Crime Stoppers

A family has problems with a neighbor over their dog getting out of its yard, ending in the death of the dog about a week later, making this the Crime Stoppers "Crime of the Week." About 7:30 a.m. on Wednesday, May 23, 2012, officers from the Horizon City Police Department were called to a home in the 140 block of Desert Mesa in reference to animal cruelty. Arriving officers met with the family who said their dog was dead, and that they had received a threatening note regarding the dog in the previous week. The day after the note was delivered, the dog disappeared and was not seen again until it was found dead on the morning of May 23. The note, from the previous week, complained about the dog's feces evidently having been found on a neighborhood yard. There have been no clues as to who might have taken the dog, or if that person was responsible for the cruel nature of the dog's death. Anyone in the neighborhood, who may have seen or heard something suspicious, particularly relating to anger about a loose dog, is urged to contact Crime Stoppers as soon as possible. Alarcon ES turns 75

SAN ELIZARIO – The campus of Lorenzo G. Alarcon Elementary School in the San Elizario Independent School District (SEISD) had just a little more to celebrate at the finale of the 2011-2012 school year. The oldest school in the district, you see, also completed 75 years of existence. Staff, faculty and students held a daylong celebration to mark the end of the school year with a special anniversary celebration that also included the dedication of a sidewalk and walkway leading to the Alarcon Park.

According to Assistant Principal, Yvette Hernandez, the planning committee wanted to incorporate something into the celebration that would be meaningful for students. The campus administration had always wanted to add a sidewalk from the Main Street and Socorro Road intersection to be used by students walking to the park for P.E. classes and during lunch. Hernandez added that every time it rained, the entrance to the

park and surrounding area would become muddy and difficult to cross.

Hernandez was able to contact Ricardo Romero with the Texas Department of Transportation in El Paso who commissioned the installation of a sidewalk. However, she was not sure when or if the project would be completed before the end of the school year. Unexpectedly she received a call from the security guard one day who told her that a crew was working on the sidewalk. Hernandez quickly rushed over to have a look and struck up a conversation with the contractors. Those contractors turned out to be Hector Luna from Black Stallion Construction and Abel Ortiz from GarCom who agreed to donate their services to add 60 feet of sidewalk to connect the easement on Socorro Rd. and the Alarcon Park entrance. The entire project was completed before May 25, just in time to hold a dedication ceremony before the last day of school.

"The new sidewalk has been a huge benefit to the students

Clint Early College Academy opens in August

CLINT – The first day of school for the 2012-13 academic year is Monday, Aug. 27 in Clint ISD.

It will be a first in more ways than one:

· As outlined in a May 24 article in the *County Courier*, it will be first day/opening day for the new Clint High School.

· Equally important it will also mark the opening day for the Clint Early College Academy. And there is a connection between the two.

The district's Early College Academy is the sixth such unique academic endeavor in El Paso area school districts. More commonly called early college high schools, the program is a collaborative effort with El Paso Community College, the Greater Texas

Foundation, the Meadows Foundation and the Texas High School Project.

"With the opening of Clint ISD's Early College Academy, more students in the El Paso area will have a chance at greater opportunities which will ultimately benefit families, the region and our state in the years ahead," says John Fitzpatrick, executive director of the Texas High School Project.

The Early College Academy, whose name will be The Patriots, will be housed in what was the junior high school building in Clint. There will be 115 students in the first academy class. The class will be largely from CISD, with some coming from private schools, says Dr. Edward Gabaldon, superintendent of the Clint district.

In the academic choreography, the junior high students will move to the old high school building nearby. It will become a junior high campus, and the former junior high students become the first freshman class in the new high school.

"This (early college academy) is a wonderful opportunity, a unique opportunity," Gabaldon said in an earlier *Courier* interview.

The "unique opportunity" is a four-year program that allows students to earn not one, but two degrees when they graduate from high school. The first is the high school diploma. At the same time, by taking special credit courses,

Strong winds destroy Marfa TARS balloon

WEST TEXAS – It's going to take a while to get another U.S. Air Force aerostat radar system to monitor the vast Southwestern border along the Presidio, Big Bend terrain where mountain ranges and desert shrubs sprawl for thousands of desolate miles- making it a convenient pathway for illegal low flying aircraft to enter the U.S. undetected.

The aerostat radar system in use for the past decade was destroyed recently when a gust

of wind caught the flight crew unprepared, according to an official report. The \$8.8 million aerostat was a total loss; however, there were no injuries or significant damage to government or private property, stated Air Combat Command (ACC) officials.

On February 14, the Tethered Aerostat Radar System (TARS) was floating between Marfa and Valentine, Texas (about 200 miles east of El Paso) where it was monitoring for low-flying aircraft suspected of smuggling illegal narcotics from Mexico.

A six-hour weather forecast predicted high wind gusts in the area, but the flight director

made a late decision to recover the aerostat and moor it to the ground. The delayed recovery of the Air Force-operated tethered aerostat radar system caused the aerostat to break away and crash during high winds.

According to the ACC accident investigation board's report that was released recently, the mishap's cause was the aerostat flight director's "late decision to recover the aerostat despite receiving a six-hour weather forecast predicting high wind gusts."

Turbulence and winds on the aerostat during

Help for spouses

Spouses and family members of veterans who need services and benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs are often the ones who have to deal with the paperwork. Having a source for information and assistance can be immensely helpful.

A fairly new website is shaping up to be a one-stop source of information for the spouses of veterans. "The Veterans Spouse, Resources for the Family" at www.vetsspouse.com was started by two women, one the wife and daughter of career military veterans, and the other the wife of a soon-to-be veteran. While the site is just now up and running, it's loaded with information that can help you.

Here's a partial list of contents:

- How to file an appeal, along with a sample letter.
- A template for general letters, along with a link to correct addresses to send them to.
- A simplified guide to burial benefits.
- Information on caregiver benefits and lots of links.
- Eligibility for the death pension.

- Clothing allowance for veterans with a prosthetic or special cream medication, with link to application.
- Substitution of Claimant: If a veteran dies during the benefits process, another person, a family member, may apply to continue the claim.
- Fiduciary appointment, when the VA decides it will appoint someone else to handle a veteran's finances.
- An Overview of Civilian Health and Medical Program of the Department of Veterans Affairs (CHAMPVA).
- Child-support information (No, it's not protected. Veterans must pay court-ordered support.)
- How to handle apportionment (garnishment of benefits).

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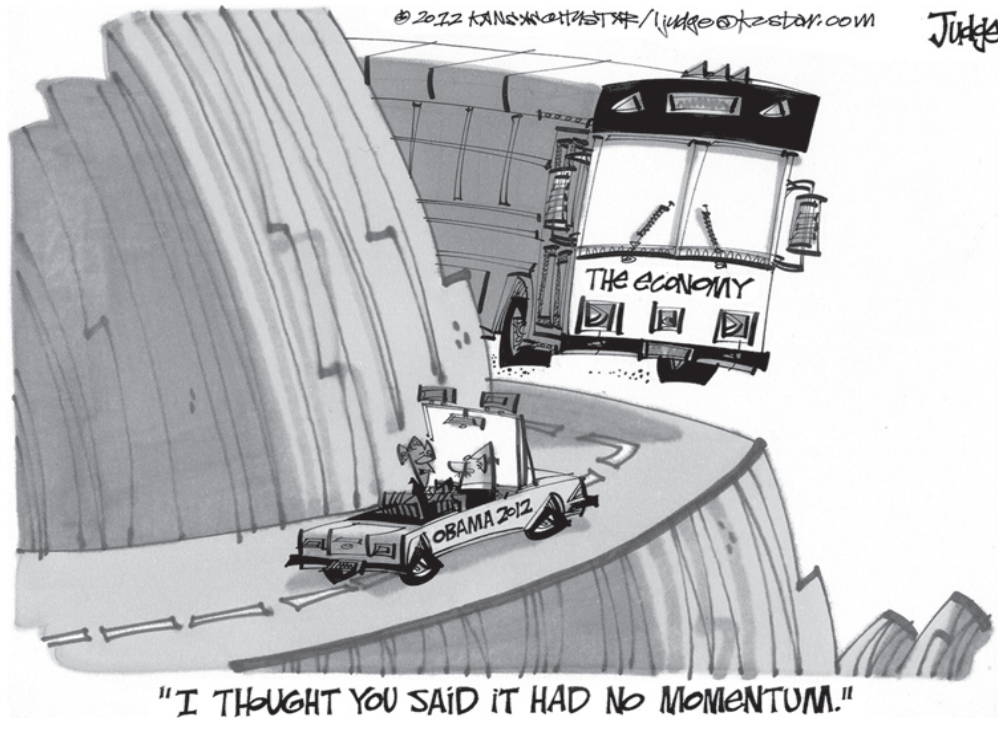


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Baca brothers sentenced for fuel theft

EL PASO COUNTY – Three men who conspired to steal \$290,000 worth of aviation fuel from Biggs Army Airfield in El Paso have been sentenced to federal prison time after an extensive investigation by federal authorities and the Texas Comptroller’s office. A fourth was sentenced to federal probation.

The Comptroller’s Criminal Investigation Division (CID) helped gather evidence and worked with investigators from the Department of Defense - Criminal Investigation Service; Internal Revenue Service - Criminal Investigations; U.S. Department of Transportation - Office of the Inspector General; and U.S. Army Criminal Investigation Command - Major Procurement Fraud Unit.

Comptroller Susan Combs has enhanced the role of CID to help federal investigations along with pursuing criminal activity on state taxes.

“Federal investigators can leverage our expertise in catching tax cheats to help with their investigations, and we are glad to help them every chance we can,” Combs said. “We have statutory authority to share state tax information that can help federal investigators gain insight into the operations of a business.

This ensures that law enforcement has every mechanism possible to prosecute criminals.”

Two of the four men involved in the conspiracy, Tomas Quintero and Luis Campos, were employees of a contractor that provided fuel to military and federal civilian aircraft at Biggs Army Airfield. The remaining co-defendants, brothers Fernando J. Baca and Richard Baca, owned gravel truck companies.

From 2007 to 2010, Quintero and Campos conspired to steal aviation fuel from Biggs Army Airfield and sold it to the Baca brothers who used it for their commercial gravel trucks.

After pleading guilty in March to one count of conspiracy to commit theft and one count of tax evasion, Quintero was sentenced May 31 to 30 months in federal prison. Campos, who pled guilty in March to conspiracy to commit theft, was sentenced to four months in federal prison. Fernando Baca pled guilty to conspiracy to commit theft and IRS-related charges, and received 15 months in prison. Richard Baca was sentenced to 5 years probation for conspiracy to commit theft.

The defendants were also ordered to pay restitution to the Defense Logistics Agency, U.S. Department of Transportation and Internal Revenue Service. Quintero was ordered to pay \$362,134; Campos, \$318,328; Fernando Baca, \$343,832, and Ricardo Baca, \$83,815.

In the last few months Comptroller investigators assisted in several investigations around the state that have resulted in federal indictments, including ten Austin-area residents on federal drug and money laundering charges.

Father’s Day

The CSD demonstrates its commitment to fathers by recognizing the important and irreplaceable role they play in their children’s lives. Several notable resources that serve Texas fathers include:

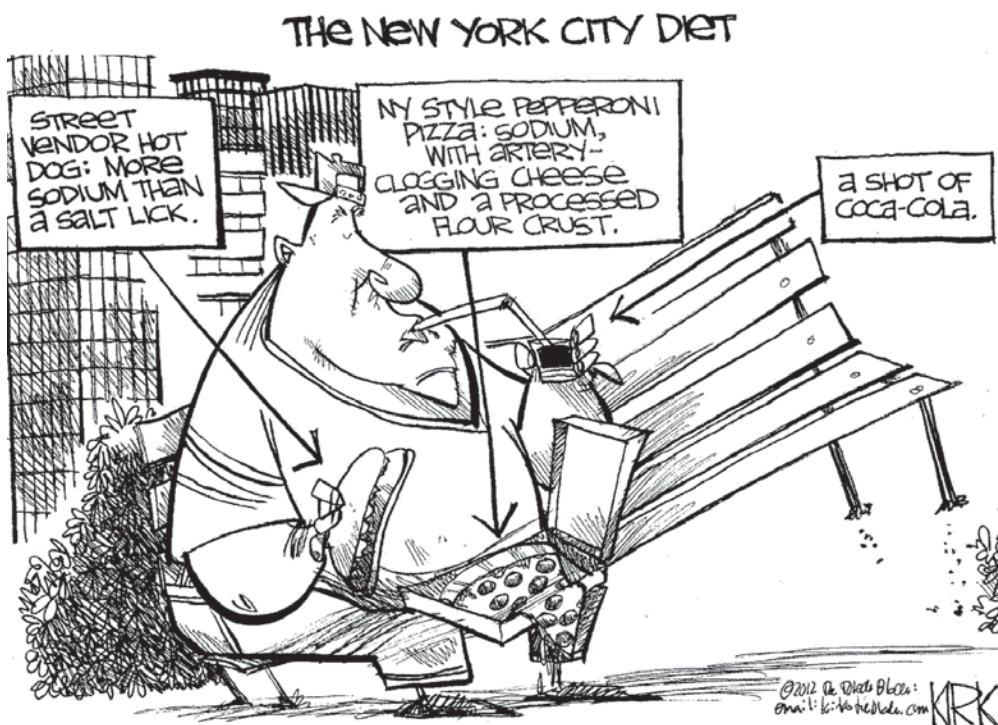

The Office of the Attorney General (OAG) trains and certifies hospital and birthing center employees to assist parents with the Acknowledgment of Paternity process so that the child will have a legal father right from the start. Last year, POP gave more than 124,000 Texas children a good start in life by helping their fathers establish legal paternity.

Maps for New Dads: Handbook for Expectant and New Fathers is a publication designed to help expecting dads transition

into fatherhood. Maps covers everything from what to expect on a prenatal visit to making homes “baby safe” — all in a manner designed to reinforce the special role fathers play. Additional resources developed by the OAG include posters recognizing the important role fathers play, a Parenting Together Handbook for New Parents and the For Our Children DVD.

Access and Visitation programs promote non-custodial parents’ access to and visitation with their children, when appropriate, through a variety of shared parenting projects. Awarding grant funding to local organizations is one way the Attorney General’s Office can help children whose parents are engaged in custody or visitation disputes, since federal funding to run the child support program cannot be used to handle these issues. The services provided under this grant include early intervention, co-parenting education, mediation and enforcement. The OAG also funds a toll-free assistance hotline, (866) 292-4636, and provides a Web-based directory of services available in Texas communities.

The Parenting and Paternity Awareness (p.a.p.a.) program is an innovative educational curriculum designed for secondary school students and young adults. The p.a.p.a. program focuses on the “rights, responsibilities and realities of parenting.” Key themes in the curriculum focus on the importance of father involvement, the value of paternity establishment, the legal realities of child support, the financial and emotional challenges of single parenting, the benefits of both parents being involved in a child’s life, healthy relationship skills and relationship violence prevention.

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The Marfa Tethered Aerostat Radar System (TARS) site is located on a 23-acre parcel of land in Presidio County, Texas, approximately twenty miles northwest of the city of Marfa. The property where the equipment is situated is privately owned by a local rancher. The use of the land and the operation of the Marfa TARS are in accordance with the provisions outlined in a 2008 Lease Agreement between the landowner and the United States Air Force. The TARS site is operated and maintained by a contractor, ITT Exelis.

the rapid retrieval efforts caused a 40-degree left roll and a 60-degree nose-low pitch-over, according to ACC's report. This, coupled with the severe cable tension, caused the aerostat to nosedive and impact private property approximately 100 yards northeast of the TARS site, the report stated.

The report stated further that the flight director's lack of training on weather data interpretation and the use of equipment, along with an erroneous wind warning cancellation, contributed to the crash.

The helium-filled balloon, or TARS, is a stationary radar platform that can detect low-altitude aircraft. It is used along the U.S.-Mexico border in support of the Defense Department's counterdrug program and provides data to U.S. Southern Command and the North American Aerospace Defense Command's air sovereignty mission.

TARS not only provides detection and monitoring capabilities along the United States-Mexico border, but also throughout the Florida Straits, and a portion of the Caribbean.

The operational sites are located at Marfa, Eagle Pass and Rio Grande City, Texas, as well as at Yuma and Fort Huachuca, Ariz.; Deming, N.M.; Cudjoe Key, Fla.; and Lajas, Puerto Rico. The contract management office is located in Newport News,

Va. and the logistics hub is located in El Paso, Texas.

Intelligence sources report that dramatic decreases in the amount of airborne drug traffic since the first Southwest border antidrug balloon went up in 1987. And, the aerostats are considered the "most cost-effective counter-narcotics detection and monitoring asset" in use today along the New Mexico-Arizona-California border with Mexico.

The TARS network was established in 1984 by the U.S. Customs Service to help counter illegal drug trafficking. The first antidrug aerostat went operational in 1985 at High Rock Grand Bahamas Island. The second site was built at Fort Huachuca, Ariz., in 1986.

The primary agencies using the TARS surveillance data include U.S. Northern Command in support of Customs and Border Protection (Air and Marine Operations Center and Caribbean Air and Marine Operations Center) and U.S. Southern Command in support of Joint Interagency Task Force-South. In addition to its counterdrug mission, TARS surveillance data also supports North American Aerospace Defense Command's air sovereignty mission for the continental United States.

Meanwhile, the Marfa aerostat flight crew will have to wait indefinitely for a replacement. And, it seems that it's open airspace for low flying planes along the vast southwestern border.

And it was.

Many sporting organizations in attendance had the champion winning about 9 or 10 of the 12 rounds to earn himself an easy victory.

But shockingly, or maybe not so shockingly after all, two of the three judges gave the narrow decision to Bradley.

Everyone in the boxing community is upset with the decision but guess what, it appears that there will be a rematch in November.

And guess what else, fans will be dumb enough to invest their hard-earned money into watching part two of this boxing fiasco.

Boxing has become so corrupt that it is allowed to go about its unsavory business without even a thought of getting caught.

Women weaken legs

Mickey Goldmill didn't have too many rules for his fighters. But the ones he did have, he pretty much expected them to heed and obey.

To lighten the load on his punch-drunk stable, he kept it very simple: Either listen to him, or he's leaving you all alone when you try and fight the big fight.

Rocky Balboa, a heavyweight southpaw with a 44-20 record, learned that the hard way. He wasn't impressed with Rocky's hoodlum life and booted him from the gym.

“You're a bum,” Goldmill declares.

But we all know how this story ends. By a freak chance, Rocky is given a shot at the title, and Goldmill gets back in Rocky's corner – but with a few caveats: 1) He must catch a chicken with his bare hands and, 2) He must keep his hands off of the ever-so-cute pet-shop clerk Adrian.

“Women weaken legs!” Goldmill warned. These harpies will sap your physical strength by bogging you down in bed: They'll sap your testosterone dry, wreak havoc with your mind and do all of these things just before your championship bout.

True or not, that rule (which many scientists dispute, but what do they know about science?) was dragged out onto the mats and body-slammed 11 years later by Linda Fiorentino in the '80s era classic “Vision Quest.”

“Rocky” is arguably the best boxing movie in history, but when it comes to the world of wrestling

– real wrestling, not the Saturday-morning cartoon stuff – there is absolutely no doubt that “Vision Quest” takes the title.

Matthew Modine (playing Loudon Swain in the film) exhibits the hunger and desire of a champion in ways far more complex than Sly Stallone's Rocky did. His character is a classic portrayal of the hyper-hormonal, mentally mangled, girl-crazy high-school wrestler. Unlike Stallone's Rocky, however, Modine's Loudon Swain actively pursues his fight with the seemingly unbeatable “Shute” and does so for classic guy reasons: Because he's there and because Linda Fiorentino said so.

Talia Shire, the Zoëy Deschanel of her day, melted our hearts when she told Rocky to “win, Rocky, win.” Fiorentino (a native Philadelphian, by the way), lights us on fire when she breaks into the men's locker room and orders Loudon to stand up to Shute and “kick his ass.”

Sure, some women might weaken legs, but the ones that fuel your desire and threaten to break your legs if you don't win? All apologies to Mickey Goldmill, his well-tested theories and Jennifer Grey who, as “Baby” would never be caught dead in one, when it comes to a babe like Linda Fiorentino, it's probably best to have her in your corner, ya know?

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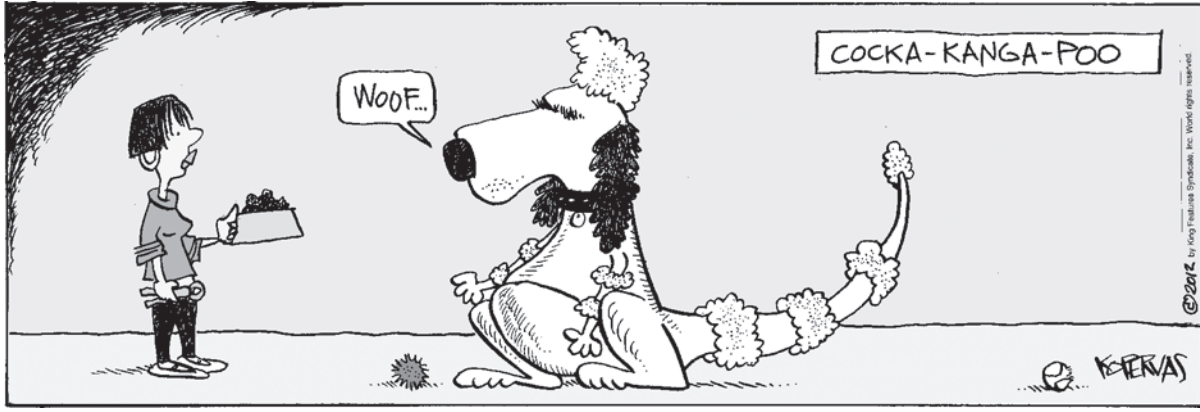
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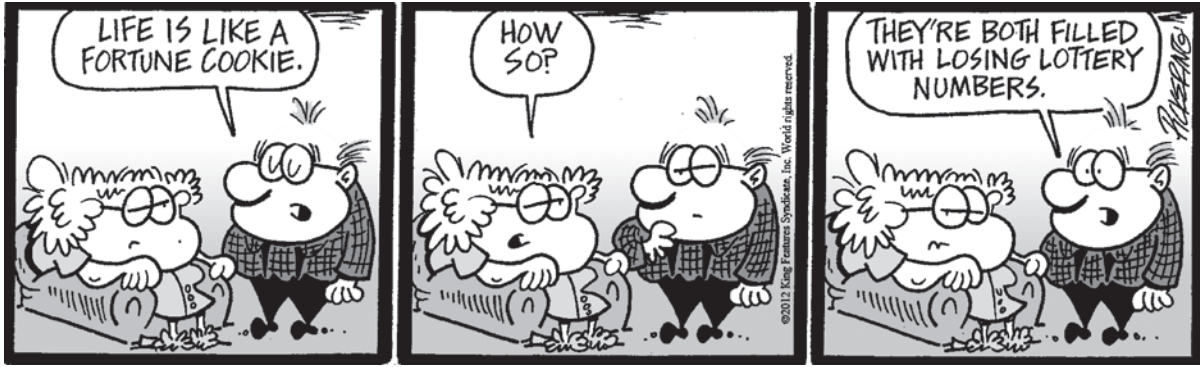

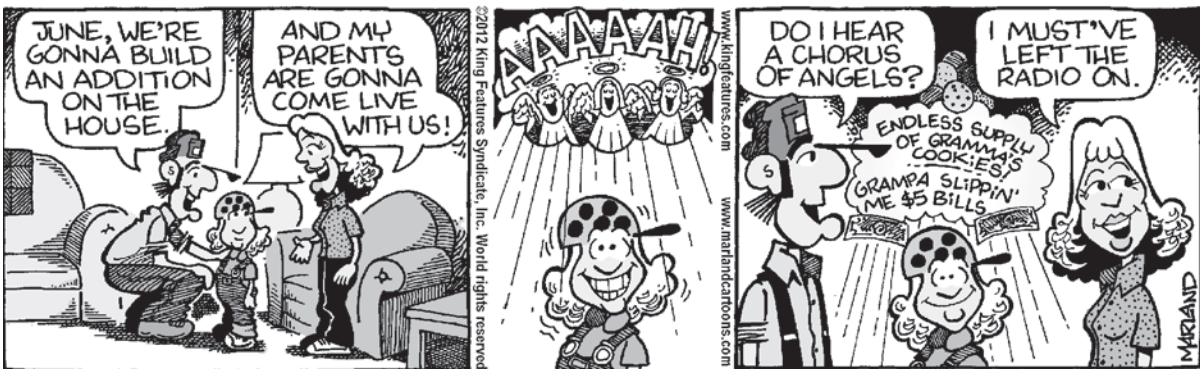

Your good health By Paul G. Donahue, M.D.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: Will you please say a few words about the prognosis and treatment of cervical cancer? My daughter, 45, was told at a recent checkup that she has a few cells of this kind, and she is reacting as if she has received a death sentence. Since it was caught early, should her outlook be more cheerful? – J.B.

All women are indebted to Dr. George Papanicolaou, who developed the Pap smear for the early detection of cervical cancer. The cervix, by the way, is the necklike projection of the uterus into the vagina. It was the site for the most common cause of cancer death in women before the Pap smear came into wide use. That was in the early 1940s. Since then, deaths from cervical cancer have been cut in half, with about 4,200 deaths occurring annually and 12,200 new cases detected each year. Most of the deaths are in women who did not have Pap smear testing.

I'm not clear what you mean by "a few cells of this kind." If the cells obtained on a smear show low-grade changes, a woman's chances of having cervical cancer are close to zero. Follow-up smears are the only treatment needed. If the cells show high-grade changes, the doctor will perform a colposcopy. Colposcopy is an examination of the cervix with an instrument that has a magnifying lens so suspicious areas can be readily seen and biopsied. Results determine what the next steps should be. However, at these stages – long before the cancer has spread – it is still quite curable.

Your daughter can trust her doctor to take the appropriate steps depending on the results of her Pap test. She does not face a death sentence. If she has any questions about her diagnosis,

she should call her doctor for an explanation of her test results.

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: My husband and I are both 28. We have one child, a son. My husband felt a lump in his testicle and saw our family doctor. It turned out to be cancer. He was operated on. The doctor discussed many things with us, but we never discussed the prognosis. We need to know: What's the usual life span of someone who has had testicular cancer? – L.R.

If your husband had a seminoma, one of the common varieties of testicular cancer, and if it was in its early stages, your husband's chances of living a long, full life are very high, over 95 percent.

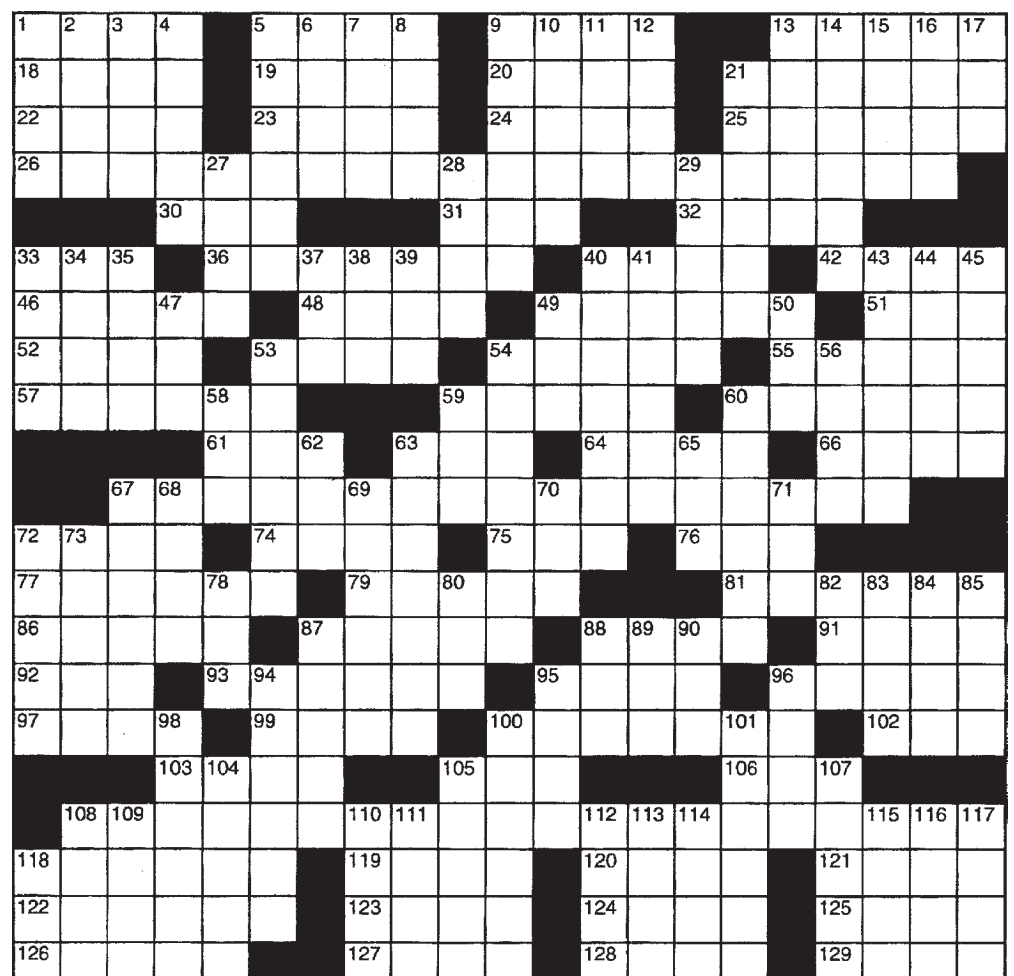
Your husband's story is something that all young men should take to heart. Testicular cancer is a cancer of young men, most often males between the ages of 15 and 35. The earliest sign is a small, painless lump in the testicle.

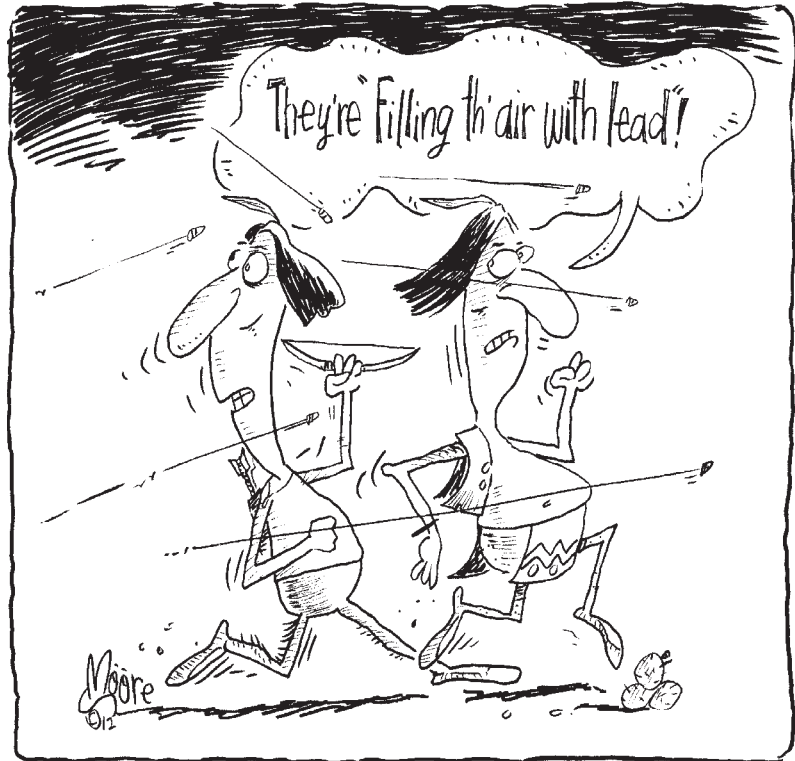

Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Give Dad some extra help this Father's Day

You can probably think of a number of times when you asked your dad for a little extra help. Now, with Father's Day right around the

corner, is the perfect time to offer a little extra help for Dad. People across the nation are helping their dads save nearly \$4,000 a year on the cost of Medicare prescription drugs. You can help your dad too — and it won't cost you a dime.

The high cost of prescription medication can be a burden on fathers (or anyone) who have limited income and resources. But there is *Extra Help* — available through Social Security — that could pay part of his monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments. That *Extra Help* is estimated to be worth about \$4,000 a year.

To figure out whether your father is eligible, Social Security needs to know his income and the value of his savings, investments, and real estate (other than the home he lives in). To qualify for the *Extra Help*, he must be enrolled in Medicare and have:

- Income limited to \$16,755 for an individual or \$22,695 for a married couple living together. Even if his annual income is higher, he still may be able to get some help with monthly premiums, annual deductibles, and prescription co-payments. Some examples where income may be higher include if he or his spouse:

- Support other family members who live with them;
- Have earnings from work; or
- Live in Alaska or Hawaii.

Resources are limited to \$13,070 for an individual or \$26,120 for a married couple living together. Resources include such things as bank accounts, stocks, and bonds. We do not count his house and a car (if he has one) as resources.

Social Security has an easy-to-use online application that you can help complete for your dad. You can find it at www.socialsecurity.gov/prescriptionhelp. To apply by phone or have an application mailed to you, call Social Security at 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778) and ask for the Application for Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs (SSA-1020). Or go to the nearest Social Security office.

To learn more about the Medicare prescription drug plans and special enrollment periods, visit www.medicare.gov or call 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227; TTY 1-877-486-2048).

the second is an associate's degree through EPCC.

The Early College Academy was one of only several topics touched on by the district superintendent.

Gabaldon was like a proud father bragging on the accomplishments of his children as he recalled academic and athletic achievements of his students. "Everywhere we turned, Clint kids were successful," he says. "They make me the proudest," he beams.

The success of the students was somewhat of a "problem." It put a strain on the budgeted funds to send students the events.

Success was also measured in approximately 600 certificates that he and board president Jim Pendell had to sign for students honored at a recent meeting of the board of trustees.

"The kids are well behaved; they are our greatest ambassadors."

However, the students are not the only ones that the superintendent

brags on.

Donna Cline, executive director of business services, was praised for her achievements in handling the district's financial resources in the wake of a shortfall of funds from the state. "It didn't take us by surprise.

"We had our own rainy day fund."

Gabaldon said the district had to cut back a little over \$7 million, and did so without having to lay off personnel. "We are proud of that." On top of that, he adds that the district was also able to give employees a 2 percent pay raise.

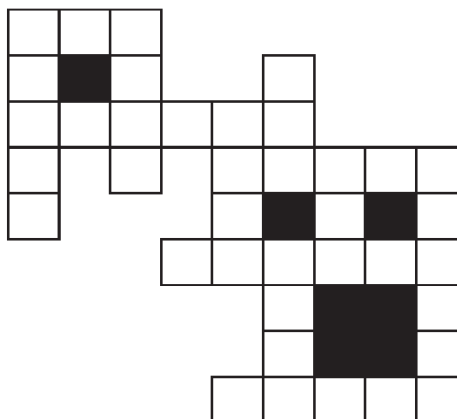
