# Horizon Regional MUD moves to new building

HORIZON CITY - There is a new look and a new location for the Horizon Regional Municipal Utility District.

A ribbon-cutting was held Wednesday, Aug. 25 for its new and expanded administrative offices at 14100 Horizon Blvd. Work on the building began eight months ago. Total cost for the new MUD project comes to \$1.8 million. Of that, \$1.2 million went for the building, and \$600,000 for the land.

"This facility will help us better serve

our customers," said MUD board president Benny Davis in a website statement. "We just outgrew our old facility some time ago," he later added. "We have a nice, larger area inside," he says proudly. "Now we have room to grow, (and) the roof doesn't leak."

The old MUD offices, just a short distance away, had problems with leaky roofs and cramped facilities for customer service, Davis notes.

All of that has changed.

The old building had a little more than 3,000 square feet. The new building, which is an expansion and renovation of an existing structure, has 7,400 square feet. It also has a drive-through lane for faster service on paying bills, something not available previously. It also has a larger parking area.

In the spacious lobby with its customer service windows, Davis gestures rapidly to indicate that the interior area is approximately three times the size of the old facility. Davis says it is also a green building, with

to lose a family service member retained asset account) mingled and receive the proceeds of his or her life-insurance policy have a lot on their minds. Maybe they're not paying attention to details on a daily basis. Who can blame them?

The policy insurers act like they're doing the survivors a favor, sending a handy packet of "checks" with a note (the fine print) to let the payout money sit there as long as they like.

Here are two things to know about that money:

1) The money is in an interestbearing account, but that insurer is making money on the account and gets five times the interest that is paid to the survivor. Survivors are getting maybe 1 percent interest, and the insurer more than 5 percent.


2) The money isn't sitting in an account protected by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (c) 2010 King Features Synd., Inc.

Those who have the misfortune - it's in a general fund (called a with the insurer's money. That means if the company folds, the money is not protected in any way. It just vanishes.

How low can they get? Pretty low, it seems – all in the name of making a fat profit.

If you're a beneficiary survivor struggling to make sense of things right now, I'll make it easy for you: If you receive the proceeds of an insurance payout in the form of one of those checkbooks, take the checkbook to your own FDICinsured bank and deposit it into a new account. If you want, break it up into smaller amounts and put it in CDs with varying maturity dates, keeping some in a regular account for immediate expenses.

Just don't let it sit in the insurer's account.



# Safety campaign under way

This year's annual Labor Day Drink, Drive, friend or family member for a ride. Go to Jail campaign to prevent drinking and driving will have an emphasis on the importance of choosing not to get behind the wheel if you have been drinking. The "Choose Your Ride" theme features modified patrol cars that have decals making the vehicle look like half a police vehicle and half a taxi cab. In addition to being on billboards and posters, these vehicles will be out on the streets in communities with a high incidence of alcohol-related fatalities. The message is that if you choose to drink, you should call a cab, designate a sober driver ahead of time, use public transportation, stay put, or call a

The Drink, Drive, Go to Jail campaign runs through September 6, 2010. During this time, law enforcement statewide will be working overtime to find and arrest drunk drivers.

Driving drunk is not only dangerous, it can be very expensive. In Texas, if convicted of a first-time DWI, offenders can pay a fine of up to \$2,000, lose their driver's license for up to a year, and serve 180 days in jail. Other costs associated with a drunk-driving arrest and conviction can add up to more than \$17,000 for bail, legal fees, court appearances,

court-ordered classes, vehicle insurance increases, and other expenses. Drunk drivers with children younger than 15 in the vehicle face even stiffer penalties. They can be charged with child endangerment and face up to a \$10,000 fine, two years in a state jail, and loss of their driver's license for up to two years.

The real consequences of drunk driving are the senseless deaths and injuries that result from this reckless behavior. Preliminary statistics show that in 2009, there were 27,108 alcohol-related crashes in Texas that resulted in 955 deaths and 17,542 injuries. Data from police crash reports show that in 2008, 28.1 percent of the total traffic fatalities in Texas were caused by drivers under the influence of alcohol. And, 25 percent of people killed in alcoholrelated crashes in Texas were between the ages of 20 and 25.

five additional wells in the next three to five years to meet future needs of the district.

"We have lots of water," Davis says, but adds that it is not all at a level of purity to meet state standards. "There is an ocean of brackish water underneath us," he points out.

To turn the brackish water into drinking water, the MUD uses a process called reverse osmosis (R/O). The brackish water is filtered through special high-tech membranes that extract the harmful elements to make it drinkable. This highly purified water is then blended with lesser quality water that is within state standards.

According to Davis, the Horizon Regional MUD was the first district in the Southwest to use the reverse osmosis process.

While there is an "ocean" of water available for use and the technology to make it drinkable, Davis and Alvarado emphasize curbing water usage. They are more "water conscious."

To educate the community about landscaping with minimal water requirements, the district is planning an educational garden that features

If taxes on the average residence homestead increase by more than eight percent, the qualified voters of the district by petition may require that an election be held to determine whether to reduce the operation and maintenance tax rate to the rollback tax rate under Section 49.236(d), Water Code.






