Bridge repair

A new maintenance project on I-10 will be in place starting Sunday, June 3. This project will consist of bridge deck repairs to the Geronimo overpass and Robert E. Lee overpass, as well as repairs to the associated approach slabs along with the installation of armor joints and bridge joint seals. The eastbound side of the Geronimo overpass will initially be repaired. Due to the intensity of the project, it will be necessary to close I-10 from 3 a.m. Sunday to 5 a.m. Monday morning between Airway and Geronimo. This closure is required in order to provide adequate time to perform the required repair work including saw cutting, concrete removal, installation of new concrete and bridge armor joints. The detour route will consist of eastbound traffic exiting off of I-10 at the Geronimo Exit Ramp and returning on to I-10 at the following entrance ramp. As the repair work progresses, crews will continue operations on the westbound lanes. These complete closures will occur every Sunday in June and the first four Sundays in July. Schedules subject to change due to weather conditions.

New Clint High School campus nears completion

CLINT – Of the nine school districts in El Paso County, Clint Independent School District (CISD) is the largest in square mileage (379.9 square miles) and is one of the fastest developing areas in the county. That is one reason the district is looking forward to the opening of its new Clint High School campus.

The new Clint High School is located at the corner of Alameda and Denton (13890 Alameda) on 65 acres of land and is scheduled to open its doors in August for the 2012-13

school year. A ribbon-cutting ceremony is planned for the new Clint High School in August, stated Laura Cade, CISD public information officer.

Cost to construct the new school is estimated at \$45 million, which was approved by the Clint Independent School District (CISD) Board of Trustees and funded through a bond issuance program passed by voters in 2006. Approximately 75 percent of this cost is being paid by the State's Instructional Facilities Allotment (IFA). About \$10 million of the cost is being paid by Clint ISD taxpayers.

CISD tax rate for 2010-2011 was \$1.33 per \$100 of taxable property value. The adopted

budget for that school year was \$74.4 million. The district currently serves more than 11,700 students.

Six hundred students are expected to attend the new high school when it opens this coming school year. "The 223,668 square-foot building can accommodate 940 students so there is plenty of room for growth," stated Cade.

The new campus includes the main building, agriculture science, automotive, JROTC, and stadium facilities. The school will have 22 regular classrooms, five science classroom/labs, four computer labs, an art room, auto collision lab, and 14 other special classrooms and labs, according to Cade.

Other special features of the new campus include inter-active smart boards in all classrooms, a spacious commons area, and multi-purpose gymnasiums for athletics and other events like staff development and indoor firing range competitions.

The campus will also have a cosmetology lab, a professional greenhouse, sealed-building envelopes, drought tolerant plants, and occupancy sensors in classrooms.

The new stadium will consist of a complete track and field area, artificial turf field, home bleachers with capacity to seat nearly 3,000 fans and visitors bleachers for over 1,500 fans. The stadium will also include a press box, concession outlets and restroom facilities.

The new CHS will have two gymnasiums – one of which is a competition gym, but both are designed as multi-use facilities for athletics, staff development, and other presentations, explained Cade.

The existing Clint High School, which opened in 1965, currently serves about 550 students. Once the new high school campus opens plans are to renovate the buildings and convert it into the Clint Junior High School campus. The present Clint Junior High School facility will be used to house the Clint Early College Academy, Cade stated.

Clint I.S.D. encompasses three major, separate and distinct communities – the Town of Clint, the town of Horizon City,

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the school district's tax rate that will be adopted. Public participation in the discussion is invited.

The school district has elected to adopt a tax rate before receiving the certified appraisal roll from the chief appraiser(s) of the appraisal district(s) and before adopting a budget. In accordance with Texas Tax Code, Section 26.05(g), the chief appraiser(s) of the appraisal district(s) in which the school district participates has (have) certified to the assessor for the school district an estimate of the taxable value of property in the school district as provided by the Texas Tax Code, Section 26.01(e). In accordance with the Texas Education Code, Section 44.004(j), following adoption of the tax rate, the school district will publish notice and hold another public meeting before the school district adopts a budget.

Unorthodox technique might help with PTSD

Meridian Tapping, also known as The Tapping Solution, is a 5,000-year-old Eastern medicine technique for releasing stresses, and now it's claimed to help with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder.

That's a big claim, considering how serious and disabling PTSD can be.

It seems simple enough: With the tips of your fingers, you tap certain spots on your face, jaw and head while stating the problem. Supposedly this releases your body's healing energy.

I normally don't pay much attention to what I call hocus-pocus cures, especially when they're claimed to work on multiple ailments (weight loss, smoking, chronic back pain and more). But there just might be something to this for PTSD, and I'll tell you my non-medical theory: By doing the tapping technique, you're forcing your mind to pay attention to a set of steps you do in a specific order. This gives your mind a few minutes of letting go of the stress caused by your particular trigger.

To get an idea how this works, go to www.thetappingsolution.com

and watch the four-minute video.

On that same webpage on the left is a link to get the free tapping ebook. You'll need to give your first name (make one up if you like) and an email address (using a throwaway address is a good way to cut down on all spam).

If all this technique does is genuinely reduce stress, that's not bad. If nothing else, send for the free ebook and watch the short video and trailer. Check YouTube.com for more videos and demonstrations.

While the Department of Veterans Affairs is quiet on this technique, some VA practitioners do offer tapping therapy. For further exploration, look at the Veterans Stress Project (www.stressproject.org). Under Find Help, you'll see practitioners in the VA.

and the unincorporated area known as East Montana. All together, the district has 13 campuses – three high schools, three middle schools, two junior high schools, one intermediate school, and five elementary schools.

The town of Clint is located in the fertile valley area on State Highway 20, approximately 18 miles southeast of El Paso. Horizon City is on the high desert plains at the midpoint

of the district. The East Montana areas, which are also situated in the high desert hills to the north, flank State Highways 62 and 180, about 24 miles to the north of Clint.

In 2010 Clint ISD received a "Recognized" District designation by the Texas Education Agency (TEA). Twelve of the Districts' campuses earned either "Exemplary", "Recognized" or "Acceptable" designations by TEA. All twelve campuses received at least one Gold Performance Acknowledgement for high performance on indicators used to determine accountability ratings.

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
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
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

Tire dumping must stop

Hola, mi gente. The May 21st Commissioners Court meeting had on its agenda an item dealing with clean up in areas on the far west and far east outside of the city of El Paso. The dialogue primarily dealt with funding that originated from the Rio Grande Council of Governments (COG).

The COG provides the cleanup money through grant programs that the state and federal governments offer. That funding has been dwindling significantly in the past several years so today and in the future the impetus for the cleanups will be local money.

One the biggest problems that has existed for decades is the dumping of scrap tires. I have seen dumped tires in clumps of a few dozen to over 19,000 tires. In working with TCEQ over a period of 18 months, my office filed a bill that addressed the specific concerns of the agency enforcement division. It was a bill that had support from a variety of entities. Unfortunately, the County of El Paso decided to strongly support a bill that required punching holes in tires; clearly an insignificant effort at eliminating tire dumping.

The problem with the current situation is that those individuals who transport tires are not regulated strongly. They have the option to take all of the tires on their truck to the location where tires are legally and properly disposed; or, they have the option to remove any tires at their discretion.

Through different provisions in the bill I filed, a transporter could be assessed criminal penalties for the first time for unlawfully disposing of tires. Because of the criminal aspect of the regulation, police and sheriff's deputies would have the option of stopping a transporter for reasons such as an improper display of its company on the truck; something that is required now but no one enforces it because it is a civil violation.

Although I will not be returning as the state representative for District 75 in the next session, I have spoken with candidates who are likely to be elected to that office. The bill could possibly be filed again and I hope that I can, in a different elected office, advocate for the support of that bill.

On top of pushing for the bill, I see opportunities for opening dialogues with the private sector for the purpose of getting monetary support for tire cleanups in addition to the other garbage that is dumped by independent contractors and by individuals who cannot, or will not pay the fees at the Clint landfill.

I look forward to pushing solutions that reduce tire dumps and other illegal dumping. Gracias, mi gente, and I remain your friend and public servant, Chente por la gente.

Buckling up: The simple choice that can save your life

'Click It or Ticket' safety campaign runs through Memorial Day

TEXAS - All of us are faced with hundreds, if not thousands, of decisions every day. Most don't involve life or death matters, but there is one simple decision that does have life-altering consequences. Choosing to wear a seat belt every time you're in a vehicle is one of those decisions. It's one act that can save your life or the life of someone you love. And it's also the law.

Whether you're the driver or a passenger sitting in the front seat or the back, Texas law now requires everyone in a vehicle to be secured by a seat belt. Children under the age of 8 must be in a child safety seat or booster seat unless they are taller than 4 feet 9 inches. Most Texans are buckling up, thanks to the Texas Department of Transportation's annual Click It or Ticket safety campaign. Every May, thousands of local law enforcement agencies join the Texas Department of Public Safety to ticket anyone who isn't wearing a seat belt or whose children aren't properly secured.

The threat of getting an expensive citation has been a powerful motivator to get more drivers and passengers to buckle up. Since the Click It or Ticket campaign began eleven years ago, the state's seat belt use rate has steadily climbed, and now almost 94 percent of motorists in Texas buckle up. The net effect is fewer deaths and injuries. TxDOT's crash statics indicate that 95 percent of the 778,448 Texans involved in crashes in 2010 where there were no injuries were wearing seat belts.

Texas now ranks seventh in the nation for seat belt use. In spite of all the progress we've made, one group of motorists remains significantly less likely to buckle up. That group is pickup truck drivers and passengers.

Since roughly one out of every four vehicles registered in Texas is a pickup truck and pickups are twice as likely as passenger vehicles to roll over in a crash, that's cause for concern.

According to a recent study by the Texas Transportation Institute, only 80 percent of pickup truck passengers buckle up. Compare that to the more than 90 percent of passengers in all other types of vehicles who regularly put on their seat belts. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration reports that half of pickup drivers who died in traffic crashes in 2010 were not wearing a seat belt.

Not buckling up doesn't make sense - financial or otherwise. While a ticket for not wearing a seat belt can cost anywhere from \$25 to \$250 plus court costs that drive up the expense even more, drivers and passengers who do not wear seat belts put themselves at risk for the greatest cost of all - serious injury or death. Depending on the type of vehicle, wearing a seat belt reduces the risk of fatal injury by up to 60 percent.

For motorists who need the extra incentive to buckle up, law enforcement will be out in force on Texas streets

and highways between May 21 and June 3 - including the Memorial Day holiday weekend - looking for and issuing a citation to drivers and passengers who aren't wearing seat belts. It comes down to this: if you're not buckled up, expect to pay up.

It doesn't matter what kind of vehicle you're in. It doesn't matter where you're sitting. It doesn't matter if it's day or night. The smart choice is to buckle up, every time, everywhere, and to make sure everyone in your vehicle does the same. Buckling up is the one simple decision that all of us can make every day to save not only our own lives but also those of our loved ones.

Click It or Ticket. It's the law.

So, naturally, when my card was punched during "Simon Says" at my birthday party, I called in the pre-negotiated "stay in the game, right?" card.

One look from my mom and I could see it was no dice.

So, yeah, I cried a little. Well... actually, according to one of the more extensive photo shoots my parents took during my early years,

I cried a lot. However, after years of therapy, I can finally say to myself – with conviction – that losing the game was not what bothered me the most.

cutting, measuring and welding together the 20x24-inch boxes made of wire mesh. The metal enrichment feeders are designed like puzzles to stimulate the elephants' brain activity and to encourage them to exercise.

The students worked in collaboration with Gabriela Moya, an elephant-area supervisor at the El Paso Zoo. Moya's son is in the welding class and also helped facilitate the project.

"I just want to thank you guys for coming out. You saw the elephants using them," Moya told the students. "You did a great job."

The students said they were proud to complete a project that helped the elephants.

"I feel excited and I'm very impressed," said Isabel Arana, a senior and welding student. "I really

enjoyed what we as a class did for them."

The students collaborated on the best design for the feeders, worked diligently on the project and refined their work along the way. The students agreed it was a great learning process and different from the ordinary daily routine.

"It feels great that we are actually helping out with the elephants and giving them something to do," said Aaron Padilla, a sophomore and welding student. "It was different and fun. I really liked it a lot."

The project was a beneficial collaboration for both the zoo and the welding students, said Travis Smith, an elephant keeper at the El Paso Zoo.

"They did a great job and it helps us out a lot," Smith said. "Otherwise, we would have had to hire a contractor and it would have cost quite a bit of money. It was a win-win situation for all of us."



Your good health By Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: I am 9 years old. I read what you said about dust mites. I am wondering if they can hurt me. Will they affect me in any way? Am I safe around them? One night I was snuggling my pillow pet, and my mom said, "Remember, it has dust mites." She gave me your article. I couldn't sleep that night, knowing that loads of dust mites were crawling around me. So tell me. Should I be afraid? What will happen? - T.M.C.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My husband and I have started walking every evening. It's our way of staying in shape. I like it. My husband actually listens to what I have to say when we walk. There is one thorn in my side, however. My husband insists that I don't walk correctly, and he is constantly giving me ways to change my walking style. It's extremely irritating. I have been walking the way I walk since I was an infant. Is there really a special way to do so? - R.C.

Have no fear, T.M.C. Dust mites have not done, are not doing and will not do anything harmful to you. I have them too. So does just about everyone. They're all over the world. They're less than one-hundredth of an inch, barely visible. They don't bite you. They feed on dead skin that has fallen off the body. They don't crawl in and out of your mouth, as the letter writer suggested.

Dust mites don't give you any illness, although some people are allergic to them and itch when exposed to them. In a very few people, they might trigger an asthma attack. None of this has happened to you or me. I don't think it ever will.

Dust mites need high humidity to survive, around 70 percent. You can cut down on their number if you keep your room humidity lower than that.

Don't try to get rid of them. They're part of the biological diversity that exists in our world. I don't know if they do us any good, but they don't do us any harm, aside from the allergy thing. Sleep in peace. I apologize for ruining a night's sleep for you.

Please don't ask me about bedbugs. They don't make people ill either, but they give me the creeps.

Most people develop a walk natural for them, and there's nothing wrong with that. Some general pointers about the proper walking style are worth incorporating into your walking pattern.

Keep your head erect with eyes focused about 20 feet in front of you. Your arms should be bent at the elbow. When the right foot hits the ground, the left arm should be in front of your body, and vice versa when your left foot hits the ground. The heel of the foot should strike the ground first, and the liftoff should come from the toes.

Older people tend to shorten their walking stride in an attempt to keep both feet always on the ground. This gives them more balance and stability. They should try to take a little longer stride and use their arms for balance and stability as I described above.

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: If both my spouse and I are entitled to Social Security benefits, is there any reduction in our payments because we are married?

A: No. We calculate lifetime earnings independently to determine each spouse's Social Security benefit amount, and couples are not penalized simply because they are married. When each member of a married couple meets all other eligibility requirements to receive Social Security retirement benefits, each spouse receives a monthly benefit amount based on his or her own earnings. If one member of the couple earned low wages or failed to earn enough Social Security credits to be insured for retirement benefits, he or she may be eligible to receive benefits as a spouse. Learn more about earning Social Security credits by reading our publication on the subject at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10072.html.

Q: Why doesn't my estimate using the Retirement Estimator take into account my work as a teacher? I've worked for 20 years for the state and thought it would count.

A: If you work for a state or local government agency — including a school system, college, or university — your earnings may not

be covered by Social Security. If you are covered only by your state or local pension plan and you don't pay Social Security taxes, your earnings won't be shown on your Social Security record. (Your record will show your Medicare wages if you pay into that program.) For information on how your pension from noncovered state or local employment may affect the amount of your Social Security benefit, you can visit www.socialsecurity.gov/retire2/wep-chart.htm

Q: I have never worked but my spouse has. What will my benefits be?

A: As a spouse, you may be entitled to one-half of a retired worker's benefit amount when you reach full retirement age. If you want to get a Social Security retirement benefit as early as age 62, the amount of your benefit is reduced. The amount of reduction depends on when you will reach full retirement age.


