Tax free

The opportunity for Texans to save money on energy efficient appliances is fast approaching. The state's annual ENERGY STAR® Sales Tax Holiday is from Saturday, May 26 through Monday, May 28, 2012. "As Texans focus on their household budgets, they can save twice on energy efficient appliances purchased during Memorial Day weekend," Texas Comptroller Susan Combs said. "Shoppers do not have to pay sales tax on the appliances, and those energy efficient products will also help them save on their utility bills." The sales tax break applies to ENERGY STAR® qualified air conditioners priced at \$6,000 or less; refrigerators priced at \$2,000 or less; ceiling fans; fluorescent light bulbs; clothes washers; dishwashers; dehumidifiers; and programmable thermostats. Crime Stoppers

A customer at a Mission Valley convenience store is viciously assaulted by three men in the parking lot, making this the Crime Stoppers "Crime of the Week." The suspects left the store and got into a white SUV with two other men inside. When the victim walked out, the two suspects confronted him. Meanwhile a third suspect got out of the SUV, went behind the victim and all three brutally beat the victim, punching him repeatedly in the head and kicking his body, splattering blood on the front door of the store. Local artists turn desert weeds into unique artworks

Desert Weeds

Local artists Oscar Moya and Lydia Limas will present a printmaking workshop to demonstrate how desert vegetation can be used to create a piece of artwork.

The unique workshop will be held at 2 p.m., Saturday, May 26, at the El Paso Museum of Archeology, 4301 Transmountain. The free demonstration is open to adults and children age 3 and up.

Participants will learn how to use leaves and weeds found in the surrounding desert landscape to produce a drawing or painting that is transferred onto paper with a press. The result is a unique collagraph print or monoprint which can be framed. All necessary materials will be provided for the Saturday afternoon workshop.

Moya began his Desert Weeds series in

2009 by experimenting with plants and leaves in his backyard. "I was amazed at the incredible detail and the beautiful textures," Moya said. "And, I found that children as young as three years old easily get involved in creating potentially limitless unique art through this process," he added.

Moya has participated in group exhibitions in the United States, Mexico, Canada, and in Europe. Moya's recent collaborative printmaking projects include Centenario de la Revolucion Mexicana, Arceo Press, Portafolio, 2010, and teaching Desert Weeds basic printmaking workshops in the El Paso region since 2009.

Big scammer nabbed

Two years ago, New Mexico's attorney general slammed shut a charity that was set up to help veterans. The reason given at the time was that some of the officers in the U.S. Navy Veterans Association had fictitious addresses in the paperwork. Added to that was the fact that the charity was spending barely one-percent of the money it raised on veterans. That was the first indication that something wasn't right, and more details quickly surfaced.

The 80-odd people who were supposedly on the board of directors couldn't be found, and the "headquarters" was a mail drop. Only "Bobby Thompson" could be located, but wasn't talking. With the NVA shut down and nine states and two government agencies after him, Thompson went on the run.

Thompson (aka Ronnie Brittain, which was also a false identity), alleged director of the organization, was wanted for money laundering, corruption and identity theft.

Fast-forward two years: Thompson, or whoever he really is, has been caught. In a bar. In Oregon. His pockets were stuffed with multiple false identification documents. The U.S. Marshals

have him in hand.

He's accused of conning well-meaning folks out of \$100 million over eight years.

Let me repeat that amount: One Hundred. Million. Dollars.

Think what that money could have bought, how many veterans could have been helped had the money been used for legitimate purposes.

If there is that much money being donated to veterans causes, if there are that many people opening their wallets, that's fantastic, but let's get it right. Know where that money is really going, and how it's going to be used.

Scam alert: Protecting senior Texans from Advance Fee Fraud

For the 90-year-old bank customer, there were no Presidents' Day weekend plans in sight. There was only the stark reality of his wife's long suffering mind and his long suffering heart. Although he was all too aware that both he and his wife suffered from Alzheimer's disease, he had no idea that they were also victims of a scam to defraud aging and unwell victims. It all started back when "good friends" called again to convince him that if he sent them another \$15,000, he would finally receive the \$2 million prize.

Fortunately, a vigilant employee at the local bank grew concerned about her elderly customer's frequent visits to the bank and decided to contact the Texas Attorney General's Office. By that time, she explained, the customer had already wired his "good friends" \$75,000 via Western Union so that he would be eligible to claim his \$2 million prize. The bank employee pleaded with the customer – and at one point, it appeared she had convinced him to stop sending money to the scam artists. But his "good friends" kept calling, so the elderly man returned to the bank to liquidate his CDs because he had already drained his checking and savings accounts.

The bank employee explained the scheme in detail to the Attorney General's Office. Apparently operating under his "good friends" instructions, the elderly man would withdraw cash in \$15,000 increments. Then, he would take the money to a nearby Western Union outlet, which would take possession of the cash and wire the money per the elderly man's instructions. Although the concerned bank employee showed the customer documents from the Office of the Attorney General's website, warning about advance fee scams, he was undeterred. So when she contacted the Attorney General's Office, she wanted to know what else she could do to make him stop without violating bank regulations or other laws.

The public information specialist

who fielded the call at the Attorney General's Office agreed to help and immediately contacted a colleague – Outreach coordinator John Elizarde, who also has a background in law enforcement. Before he was appointed Outreach coordinator, Elizarde was assigned to the attorney general's law enforcement division, where he worked regularly with the Southwest Border Anti-Money Laundering Alliance. The Alliance was launched in 2010 to help Texas and other border states coordinate money laundering prevention, investigations and prosecutions. Under an agreement between all four border states and Western Union, the Alliance also established new protocols for sharing Western Union's extensive information about wire transfers that originate in border states. Relying upon his extensive knowledge of the money services business and his contacts at Western Union, Elizarde sought to uncover the real identity of the elderly man's "good friends."

After speaking with the concerned bank teller, Elizarde sent an email inquiry to his contact at Western Union's Consumer Protection Ethics and Compliance Division. When Elizarde's phone rang thirty minutes later, his Western Union contact was on the line. The news was predictable – and not good. Western Union had quickly reviewed the wire transfers and confirmed that the 90-year-old man's money had been sent to the Philippines and Nigeria.

Worse, because wire transfers are converted to cash or cashier's checks when they arrive, there is simply no way to identify the perpetrators or recoup the money from foreign countries that are thousands of miles away. But, because of a vigilant

bank teller's call to the Attorney General's Office, she was able to prevent her elderly customer from being defrauded again.

After it was contacted by the Attorney General's Outreach coordinator, Western Union immediately put a nationwide flag on all transactions by the local bank's elderly customer. A systemwide alert instructed all Western Union outlets to contact the company's corporate office before processing the bank customer's future wire transfer requests.

As a law enforcement veteran who had studied advance payment scams, Elizarde recognized that the unscrupulous offshore criminals who posed as the elderly victim's "good friends" would not simply stop calling. So Elizarde also contacted MoneyGram, another large money services firm with outlets across Texas, and arranged for that firm to implement similar security measures that would protect the elderly bank customer.

Although it is virtually impossible to recover the elderly couple's money from the foreign criminals who defrauded them, this case shows how a vigilant bank teller, quick-thinking state authorities and a responsive Western Union orchestrated a coordinated effort to prevent a 90-year-old victim from losing his life's savings to an advance fee scam. These scams – which can range from fraudulent foreign lottery winnings to a non-existent sweepstakes prize or even a made-up inheritance from a purported long-lost relative abroad – frequently target our senior citizens. Concerned family members, friends, bank officials and long-term care personnel are seniors' first line of defense.

Your vote counts

Hola, mi gente. After so many uncertainties, the 2012 primary election has finally begun. Thanks to a flawed redistricting map pushed forward by the conservative leadership in Austin, our primary election was delayed by 60 days.

This primary is in stark contrast to the 2008 election which featured a monumental battle between then Senator Barack Obama and Senator Hillary Clinton. El Paso was really fired up for that race and it showed in a much higher turnout than previous presidential primaries.

This year, the race that created the attention was for the Republican nomination for president. Texans who would have voted in that March 9 primary were denied a powerful voice in determining how conservative or moderate their candidate should be.

In any case, there are still battles for state positions that are stirring the voters in other areas of Texas. The replacement for Senator Kay Hutchison is the most important statewide position.

There are strong indicators pointing to a very low voter turnout. Because the actual election day, May 29, is right after the Memorial Day Holiday, many are saying that this primary election day will be a record low turnout.

As if the bungling by the state legislature on redistricting wasn't bad enough, the negative tone in many races by many candidates has a bad effect on turnout. What

is there to motivate people to vote when the candidates are calling each other crooks.

Since the first election in 2002 that I ran for state representative, I never engaged in negative campaigning. I think many of you have seen the flyers where expressions on the faces are photoshopped into unflattering poses. That kind of politicking is dishonest. If a candidate stoops to that low level of campaigning, what does it say about his or her character? The best policy is always be positive about past and future issues and not discourage voters with disingenuous advertising.

Unfortunately, those who produce these types of ads are paid lots of money so they will not stop selling them. And, candidates see that the ads are effective to a certain degree because some voters are influenced by them.

When this article is available to the public, early voting will almost be half over. If you haven't voted, please get to an early voting location and exercise your right as a citizen of the United States. Our republic form of government works best when most of the citizens vote.

SkillsUSA one of the best kept secrets in Texas

Competition is a staple of life in school. Athletic events, UIL academic tournaments, the performing arts, debate clubs, and farm and ranch contests all give students opportunities to earn credit toward graduation and gain lifelong skills that can't always be offered within the walls of a classroom.

Yet one of the best-kept secrets in our public schools is another competitive, hands-on program that prepares over a million Texas students for high-paying careers in

specific, skilled trades.

SkillsUSA, was founded in 1966 as Vocational Industrial Clubs of America and changed its name in 1999. It sends in skilled workers from various trades to train teachers and students alike on how to perform specialized work. Its goal is to prepare students for a future in a wide variety of trade, technical and skilled service occupations.

Easily recognizable by their bright red blazers at events, the students participate in competitions

—featuring a wide variety of contests from graphic design to sheet metal assembly along with leadership conferences.

SkillsUSA includes with its masonry of career training programs ethical lessons. The students recite a creed that teaches the importance of education, fair play, the satisfaction of hard work, the American way of life, and having moral and spiritual standards.

“Forty-five years and not everyone knows about us,” said Linda Holcombe, executive director of the Texas Industrial Vocational Association (which works with SkillsUSA to train career technology teachers).

However, awareness of SkillsUSA is building in Texas. Holcombe said that one of the highlights of the year for their teachers and students occurs during the SkillsUSA-Texas Day at the state Capitol, where a mock legislative session is held.

The exposure at the Capitol is apparently paying off.

“In 2007... we aligned 19 career and tech courses to fulfill the fourth year of science and math,” Holcombe said. “We’ve also created a career technology course for a speech credit, and another for a fine-arts credit.”

The organization recently wrapped up SkillsUSA Month in March, celebrated in many public schools. Holcombe said SkillsUSA saw a 10 percent membership increase over the past year.

According to Holcombe, industry required certifications are tickets to well-paying jobs in specialized, high-tech fields.

“The certifications keep them from being ditch-diggers,” Holcombe said. “They prepare them for the world of work because they get the training industries need.”

As one example, home construction courses offered through SkillsUSA do not simply train a student how to be a carpenter. Skills learned may lead to a career in architecture and structural engineering — “not just hammering in nails,” she added.

“Career technology is not the old shop class,” she said. “If you’re in class and just making ash trays for four years, it should be shut down! Schools need to be up to date with technology and the job market.”

Safety is another aspect of career technology training that can be applied to a wide variety of jobs. OSHA certifications are available for students at the entry level, which is a prerequisite in many manufacturing environments.

If you know a junior high or high school student who is interested in 3-D animation, plumbing, advertising art, cosmetology, radio production, firefighting, aircraft repair, drafting, cabinetry, commercial baking, machinery, collision repair, nurse assisting (there are so many I’ll have to cut this list short), let them know about SkillsUSA — as well as the good-paying career opportunities that await in skilled labor fields.

Hamilton turns his life around in spectacular fashion

Many times in the sports world there are players who get caught up in extracurricular activity that changes their future for the worst.

Some athletes make these wrong choices because they grew up in that environment and then were chosen to play a professional sport.

Some were clean as a whistle and then got caught up in the world of having way too much money and way too much free time on their hands.

Whether its drugs or alcohol or gambling or theft, the seedier side of professional athletics is far more prevalent than anyone wants to admit.

And almost all of these athletes fall from grace, ruining their reputations and ending their careers in utter embarrassment and total humiliation.

Most of these athletes disappear from the radar and are never heard from again.

It wasn't that long ago that Josh Hamilton

was out of baseball, never to be heard from again.

The Texas Rangers outfielder, with the multitude of tattoos, has a similar but completely different story to tell.

Was Hamilton expected to be a Major League Baseball star? Yes, he was the first player picked in the 1999 draft.

He was considered a "can't miss" prospect but things started to unravel in 2001 while he was still in the minors.

He eventually turned into a guy who was clean for a couple months and then missed a week of games after showing up late to practice on a daily basis – it wasn't a mystery why.

Hamilton kept trying to make it to the big leagues but things got so bad with his drug and alcohol addiction that he didn't play a single game from 2004 to 2006.

Wow, talk about never being heard from again.

I can't imagine what goes on in a guy's head when he has that much time to think about how much he has just thrown away. For Hamilton, it was his potential, his good name and his future.

We all heard about what happened to Junior Seau last week. If you allow them the power, the demons in a person can even take over the will to live.

Fortunately for Hamilton, something inside convinced him not to succumb to the demons.

We all know that he has turned his life around except for a minor one-night relapse in February, where he had a couple drinks in a bar before calling his teammates to come down and save him from himself.

Even though Hamilton was going down a familiar path that night, he still had the control to call his friends for help. For a person with an addiction, that takes strength, courage and about a ton-and-a-half of humility.

And all that takes us to today, where Hamilton isn't just doing well in the game he loves – he's the best player in the game.

The 31-year-old Hamilton, who has also suffered a bunch of injuries in the past, is playing like a 21-year-old hitting the ball all over the place and many times right out of the place.

The baseball season is about six weeks old and Hamilton leads the major leagues in

batting average (.402), runs scored (30), home runs (18), runs batted in (41) and slugging percentage (.877).

He's also second in hits with 49 and on-base percentage (.457).

And don't forget that these numbers are not just for the American League – they are for all of baseball.

Hamilton recently became just the 16th player in history to hit four home runs in one game.

And here's another thing to contemplate. Hamilton graciously threw a baseball to a little kid in the stands last year. The kid's father reached out too far over the railing trying to catch it and fell to his death.

With all that Hamilton has to deal with on a daily basis, you think that image doesn't haunt him from time to time?

The good news is that though addiction is a daily struggle, Hamilton has turned his life around and proven the demons can at least be controlled – if not destroyed.

Maybe Josh Hamilton can be an example to others that the battle can be won, though I've heard the war can go on forever.

Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I want to apply for Medicare Part B medical insurance this year. When is the deadline to apply?

A: If you didn't sign up for Medicare Part B medical insurance when you first became eligible for Medicare, you now have an opportunity to apply — but time is running out. The deadline for applying during the general enrollment period is March 31. If you miss the deadline, you may have to wait until 2013 to apply. Medicare Part B covers some medical expenses not covered by Medicare Part A (hospital insurance), such as doctors' fees, outpatient hospital visits, and other medical supplies. You can learn more about Medicare by reading our electronic booklet, Medicare at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10043.htm.

Q: I know you need to have limited resources to receive Supplemental Security Income (SSI). But what is considered a "resource?"

A: Resources are things you own that you can use for support. They include cash, real estate, personal belongings, bank accounts, stocks, and bonds. To be eligible for SSI a person must have \$2,000 or less in countable resources. (A married couple must have \$3,000 or less in countable resources.) Not all of your resources count toward the SSI resource limit. For example:

- The home you live in and the land it's on do not count.
 - Your personal effects and household goods do not count.
 - Life insurance policies may not count, depending on their value.
 - Your car usually does not count.
 - Burial plots for you and members of your immediate family do not count.
 - Up to \$1,500 in burial funds for you and up to \$1,500 in burial funds for your spouse may not count. If you are blind or have a disability, some items may not count if you plan to use them to work or earn extra income.


