Flu shots

The City of El Paso Department of Public Health will provide flu vaccines and pneumonia shots at its clinics. The immunizations are being recommended for anyone, who is six months of age and older. The flu vaccine will be given with a needle for adults. Children can receive the flu vaccine in the form of a shot or nasal-spray. Citizens are encouraged to get a yearly flu vaccination. Infants and the elderly are at high risk for the flu. The cost for the flu vaccine is \$25 and the fee for the Pneumonia shot is \$40. The clinics accept Medicaid, Medicare, cash, private insurance and checks. The Department of Public Health clinics are located at:

Anthony grant

Mayor Art Franco has good news — lots of good news — for the residents of Anthony. To be more precise, there is a potential for a total of \$11.4 million worth of good news that will benefit the town in quality of life matters. At the Sept. 23rd Town Council meeting, he announced that the town would be receiving a grant of \$5.5 million from the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB). The money, which Franco said they would be able to tap into within the next three months, would go to double the size of the town's sewer system as well as providing system upgrades. The longtime mayor told council members he had just returned from Austin where he had met once again with TWDB officials who informed him of the funding approval. He had been to Austin earlier in the year to present the town's proposal for the grant. The mayor is also seeking a \$5.9 million open grant from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers that would go for similar service improvements, this time to both the sewer and water systems. Franco said the town may not necessarily get the full amount, but expects to receive a portion of it. That money would not be available until after the first of the year. "With the money we have received," he said, "we are in good shape for the future. This is an investment in the future."

Anthony approves budget, pay raises

ANTHONY — Money matters were center stage at the Sept. 23 meeting of the Anthony Town Council.

- It was a matter of approving the town budget for the 2008-09 administrative year.
- It was a matter of approving a property tax rate for the coming fiscal year.
- It was a matter of reviewing and possibly boosting salary increases already in place for town employees.

Council approved a total budget of \$4.24 million for the new year. The budget is in two parts, general fund and water and sewer. The general fund portion accounts for \$3.3 million. Because of commercial growth and additional sales taxes and various grants the town has received, Franco said the budget was about \$200,000 less than last year.

The budget includes a 3 percent across-the-board increase for employees. "This is based on what I thought the budget could handle," the mayor explained. This was coupled with the fact that some got merit increases in addition to the 3 percent increase.

A lengthy discussion ensued in which it was said by members of the audience that the employees deserved a higher rate. "Treat them right. Give them 5 percent; give them 6 percent," an unidentified member of the audience urged. "It won't hurt the budget."

The Maintenance Department was singled out for praise and a raise for their hard work in keeping things in shape. "Whenever we need you, you are there," one person said.

The audience that crowded council cham-

bers also praised the work of the Anthony Police Department, the majority of whom seemed to be in attendance.

"I have known them for 16 years," Franco said of the maintenance staff, adding his own thanks. "I know what they can do."

Franco responded to the sentiment for an even greater pay hike. "We are going to have to look at everybody," he noted.

Council approved the \$0.398817 tax rate recommended by the mayor. This compares to a \$0.413420 property tax rate last year. Although the tax rate went down, Franco pointed out, that taxes went up because property values went up.

The average residence in Anthony, according to information supplied by the town clerk is valued at \$82,202 this year, compared to \$71,898 last year. Based on those figures, taxes on the average home would be \$327.84 this year. They were \$297.24 last year.

A public hearing was held during the council meeting in which comment was sought on the proposed increases. There had been two previous public hearings on Sept. 12 and Sept. 19 for the same purpose.

In other action:

Council, at the mayor's request, deleted the item on sponsoring Angel Ramirez to the El Paso Community College Police Academy. This had been an issue at the last council meeting which resulted in the mayor walking out of the meeting.

Council agreed to spend up to \$3,500 on items such as water bottles and pens to promote the town. Money would come out of the hotel/motel tax.

Council tabled action on approving a new reserve police officer until more information could be obtained.

New restrictions placed on sexually oriented businesses

Commissioners Court has modified the location restrictions imposed two weeks ago during the adoption of a court order to regulate Sexually Oriented Businesses (SOBs) located in unincorporated areas of the county.

The new restriction states that no person shall own, operate or conduct any sexually oriented business within 1,000 feet of a school, church, daycare center, residential district or public park, among others.

Commissioner Pct. 1, Luis Sariñana, requested to rescind the previous court order and adopt the modification.

"The reason I did that is to be consistent with the Supreme Court ruling in order to avoid possible lawsuits," Sariñana said.

The motion was approved unanimously and seconded by County Judge Anthony Cobos.

Commissioners Court first voted to adopt the regulations after they found evidence about negative secondary effects, which include public lewdness, vandalism and the decrease of value in properties located nearby the adult businesses.

The motion to adopt the court order was made by Commissioner Pct. 2, Veronica Escobar and seconded by Sariñana.

The new restrictions include:

- Location requirements specify that SOBs must be at least 1,000 feet from certain properties including: churches, schools, daycares, residential areas and public parks.
- Outdoor signs stating that a SOB is planned must be posted at the proposed location.
- Business already operating in the county must apply for a license of operation with in 120 days of the adoption of the court order.
- The County Clerk office or the Tax Office have been proposed to be responsible to receive applications, renew or suspend permits. (No decision has been made.)
- No business shall be open between 4:00 a.m. to 6:00 a.m.
- The license fee (if granted) is \$550 for initially and \$350 for annual renewal.

Miners paste the Florida Knights

If you were like me you stood there in stunned disbelief last week and wondered to yourself, "where the heck did this come from?"

The Miners' 58-13 demolition of Central Florida has most of the city scratching its head this week. How can the Miners look so bad for nine games in a row, and then play like a top-20 team worthy of a national

television audience?

Don't get me wrong, being a native-born El Pasoan, I loved it. But UTEP disposed of UCF with such ease that one has to wonder what's been going on over the last year.

The obvious reason the Miners blasted the Knights was because of the defense. Over the last couple of years the Miners' defense has ranked right at the bottom of the national standings.

It was so bad last season that UTEP gave up an average of 504

yards per game. A team gains over 500 yards in total offense once in a blue moon — or every time they played the Miners.

All their defensive woes were supposed to be a thing of the past with Osia Lewis' 3-3-5 scheme. But in UTEP's first three games against Buffalo (42 points), Texas (42) and New Mexico State (34), it was just more of the same, no covering, no pressure, no tackling.

But last week the 30-some-thousand who witnessed the game in the Sun Bowl, and the countless others watching at home who didn't want to spend money on a ticket, got a glimpse of what this defense can look like when executed correctly.

And I'll bet the UCF offense had a few choice four-letter words to describe it, and are in no hurry to see it again.

The Miners forced a whopping six turnovers, scored two defensive touchdowns, blocked a punt and held the Knights to just 336 yards

of total offense — which the last time I checked, is nowhere near 504.

UTEP defenders flew to the football and at one point the ESPN announcers made the observation that it looked like the Miners had 12 or 13 players on the field.

The Miners excelled in three other phases of the game.

Quarterback Trevor Vittatoe, who had looked apprehensive in the early season, was his old self firing the football to his receivers

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
