### Tax help

# Don't fall for Valentine's Day scams

On Valentine's Day, people's emotions run all over the map – some are head-over-heels and want to shower their loved one with gifts, while others are despondent because currently they have no one special in their life.

Whatever your love status, one thing everyone needs to guard against at this time of year is scams. Valentine's Day brings out

the best – and worst – in human behavior. Our impulse is to be generous and search for the ideal gift. Internet thieves know this and coolly set traps for unsuspecting shoppers. And, not surprisingly, dating websites experience greater activity, along with a corresponding increase in relationship scammers. Here are some of the more common Valentine's Day scams to

avoid:

- Electronic greeting cards are popular year-round, especially near holidays. Scammers count on

you not paying attention when you receive an email with an innocuous subject line like, "Someone you know just sent you an e-card."

Unless you're certain someone sent you an e-card, never click

on links or follow instructions to download software to open the message. Chances are you'll load a virus or malware onto your computer, dooming you to receive endless spam or even endangering your personal and financial information.

Valentine's Day is the busiest day of the year for florists. Since many people now order flowers online, these purchases are a common target for fraud. A few tips when choosing a florist:

- Make sure the physical location, contact information and fees for the florist who's actually fulfilling your order are fully disclosed.

- Pay by credit card so if there's a problem you can dispute it with your card issuer.

- If you receive an email saying there's a problem with your order, call the florist to make sure it's legitimate; don't click on any links – they could be malware.

Beware of emails and social media ads touting great deals on other Valentine's themed gifts like chocolates, jewelry or lingerie. Unless you've previously done business with a company that legitimately has your email address, be skeptical. Watch out for minor typos in the web address – www.macys.comm instead of www.macys.com, for example.

It's no coincidence that dating websites are busier during the winter holidays and leading up to Valentine's Day. Lonely people's defenses are lowered, making them vulnerable to online romance scams. Before they know it, victims are conned into sharing personal or financial information, or lending money – money they'll never see again.

I'm not saying don't pursue love online at legitimate dating sites. Just watch out for these warning signs:

- They want to move your conversations off the dating site immediately and use personal email or instant messaging – the better to avoid policing by the site's Webmaster.

- Their online profile sounds too good to be true. That's because they've probably shaped it to reflect your stated preferences. Or, conversely, their profile may be suspiciously sketchy on details or their photos don't seem genuine.

- They profess love very quickly, even before you've spoken or met.

- They claim to be a U.S. citizen working overseas – often in the military.

- They make plans to visit, but are suddenly prevented by a traumatic family or business event – one which your money can overcome.

Bottom line: Don't let your emotions get the better of your common sense when it comes to matters of the heart. For more tips on spotting and reporting online scams, visit the Federal Trade Commission's website ([www.ftc.gov](http://www.ftc.gov)).

# Homeless vets get big boost in aid

The Department of Veterans Affairs has printed in the Federal Register its intention to provide a record \$300 million to address veteran homelessness for both fiscal years 2014 and 2015. The money will go to non-profit organizations in the Supportive Services for Veteran Families program that work with homeless veterans and their families.

The list of areas where these groups provide assistance is lengthy: Moving and relocation expenses, child care, rent and utilities for those who are homeless or at risk of becoming homeless, transportation, housing counseling, advocating with property owners, security deposits and emergency expenses. In 2013 alone, SSVF assisted 39,000 veterans and 62,000 veterans with families.

Once the veteran and his or her family are in permanent housing, the program continues, assisting the veteran with medical care, benefits and services, daily living, financial planning, legal services and more.

While veteran homelessness has declined by 24 percent since 2009, in January 2013 there still

were 57,849 homeless veterans on the street. More than 7 percent of those veterans were women.

If your non-profit organization wants to qualify to provide support services to homeless or very low-income veterans and their families, start online at [www.va.gov/homeless/ssvf.asp](http://www.va.gov/homeless/ssvf.asp). There is a lengthy process to be accepted into the program. You also can call 877-737-0111 or via email at [SSVF@va.gov](mailto:SSVF@va.gov). Work quickly because your application has to be received by March 14, 2014. Grants are for three years and will begin Oct. 1, 2014.

If you're a veteran who is homeless or at risk to be homeless, call 1-877-424-3838 (4AIDVET). Someone will answer 24/7, and many of those who respond are veterans themselves. For information about VA and DOD programs for brain injury, go to [www.dvbic.org](http://www.dvbic.org)

# Aguirre named executive director of Region 19 Education Service Center

EL PASO COUNTY – Region 19 Education Service Center’s (ESC) Board of Directors recently named Dr. Armando Aguirre as the lone finalist to be its executive director. In accordance with state law, the appointment does not become official until a 21-day waiting period, making his start date any time after February 7, officials said.

Aguirre replaces Jimmy Vasquez, who retired last year after 16 years at the helm of the center. Region 19 ESC, which is one of 20 in the state, serves as a link between local school districts and the Texas Education Agency (TEA).

Since 2012, Aguirre has been the assistant provost of the El Paso Collaborative for Academic Excellence, which runs programs that help students graduate from high school prepared to enter a four-year college or university. The collaborative is based out of the College of Education at the University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP).

Aguirre, who has dedicated more than 25

years to educating this region’s children, is a graduate of UTEP. He has a bachelor’s degree in education, a master’s degree in administration, and an education doctoral in leadership.

Aguirre started his teaching career as a journalism teacher at Jefferson High School and worked his way up to principal at several schools in the El Paso Independent School District (EPISD).



In 2005 Aguirre was named Principal of the Year for the state by the Texas Association of Secondary School Principals while working at Wiggs Middle School.

Aguirre left Wiggs to become principal of Socorro Independent School District’s Mission Early College High School, which was the first early college program in the region. Early college high schools allow students to earn a two-year college degree while also earning a high-school diploma. Today, there are early college programs in five area school districts.

As Region 19 ESC executive director, Aguirre will be responsible for helping teachers and school administrators develop in areas such as technology, special education, and administrative leadership.

## Canutillo seniors earn prestigious UTEP scholarships

CANUTILLO –Three Canutillo High School (CHS) seniors, Adam Menchaca, Cesar Nunez and Isaac Hoffman, were awarded presidential scholarships totaling \$38,000 from the University of Texas at El Paso. The boys received their surprise awards during a reception held at CHS in December.

These three CHS seniors were chosen from a field of 4,800 applicants. To qualify for a UTEP Presidential Scholarship, students needed to be in the top 3 percent of their class, hold a 96 GPA, achieve at least a 1220 on the SAT or a 27 on the ACT. In addition, the Presidential Excellence Scholarship also requires exceptional leadership abilities and achievements.

Representatives from the Scholarships office at UTEP presented Hoffman with a \$1,500 per year for his scholarship award,

which is a total award of \$6,000. Menchaca and Nunez were both awarded a \$4,000 per year Presidential Excellence Scholarship, which is a total award of \$16,000 each.

According to senior class counselor Sandy Honts, this was only the first round of scholarships awarded by UTEP. She encourages all seniors to continue to apply for scholarships, because the second round of awards will be given in the spring. It is also important for students to know that they should apply yearly for scholarships, even when they are already enrolled in a college or university.

“We are so proud of the accomplishments of these students. We want all our CHS students to understand that putting hard work into academics will pay off for them in the long run. Adam, Cesar and Isaac had to earn these scholarships; they were not just given to them. These students are just a few of the many outstanding students on our campus and I congratulate them for their achievements,” said Dino Coronado, CHS Principal.

Remember that the Miners suffered potentially devastating losses of several key players before the season even started.

That, no doubt, would spell doom for the basketball season.

And though the Miners recorded some impressive victories over Tennessee, Washington State and Colorado State, and fought Kansas to a close loss, they also stumbled through some disappointing defeats to the likes of New Orleans and an exhibition to Angelo State.

But just when the program thought things couldn't get any worse... they did.

The Miners started 2014 with the news that three more players were kicked out of school

for gambling on sporting events.

The team is closer, the bench is into the game like never before and the team is in first place.

All this started when the three guys – who were breaking the rules – were dismissed by the team.

I get it now, "addition by subtraction."

You always run a risk when you write columns like this. Sochi very well could have a Munich moment. And the world can be a very dangerous place filled with human rage. But I'd

have gone in a heartbeat... and this is coming from a survivor of the Olympic Park bombing in Atlanta.

Yeah, I was in the Centennial Olympic Park with a friend watching one of the musical acts. I do not recall the name of the band, but I remember the one that followed... Jack Mack and the Heart Attack. We decided we weren't interested. Besides, there was so much more to see, and I was, in fact, paid to be there and had access to the Olympic Village. The bomb went off as we were driving off in a taxi. Maybe that doesn't qualify me as a "survivor,"

but we were within range of the bomb that killed two people and injured 111 others that night.

There was never a serious consideration of halting the Games, but there was a constant air of threat for the rest of the week. Security for the Olympic Village, which was located on the Georgia Tech campus, tightened, but I still went every day. I got a chance to see hip-hop pioneers Run DMC play the Olympian's laundromat (yes ... laundromat). On another day, Ziggy Marley played underneath a tree like a busker. Hootie and the Blowfish also played a free concert. But the

real rock stars were the athletes... everyone was so in awe of them.

The Dream Team? Forget it, you couldn't get near those guys. But I witnessed Kerri Strug's winning vault on a broken ankle, and scored a hug from Mary Lou Retton. I wouldn't trade those memories for anything. So what I'm trying to say is, if you have a chance to go to Sochi, definitely do go. There are some things you don't want to miss... near misses and all.


## Villela signs with ENMU

Villela is the third Eagle in as many years to receive a scholarship to ENMU. Andrew Canales (class of 2012) and Mario Balderrama (class of 2013) are currently in the ENMU roster.

"This speaks volumes to the quality of players we produce here in Canutillo," Brooks said. "Eastern New Mexico keeps coming back to us because they know that in our kids they will get players that are as committed on the field as they are in the classroom."

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## Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

**Q:** I worked the first half of the year, but plan to retire this month. Will Social Security count the amount I earn for this year when I retire?

**A:** Yes. If you retire mid-year, we count your earnings for the entire year. We have a special "earnings test" rule we apply to annual earnings, usually in the first year of retirement. Under this rule, you get a full payment for any whole month we consider you **retired** regardless of your yearly earnings. We consider you retired during any month your earnings are \$1,260 or less, or if you have not performed substantial services in self-employment. We do not consider income earned, beginning with the month you reach full retirement age. **Q:** Will my Social Security disability benefit increase if my condition gets worse or I develop additional health problems?

**A:** No. We do not base your Social Security benefit amount on the severity of your disability. The amount you are paid is based on your average lifetime earnings before your disability began. If you go back to work after getting disability benefits, you may be able to get a higher benefit based

on those earnings. In addition, we have incentives that allow you to work temporarily without losing your disability benefits. **Q:** Is it true that if you have low income you can get help paying your Medicare premiums?

**A:** Yes. If your income and resources are limited, your state may be able to help with your Medicare Part B premium, deductibles, and coinsurance amounts. State rules vary on the income and resources that apply. Contact your State or local medical assistance, social services, or welfare office, or call the Medicare hotline, 1-800-MEDICARE (1-800-633-4227), and ask about the Medicare Savings Programs. If you have limited income and resources, you also may be able to get *Extra Help* paying for prescription drug coverage under Medicare Part D.
