other state and any local taxes and fees administered

by the state Comptroller, except unclaimed property and Public Utility Commission gross receipts assessments. Eligible taxpayers include those who did not file a required tax return or report; misrepresented, understated or omitted any tax liability on a past report; or erroneously claimed tax credits or tax deductions.

The amnesty does not apply to assessments already identified by the Comptroller, taxpayers currently under audit or review and taxpayers the Comptroller has already contacted about an audit or possible tax deficiency.

## El Paso man infected with West Nile Virus

The El Paso City-County Health and Environmental District has confirmed the diagnosis of West Nile Virus in a 40-year-old male. His onset of symptoms was on July 23. He was admitted to a local hospital on July 26. On July 30, he was released from the hospital. Laboratory reports received from the Texas Department of State Health Services found the patient was positive for West Nile Virus. This is the first case of West Nile Virus disease reported in El Paso this summer. The man lives in the South Central area of El Paso where West Nile Virus infected mosquitoes were previously found. The man reported seeing many mosquitoes at the auto body repair shop where he is employed, as well as in an empty lot next to his home. The man had no recent history of travel outside of El Paso.

West Nile is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito that has picked up the virus by feeding on an infected bird. The illness is not spread person-to-person or from bird-to-person. Most people infected with WNV usually have mild symptoms. If symptoms do occur, they develop in 5 to 15 days after the bite of an infected mosquito. Mild cases may have flu-like symptoms, a slight fever, headache and lethargy. Severe infections can cause sleepiness, headache, stiff neck, high fever, confusion, seizures, tremors, double vision and loss of consciousness, paralysis or death. Persons, especially infants and the elderly, who become sick quickly with any of the above symptoms, should see their doctor immediately. West Nile virus can also infect horses, many types of birds and some other animals.

Mosquitoes infected with West Nile Virus have been found in Socorro, Fabens, Tornillo, South Central and East Side areas of El Paso this summer; therefore there is an increased possibility of having more human cases of West Nile Virus in our community. The Health District stresses the importance of people protecting themselves from mosquito bites and the importance of people helping to prevent mosquito breeding:

- Avoid outdoor activities at dusk and dawn when mosquitoes are most active.
- Eliminate mosquito-breeding sites such as standing water on the ground, or water in tires, plastic containers, cans, kiddie pools or any other type of container that can hold water.
- Use a repellent that contains DEET (N, N-Diethyl-m-toluamide). Be sure to follow the instructions for use on the container.
- Check window and door screens and repair holes. Make sure door seals are secure.
- If you are outside, cover up by wearing pants, long-sleeved shirts, shoes and socks.
- Do not over-irrigate your farmland or property as this allows water to stagnate and mosquitoes to breed in it.

# The day the bridge falls

The pictures are amazing. It seems like we are being subjected to many different kinds of amazingly disastrous up-close-and-personal images these days and they just keep coming.

According to news reports the Department of Transportation wants 756 immediate inspections of bridges nationwide. Words like "structurally deficient" and "functionally obsolete" are being used to describe the suspended roadways we drive on everyday.

Take heart, though. A nationally-quoted "expert" said this doesn't necessarily mean they are "treacherous" just that they have "serious problems."

According to the American Society of Civil Engineers, our nation's bridge system earns only a grade of "C" and about \$188 billion in repairs and reconstruction are needed to bring the system up to snuff.


However, one of the biggest factors in getting our road systems back on track is "political leadership at all levels of government."

*I-10, Horizon Blvd. work will benefit Socorro, Horizon*

Hola, mi gente,  
Back in early July, I was informed by the Emergency Services District #1 about their concerns regarding the upcoming construction at I-10 and Horizon Blvd. Based on those public safety concerns, I sent a correspondence to the offices of the Department of Transportation on July 17 conveying those concerns.

For the residents of Horizon City, Socorro and Sparks, in case you are not yet aware, a major renovation will commence later this month or in September to renovate the intersection. Horizon Blvd. and I-10 has always been a severely congested intersection. Once the construction is completed, the intersection will have some major, and very important, improvements. During the construction period, drivers who frequent the area must accept the fact that there will be even more congestion.

The administrator of the volunteer fire department in Horizon City informed me that they and the volunteer fire department in Socorro continually assist each other in emer-

gency situations. They were concerned that the construction at I-10 and Horizon Blvd. would cause serious delays in response time. That was the main reason I contacted TxDOT.

Notwithstanding the importance of access for emergency vehicles, you, the everyday commuter, deserve accommodation as well. In the morning, there is significant congestion at the I-10 intersections with Horizon Blvd. and with Eastlake. It is logical to assume that more traffic will flow to Eastlake because of the construction. In the afternoon and evening, the Eastlake exit will also experience significantly more congestion. In addition, the traffic exiting the freeway heading for Socorro will add to that congestion.

In reply to my correspondence, TxDOT indicated that there are in place changes to help alleviate the congestion. The only new alternative will be a road from Eastlake and Darrington going north to Pellicano. With that extension in place, commuters from the

*110th Congress delivers good bills*

Last week marked the passage of a significant number of bills in the U.S. House of Representatives. We debated and considered several different pieces of legislation on topics such as health care, water infrastructure, and nutrition in schools, among others. Debate continued late into the night, and we finished at about 1:15 a.m. this past Sunday morning.

We passed the conference report for H.R. 1495, the Water Resources Development Act of 2007, which includes the \$25 million authorization for flood control and water and wastewater projects in El Paso that I secured.

It has been seven years since Congress passed a Water Resources Development Act. Not only is this legislation a sure sign that the Democratic majority is getting things done for the American people, the provision for El Paso County will be useful for our community as we address long-term water supply issues and confront flood control challenges.

We passed the Children's Health and Medi-

care Protection (CHAMP) Act of 2007, which provides health care to 11 million low-income children through the State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP) and strengthens Medicare, the federal health insurance program for senior citizens and those with disabilities.

Everyone deserves access to quality, affordable health care, and the CHAMP Act helps those who are perhaps most vulnerable — our children and seniors. This bill takes important steps to remove barriers to health care. I am proud that my colleagues and I passed it last week.

We passed H.R. 2272, the America Creating Opportunities to Meaningfully Promote Excellence in Technology, Education and Science Act (COMPETES) Act, a major part of the House Democrats' Innovation Agenda. It is an important bill that will help El Paso students, teachers, businesses and workers have the tools they need to succeed in the global economy.

where their parking lots and drive-ups have been constricted and, in some case, completely shut off by the

road work.

Oddly, I didn't hear any of them say anything about how glad they were that the road was being repaired. Nobody said a word about being ready and willing to suffer through inconvenience in order to have decent streets.

No, they were all concerned about how much longer it took them to get to and from work, to pick up their kids, go shopping — after all, it really is all about *me*. One fellow said what with all the other frustrations he had to deal with on a daily basis, this just made his day all that much worse.

Poor thing.

The business owners didn't mention what might happen should no road repairs be done at all and the street fall into the kind of disrepair that would certainly keep their customers away permanently.

So you see, road construction projects just don't evoke the kind of emotional response that gets people out there and motivated to support it. We like our road systems big, and grand, and solid, and stable, but un-

like those who built them in the first place, we're so used to having our massive interstate roadways that we don't grasp the concept that things like that require maintenance in blood, sweat, tears — even inconvenience.

The piper doesn't play for free. Somebody has to pay him. Preferably we can do it in installments over the course of time.

Or, we can pay it all at once, on a terrible day when the bridge falls.

create more qualified teachers in science and math fields and to support scientific research and innovation through the National Science Foundation, the Department of Energy and the National Institute of Standards and

Technology. As someone who has long been working for more teachers in these fields, I also included provisions in the bill to help improve opportunities for underrepresented minorities in these fields.

The list goes on... we also passed a major new energy initiative, the Agriculture Appropriations Act, which includes funding for school nutrition programs and food assis-

tance, funding for the Department of Defense, and the final House-Senate agreement on the Honest Leadership, Open Government Act of 2007.

My colleagues and I are proud of the progress we have made in the 110th Congress addressing these challenges, and I also thank you in the El Paso community for your feedback. I look forward to our continued work together.

Horizon area will have three alternatives: Eastlake to I-10; Eastlake to Rojas then to Loop 375; and then Eastlake to the Darrington intersection north to Pellicano and then to Loop 375.

As for the Socorro commuters, the best alternatives will be either North Loop, Alameda or Socorro Road to Loop 375. The City of Socorro is still working on an extension from I-10 to North Loop at Eastlake. This alternative is contingent on the City of Socorro acquiring rights on certain property.

Our great engineers at TxDOT have a plan to make the I-10/Horizon Blvd.

intersection much more commuter friendly. They have also worked with the county and municipalities to develop alternative routes during the construction phase. I commend District Engineer Charles Berry for the excellent planning at the intersection.

## What's up, doc? By Albert Balesh, M.D.

### Bone heads

If we are all little angels and always observe our doctors' prescriptions, then why is something as simple as taking a daily calcium supplement and vitamin D so perplexing? Why can't we prevent that irritating rattle of our bones? Why do we so fear that fall that may signal an end to our physical autonomy? Finally, why do we look to medical miracles like once a month, once a year, or once a life treatment regimens with such subliminal desperation, as if we could erase with a snap of the fingers the expiration date that the Almighty, nature, and the relentless course of time have so eloquently fixed in the pages of our twilight ex-

istence? Bone-headed, we're not. Headed for bone is another story. We desire an improved quality of life for as long as we can sustain it, and building strong bones and muscles just makes good sense. Navigating advice columns and internet websites to find clear-cut answers and remedies, however, is an exercise in Zen, and frayed nerves and couch-potato restlessness demand answers to questions and a realistic approach to intervention. So, as is usually stated in these columns, let's keep it simple. If we follow the rules outlined here, our lives, physically and osteogenically speaking, will be a lot less tedious and worry-ridden. Not following them will initiate the slippery slide to and through osteoporosis. The decision is ours and ours alone.

While no one likes to be reminded of the unpleasant, a jolt is sometimes needed. Here are the stats. More than 10 million people (8 million women and 2 million men) in the U.S. are affected by osteoporosis, but only a small proportion are diagnosed and treated. If that were not bad enough, an additional 18 million individuals have bone mass levels that put them at increased risk for developing the malady. Osteoporosis is defined technically a bone density that falls 2.5 standard deviations (SD) below the mean for young healthy adults of the same race and gender (so-called T-score < -2.5), and increased risk is set at bone mass T-score < -1.0. Now, that's all well and good, but we are more interested in effects and results than simple statistics. For example, what is this thing we call osteoporosis, and how does it affect us?

Osteoporosis results from bone loss due to both normal aging and an

exaggeration of the process of bone remodeling. The process of bone growth, remodeling, and repair is somewhat complicated and involves many players, but can be simplified by thinking of bone as a bank or repository of calcium, with deposits and withdrawals made daily. When there is an imbalance between the two in favor of withdrawals, we eventually go bankrupt and our bones break. Decreased activity of the bone-forming cells, called osteoblasts, and increased activity of bone-degrading cells, called osteoclasts, results in activation of bone remodeling, bone loss, decrease in biomechanical strength, more porous bone, and, finally, osteoporotic fracture, to the tune of 1.5 million fractures (300,000 hip fractures, 700,000 vertebral crush fractures, 250,000 wrist fractures, and 300,000 fractures of other bones such as the distal radius of the forearm) each year in the U.S.

as a consequence of osteoporosis.

So, where does osteoporosis come from, and should we resign ourselves to the fact that it is just another inevitable sign of old age that we can do nothing about? The answer is a resounding "No!" We can do something about it, but we must first come to know our enemy. Contributing to its onslaught are inadequate calcium intake, vitamin D deficiency, estrogen deficiency in women, inactivity and lack of exercise, genetic and acquired diseases (anorexia nervosa diabetes mellitus, liver disease, rheumatoid arthritis, lymphoma and leukemia, emphysema, and multiple sclerosis, to name a few), medications such as glucocorticoids, anticonvulsants, and immunosuppressants (check with your doctor on that score), and cigarette consumption, of course.

Being less bone-headed means



The only candidate who has reached out is John McCain, who is hoping to revive his Loose Talk Express by asking None Of The Above to be his running mate.


**Q: Will that happen?**

getting off our duffs and having our bone mineral density (BMD) measured by one of a battery of non-invasive techniques approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA), such as dual-energy x-ray absorptiometry (DXA), single-energy x-ray absorptiometry (SXA), quantitative computed tomography (CT), and ultrasound. All fancy names for relatively simple techniques that should be performed in postmenopausal women with risk factors for osteoporosis and in all women by age 65. If BMD is found to be > 2.5 SD below the mean value for young adults (i.e., T-score < -2.5), we play the treatment card.

After consultation with our health care providers and laboratory evaluation for secondary causes of osteoporosis, we proceed to the intervention phase in which

we reduce risk factors, supplement our diets with calcium (taken in doses of =600 mg at a time), vitamin D (400-600 IU daily), vitamin K, and magnesium, exercise by walking at least three times a week, and begin pharmacologic therapy. Our doctors will know how to best advise us regarding the latter, as we navigate a maze of television commercials touting the benefits of agents that specifically treat osteoporosis (bisphosphonates, calcitonin, parathyroid hormone) and others having broader effects (selective estrogen response modulators or SERMS). For those of us adverse to popping pills on a daily basis, two potent bisphosphonates, zoledronate (Zometa) and ibandronate (Boniva), have unique administration regimens (once yearly intravenously, once monthly orally).

Our money, our choices, our lives. Let's not be bone-headed!


