Higher tolls

New toll rates began Sept. 1, 2007 at the Paso Del Norte, Zaragoza, and Stanton International Bridges (southbound only) for passenger vehicles and commercial vehicles. The new rates are \$2.25 for noncommercial vehicles (increased from \$1.65) and \$3.50 per axle for commercial vehicles (increased from \$3.00 per axle). Pedestrian crossings will stay at 35 cents.

New communication system reaches SISD families quickly

Eight minutes is all it takes for Socorro ISD to reach every parent

The next time bad weather delays the start of school or a snow day forces us to cancel classes, parents of nearly 40,000 Socorro ISD

agrees the system is an important safety measure for the District. "These parents trust us with their children. We want them to know that we are making every effort to keep them informed and in touch with our district and their children."

"With a 200 line capacity, the District can

contact SISD families within minutes," says Teresa MacDonald SISD Telecom Team Leader. "Previously, only the high schools had a system to send out messages. Now all the campuses and the District can reach parents."

Each school will be able to input six phone numbers per student. If a call is made on the first attempt, no additional numbers will be called. In addition, school administrators can use the system to send out emails and atparents. The Rapid No-

tach forms to send to (SISD) students will be notified in as little as tification System can also be used to send out report cards, test notifications, holiday or schedule changes, club or team news and school board reminders.

"There is no equipment or hardware with the system," says Joyce Katz, Global Connect Trainer. "The system is a Voice Over Internet Protocol (VOIP) which provides clear messages. Schools can send out messages in multiple languages and principals will be able to access their school site from home to send out emergency notifications."

"This is another way to reach parents," says Campestre Elementary Principal Isabel Andresen whose campus has 634 students. "This will also help us maintain our student

eight minutes by using the District's new Global Connect Rapid Notification System. The company spent two days in August training SISD campus principals and district administrators in the system that will allow the District to send not only emergency notices or Code Blue alerts, but also regular campus reminders, report card information and general informational e-mails.

"It's important for a school district as large as Socorro to be able to contact our parents quickly in case of an emergency or bad weather," said SISD Superintendent Dr. Sylvia P. Atkinson. "In addition, it is also important for our campuses to begin using this system to regularly send our parents school information."

First death due to West Nile Virus reported in El Paso

EL PASO COUNTY — The El Paso City-County Health & Environmental District has confirmed the first death caused by West Nile Virus. The victim is an 82 year old Hispanic male who lived in the 79905 zip code. He was admitted to the hospital on Aug. 14, 2007 and passed away on Aug. 25, 2007. This individual also had other medical conditions at the time of death.

In addition, the El Paso City-County Health & Environmental District has confirmed the diagnosis of three (3) additional human West Nile Virus (WNV) cases.

The first case is a 49 year old Hispanic female who lives in the 79915 zip code. She was admitted to the hospital on Aug. 11, 2007 and discharged on Aug. 22, 2007. The second case is a 75 year old White

female who lives in the 79936 zip code. She was admitted to the hospital on August 11, 2007 and remains hospitalized. The third case is an 80 year old Hispanic

male who lives in the 79905 zip code. He was admitted to the hospital on August 19, 2007 and remains hospitalized.

There are six additional cases that are categorized as probable and suspected.

One probable case is an 82 year old Hispanic male who resides in the 79907 zip code. He was admitted to the hospital on Aug. 6, 2007 and discharged on Aug. 11, 2007. Additional probable cases include a 65 year old male and a 35 year old male with unknown zip codes of residence at this time and a 59 year old female that lives in the 79915 zip code.

There are two suspected cases still awaiting lab results. One is a 21 year old female from the 79903 zip code. She was admitted to the hospital on Aug. 20, 2007 and remains hospitalized. The other is a 59 year old female residing in the 79915 zip code.

These new cases bring the total of confirmed WNV cases to nine, plus four probable cases and two suspected cases, with one

Vector Control continues to collect mosquitoes from throughout the County and forwards them to the Texas Department of State Health Services Laboratory in Austin for testing. Mosquitoes collected on Aug. 21, 2007 in the 79904 zip code have tested positive for WNV. Vector Control also continues to fog for mosquitoes in all areas where humans and mosquitoes have tested positive for the

Now that school is back in session, the El Paso City-County Health & Environmental District is also encouraging all schools to reduce irrigation and eliminate standing water that collects on school grounds. Mosquitoes will develop in any puddles that last more than four days. Schools can also encourage students to wear long sleeves, long pants and socks to minimize exposure to mosquitoes while outdoors at dawn, dusk or night-time (such as at football games) when mosquitoes are most active.

All residents of the region need to take extra vigilance to protect themselves from

They say if you begin at the wrong starting point, you will never arrive at the right destination. The minute I failed to appropriately process the jury duty notice, I was on a collision course with reckoning. The penalty in this case pretty much fit the crime.

Unfortunately, it doesn't always turn The amazing part, and, may I add, out that way. The crimes are sometimes horrendous with devastating consequences to other people. We still want to make excuses for ourselves.

> It is equally unfortunate that, frequently, our excuses work. So others set out to balance the scales on their own and Lady Justice is left holding a warped measuring instrument.

> There are a group of young black men in Jena, Louisianna, charged with crimes carrying pretty harsh penalties. They allegedly struck a white kid on the back of the head, knocking him unconscious, then kicked and stomped him. Now, these young fellows say they had reason. Primarily, they say, they are outnumbered and have been faced with threatening words, looks and actions by white kids.

I don't doubt that for a minute. In fact, they say that Jena, Louisianna, in which whites heavily outnumber

the black population has been somewhat astir with racial tension for weeks prior to the attack.

Still, what is it that makes us all unwilling to accept fault for our misdeeds — ranging from missing jury duty to raising our hand, and foot, against our neightbor?

There are probably few Americans who were of adult age in the spring of 1991 who didn't see the video-taped beating of Rodney King. On parole for robbery and under the influence, King tried to outrun the law, resisted arrest and was soundly thrashed.

officers charged with King's beatings touched off the horrendous 1992 riots in Los Angeles in which black and other minority neighborhoods suffered the worst of it — at the hand of their own.

Like O.J. Simpson, King was subsequently involved a civil suit. Unlike Simpson, he won - about 3.8 million. Just to prove that money doesn't solve everything, he was arrested again in 1999 and 2003. His crimes included spousal abuse, being under the influence of PCP, the stick. speeding, running a red light and refusing to yield to arresting officers.

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





Students urged to use Campus Crime Stoppers

El Paso wants all area students to know that ev- it, such as the D.E.A., Customs and Border eryone has a place to turn when they have information about a crime that has been committed or is about to be committed either on campus or anywhere else in the city. That place is Campus Crime Stoppers. Students can contact Campus Crime Stoppers 24/7 by calling the tips hotline at 566-TIPS (566-8477) or by going online at www.crimestoppersofelpaso.org to submit a secure tip.

The first reason to call Campus Crime Stoppers is that you can remain completely anonymous. Nobody will ever know who gave the tip. That information is protected by law in the State of Texas and cannot be revealed, even in court.

The second reason to call Campus Crime Stoppers is that the tip information will go directly to the agency that is best able to handle it. For instance, campus crime information will go to the appropriate school district police organization. Other information will go to the

It's a new school year, and Crime Stoppers of proper law enforcement agency that will handle Protection, the F.B.I., local Police units or Sheriff's deputies, and so on.

> The final reason to call Campus Crime Stoppers is that, if your tip leads to an arrest and our board's approval, you can earn a cash reward. And, just as it is in giving your tip to Campus Crime Stoppers, you also remain completely anonymous when picking up your cash reward. You will never be asked to tell anybody your name or any other identifying information. You simply proceed into a drive-in bank teller (not in the lobby), and submit a code number we give you. In return, the teller will give you cash. Nobody will ever know who you are.

> So don't let bullies and criminals ruin your school year. If you have any information about drugs or weapons on campus, after-school fights, graffiti and vandalism, or anything else where people could be hurt, contact Campus Crime Stoppers. Keep your school and neighborhood safe.

August 7 **Vinton Village Council**

EL PASO COUNTY—Highlights cil approved revisions to an applicaof August meetings by municipal and tion through ORCA for a \$295,384 education entities in the Upper and Texas Community Development Block Grant. ORCA is the Office of Rural Community Affairs.

Jessica Garza, village clerk, explained the key elements of the grant application:

"This project is the third phase of

a first-time water construction and will provide a stable, safe supply of potable water to the target area.

"... Although this application is designed by itself to serve only 47 residents, the introduction of new sewer service from El Paso Water Utilities into this area will include a new tap at the Vinton Road pipeline and will incorporate the added benefit of looping with the existing Kiely Road to provide redundancy and pressure stabilization to this portion of the Village of Vinton."

She continues. It will "provide reliable service to the village."

After a heated discussion, the council approved the additional expenditure of \$7,000 over budgeted cost of \$18,000 for the purchase of a new village work truck for maintenance department. It would be better suited for transporting visitors as well as La Tuna convicts on work details.

There was discussion, but no action was taken on appointing members to the Keep Vinton Beautiful Commission.

August 8 San Elizario ISD Board

August 14 **Canutillo ISD Board**

As with the San Elizario school district, Canutillo ISD addressed board election changes required by legislative changes in the Texas Election Code. After defeating a motion to align its elections with the Village of Vinton, the board then approved the option of having its elections in November of even numbered years to align itself with state and county voting. Term of office would be four

This plan would go into effect in 2008.

Superintendent Dr. Pam Padilla had good news for board members in her report.

"We are attracting more experienced teachers," she said on the eve of the new school year. She added, "100 percent of the new teachers in the district are highly qualified. Only a few vacancies remain.

"Everybody is ready to go back to work.'

Tony Reza, executive director for business services, presented an update on the preliminary budget. He also discussed proposed tax rates to meet the needs of "a growing school district."

He stressed the importance of accessing additional sources of income to meet those needs which includes the costs of a new elementary school. "We are cutting expenses; we are hitting travel."

August 21 **Vinton Village Council**

In its final meeting of the month, the Village Council approved increases in monthly rent for two "tenants," the substation of the Sheriff's Department and the office of the Justice of the Peace. The hefty raises would increase rent from \$1,000 to \$\$1,600 for the El Paso County Sheriff. The cost for the JP's office would increase from \$800 a month to \$1,200.

Garza later explained the increases approved are tentative and not final. They are subject to negotiations with El Paso County.

The council also approved the budget statement for the 2007/08 fiscal year. It says, in part:

"Rebuilding after the floods continues to be a priority. Not only rebuilding, but improving water controls in the areas hardest hit has proved to be not only difficult for the city engineering firm, but funding as

"We anticipate slight increases in salary and benefits for the employees.

"It is our intention to provide the best services at minimal cost.

"Aggressively seek outside funding sources to meet needs of the city.

"Public safety has been and remains a priority concern. We hope to continue regular arroyo maintenance as well as improving storm water controls with new construction.

Completion of existing parks and development of neighborhood parks must be placed higher on the needs
