Hunting, fishing

Licenses for the 2014-15 hunting and fishing seasons are on sale now. Current year Texas hunting and fishing licenses (except year-to-date fishing licenses) will expire Aug. 31. Every year, the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department issues about 2.5 million hunting and fishing licenses through the agency's 28 field offices, more than 50 state parks and at over 1,700 retailers across the state. Licenses may also be purchased online through the TPWD website at www.tpwd.state.tx.us/buy or by phone at 1-800-895-4248. Call center hours are Monday through Friday, 8 p.m. to 5 p.m. and there is a required \$5 convenience fee for each phone or online transaction. The online transaction system is available 24/7. For online and phone orders, a physical license will be mailed within three business days. During that time period, a transaction receipt will be provided via email that will be sufficient proof of hunting license that can be used for dove hunting, though it will not be allowed for the take of fish or wildlife that require a tag. Hunting and fishing regulations for the new season can

New hotel comes to downtown El Paso

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso's downtown redevelopment efforts are getting another welcomed shot in the arm with the recent announcement that the currently vacant Artisan Hotel on Kansas Street is getting a new owner and will become an upscale Hotel Indigo-franchised hotel.

The property's new ownership group said that Hotel Indigo is an urban, boutique hotel brand started in 2004 by InterContinental Hotels Group (IHG), one of the world's largest hotel companies that operates nine hotel brands. Holiday Inn and Holiday Inn

Express are its best known and largest chains.

Esperanto Developments is a local company that will renovate the 12-story hotel building. Chief executive officer of Esperanto Developments Madhi Nair stated in a recent news report that the hotel's new owners will capture the neighborhood story and come up with creative designs that will complement what is happening downtown. He added that each Indigo has its own identity.

Nair, who is also managing partner for the El Paso ownership group, explained that Esperanto is the hotel management and development arm of a family group that owns

10 hotels in Texas including three in El Paso— the GuestHouse Inn & Suites (at Artcraft Road and Interstate 10), El Paso Holiday Inn Airport Hotel and Comfort Inn and Suites (both near Interstate 10 and Airway Blvd).

As an incentive to spur the downtown hotel's rejuvenation, City Council a year ago approved giving the property up to \$3.06 million in city tax rebates and other enticements over a 10-year period. The renovation project is being financed with a loan from United Bank of El Paso del Norte.

Nair's group expects to spend more than \$9 million to remodel the 12-story building. Completion of the project is anticipated to be early next year with 115 to 120 rooms. The building has already been gutted inside, and construction should begin next month, according to Nair. IHG has approved the Hotel Indigo franchise, and the franchise agreement should be signed by both sides soon, he stated.

IHG executives were brought to El Paso in April, and they liked the Artisan Hotel location and the downtown market, a consultant for the new owners related. He stated that the new baseball stadium, the revamping of San Jacinto Plaza, and other activity helped convince them that the Indigo brand would work in Downtown El Paso.

The former Artisan hotel closed in March 2010 after a rocky five months of operation by Douglas Da Silva, of Las Vegas, Nevada. He bought the long-vacant property in 2006 for \$1.6 million and did extensive renovations, including adding hundreds of art reproductions to its ceilings and walls. The building later went into foreclosure.

Canutillo Eagles highly rated

CANUTILLO – The Canutillo High School varsity football team keeps amassing accolades from media experts and coaches who are praising the Eagles as one of the best teams in Texas for the upcoming 2014 season.

The Texas High School Coaches Association (THSCA) ranked the Eagles as the ninth best 5A football team in the state according to a poll released by the theathleticsdepartment.com website this week.

The ranking for CHS is the highest among all 5A schools in the El Paso region. Only one other school, Del Valle was ranked in the top 10, and four other area high schools received votes but were not ranked.

The THSCA ranking comes on the heels of another statewide honor for the Eagle football team.

Friday Night Football magazine ranked CHS as one of the top 50 teams in Texas 5A football in its fall 2014 issue. Canutillo is the only El Paso-area school to be ranked in any classification.

"Our kids put their heart and soul on that field, and it is great to see that their hard work is being recognized by others throughout the state," said Eagles Head Coach Scott Brooks. "We are in a new District this year, and we want to make a difference during our inaugural season with this new group."

Canutillo was the last El Paso area team playing football during the 2013 season after earning bi-district and area championships in the UIL 4A football playoffs.

The Eagles this year will play in District 1-5A after the UIL rearranged athletic districts earlier this year.

CHS opens 2014 play against the Franklin Cougars. Game starts at 7 p.m. on Aug. 29 on the Orange & Blue Field of the Coach Julius & Irene Lowenberg Eagles Stadium.

Identity thieves target kids

I'm sorry to report that child identity fraud is alive and well in 2014. If anything, the problem may be worsening as identity thieves devise new methods to steal – and use – children's personal information. Most commonly, they'll harvest kids' dormant Social Security numbers (SSNs) and use them to illegally obtain jobs or open fraudulent bank and credit accounts, mortgages or car loans.

Many victims don't realize there's a problem until they later apply for a student loan, bank

account, job or apartment and are turned down because of the poor credit history someone else racked up. Some families are even hounded by collection agencies or arrested because the debts or criminal activities were so extreme.

There are no completely foolproof methods to protect your children's identities, but here are some precautions you can take.

While it's tempting to simply not register your kids for SSNs until they turn 18, that's not practical in today's world. For one thing, they'll need one to be claimed as dependents on your taxes. You may also need SSNs for your kids to obtain medical coverage or government services or to open bank accounts in their names.

Because each person's SSN is unique, it's not uncommon for schools, healthcare providers, insurance companies, banks and others to require them as ID. However, don't be afraid to ask:

- Why do they need to use an SSN – is there a legal requirement?
- Will they accept alternative identification?
- What will happen if you don't disclose it?
- What security precautions do they take with personal information?
- Will they agree not to use the SSN as your child's personal identification number on correspondence, account statements or ID cards?

Watch for these clues your child's personal data may have been compromised:

- They receive preapproved credit account offers.
- They receive calls or billing statements from collection agencies, creditors or government agencies.
- You're unable to open a bank account in their name because one already exists with the same SSN.
- They're denied credit, employment, a driver's license or college enrollment for unknown or credit-related reasons.

Remember, there could be legitimate reasons why your child is receiving credit offers. For example, it could be a marketing outreach from an affiliate of your bank or because you opened a college fund in their name.

If you strongly suspect or have evidence that identity theft has been committed, you can:

- File a police report and keep a copy as proof of the crime.
- Contact the fraud units at the three major credit bureaus for instructions: Equifax (800-525-6285), Experian (888-397-3742) and TransUnion (800-680-7289).
- Notify the Federal Trade Commission (877-438-4338), whose Identity Theft site contains information on fraud alerts, credit freezes, how to work with police and much more (www.ftc.gov).
- Ask Social Security (800-772-1213) whether anyone has reported income using your child's SSN. Search "Identity Theft" at www.ssa.gov.

New VA head hits ground running

The new secretary of Veterans Affairs, Robert A. McDonald, has been on the job only a short time, but it looks like he's hit the ground running. A couple things he's doing:

- By the end of September, every health-care and benefits facility will hold a town hall event. The goal is to hear directly from veterans around the country. "As we seek continual improvement and to rebuild trust among veterans, it is critical that we continue to listen and learn," says McDonald. Each medical center and regional office will put out its own schedule. Besides veterans, they want to hear from veteran service organizations and other community partners.

Give your local center a call and find out when its town hall will take place. To find the locations nearest you, go to www.va.gov/directory and put in your ZIP code. You'll get a map and a list. Hover the cursor over a dot, click it and you'll get that location's info, including phone number.

- At McDonald's direction, the VA will begin a nationwide review of scheduling and access

practices. Starting this fall, every medical center will be reviewed by the independent Joint Commission. Its website (www.jointcommission.org) says it's an "independent, not-for-profit organization [that] accredits and certifies more than 20,500 health-care organizations and programs in the United States."

This is a big deal. With its exacting standards, it's likely nothing will get past the commission. I wonder how many of our VA facilities will achieve its Gold Seal of Approval rating.

- Another change coming soon will require all schedulers to complete mandatory training, and each medical-center director must see that it happens. Inquiring minds want to know why personnel are doing scheduling without training in the first place, but we'll take it as a positive step forward.



(There usually wouldn't be unless they're an authorized user on one of your accounts.) If there is a report – and it has errors due to fraud or misuse – you'll have time to correct it before you kid needs to use credit.

Warn your kids about the dangers of revealing personal information by phone, email, or social networking. Don't hesitate to monitor their accounts and install parental blocking software. And remember, if they share your computer, a downloaded virus could infect your accounts as well.

2014-2015 School Meal Policy

The Clint Independent School District and Clint High School, Clint ISD Early College Academy, Clint Junior High School, W. D. Surratt Elementary, Horizon High School, Ricardo Estrada Junior High School, Horizon Middle School, C. T. Welch Elementary, Desert Hills Elementary, Frank Macias Elementary, Mountain View High School, East Montana Middle School, Montana Vista Elementary and Red Sands Elementary announced today a change to its policy for serving meals to children served under the National School Lunch Program and School Breakfast Program for the 2014-2015 school year. Schools qualifying to operate the Community Eligibility Provision (CEP) provide breakfast and lunch to all children at no charge and eliminate the collection of meal applications for free, reduced-price, and paid student meals. This new approach reduces burdens for both families and school administrators and helps ensure that students receive nutritious meals.

Look, up in the sky, it's a ...

Anyone who has spent any time near a television set or a radio in recent years has heard some bozo give his opinion about global warming.

Either the weather is getting too hot, or it's getting too cold, or is too unpredictable.

With the alleged increases of hurricanes, earthquakes, tsunamis, solar flares, typhoons, tornadoes and ozone layer depletion, so-called experts blame the weather for all the world's ills.

Of course the biggest debate is what is causing these disasters.

Many in the science community say these are just cyclical earth weather patterns that have existed before man ever set foot on this big blue ball.

Many in the science community say these unusual weather patterns are caused by the action of man and his unquenchable thirst for industrial growth whatever the environmental cost.

As horrific as the list of cataclysmic weather events listed earlier are, there has been a new disturbance spotted over the skies of many major cities.

This new aerial phenomenon is quite new and though not as physically devastating as an earthquake or tornado, it is nearly as demoralizing and can cost millions in lost revenue.

The strange activity began about two weeks ago and usually occurred in front of large gatherings of people, in the form of what some describe as a yellowish cloth-like material.

They made their appearance rather randomly but quickly multiplied in numbers. It's gotten to the point that witnesses are becoming frustrated and angry over the ever-alarming growth rate of these celestial objects.

Scientists are baffled about these new objects falling from the sky at record rates, but fortunately, football coaches have solved the mystery.

According to many NFL coaches, the objects are no more than penalty flags thrown from the hip pockets of NFL referees.

In what was a rather predictable outcome, the

NFL preseason has been especially enjoyable with fans following the progress of rookies like Johnny Manziel, Teddy Bridgewater, Blake Bortles and Jadeveon Clowney.

But what wasn't anticipated was the dark cloud surrounding the exhibition games – the unusually high number of penalty flags thrown at the games.

The rhythm of games has been thrown completely off because of the stop-and-go-and-stop-again pattern that is developing.

So many teams complained about the holding the Seattle Seahawks defensive secondary was doing last season that the NFL decided to put an end to it.

But just like every new law imposed in this country, the enforcers go way overboard.

The yellow flags have been making appearances in what at times feels like every other play. If a defender just touches a receiver after five yards a flag flies in from overhead.

The continuous stoppage in action is probably causing some fans to turn to their local baseball games for some real action.

It's rather obvious that the NFL has aot to do something before the regular season starts.

Everybody loves touchdowns and big offensive plays but somebody has apparently convinced the NFL higher-ups that everybody

hates defense – and that is simply not the case.

I've never been to a football game where the fans in the stands yelled "field goal, field goal," or "offense, offense," and especially not "penalty flag, penalty flag."

The fans yell "defense, defense, defense," and always have.

Does the NFL just not believe them?

What's wrong with a defensive back bumping a receiver on his route? As long as he isn't holding and as long as he isn't bumping while the ball is in the air, what's the problem?

Let the receiver get away from the defender by faking him out or bumping him back.

Doesn't that sound fair? This way there will be less flags thrown and the football on the field won't resemble that of a video game.

If all the flags keep raining down on the field like they have, the NFL will receive so much backlash that it will be forced to make the embarrassing mid-season decision to admit a dumb mistake.

The forecast for the league may appear dark and dreary – but sunny skies could prevail if the league employs a little common sense.

Climate change is a debate for another day. For now, let's focus on some NFL rule changes.

Greatest moments in sports

This week we continue with some of the top moments in American sports history.

5. Mr. October and Mr. November

Whether you love or loathe them, there is an undeniable correlation between legendary moments on the field and the pinstriped-clad bombers from the Bronx. Reggie Jackson, a Hall of Famer, was certainly not the greatest hitter of all-time... in fact, he was more notorious for striking out. Many ballplayers with names like Mays, Gehrig and

Colavito have had multiple home run games of three or more. But Reggie Jackson hit three home runs with three swings of the bat one October night and said "Hi, mom" to the national television audience. That performance in the 1977 World Series made him synonymous with the clutch play, rivaled only by his replacement many years later, Derek Jeter, in terms of sheer star power and drink-stirring abilities., "The flip," and the dive into the stands, the home run in November to extend the World Series after 9/11... epic.

6. Jets all the way

For better or worse, Joe Namath's brag and "personal guarantee" of winning Super Bowl III changed the culture of sports in America. It's not that Namath was a great quarterback or turned in a great performance that day – Matt Snell, the fullback, did more for the Jets on the field than Namath did – it's that he became the living embodiment of walking the talk. He took what Ali had started and backed it up. Who can forget Broadway Joe's post-game, swinging No. 1 finger in the air as he ran off the field. It can't be topped. It's been done.

7. "Through the legs of Buckner"

There is no more fitting martyr in American sports than Bill Buckner,

a very good, steady first baseman for the Boston Red Sox. Buckner made thousands of plays at first base, but Mookie Wilson took him to the five-hole with the World Series on the line, Ray Knight on third and Vin Scully looking on.

8. Jackie Robinson steals home

Jackie Robinson broke baseball's color barrier, inspired millions and opened doors, et cetera, et cetera. But most baseball historians seem to delight in making the argument that he was not the best ballplayer in the Negro Leagues. They talk more about his personality profile than his sheer skill. That's absurd, and here's just one illustration of that fact.

One afternoon in 1955 at a field in Brooklyn, playing against the New

York Yankees for the championship, Robinson stole home. Let's break that down: The pitcher had the ball, was about to throw a pitch to the plate that would, normally, result in either a foul or fair hit by the batter or, unless thrown past him or in the dirt, a loud thud in the mitt of the catcher. In the middle of all that, in front of tens of thousands of eyewitnesses and millions watching at home via the magic of television, Jackie Robinson ran from third base and scored a run for his team. The sheer stones of that guy. Incredible.



Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 75-plus-year-old female in excellent health. My doctor's comment on my most recent annual physical test results was: "Great results on all tests. Excellent report." My question: Is it necessary to have another colonoscopy at my age and with my good health. My mother died of colon/rectal cancer at age 85 in 2002, and all family members were advised to have this procedure. My initial results were two or three polyps removed that were not the type that would recur and were not cancerous. The recommended follow-up was five years. The results of that exam showed no polyps, slight indication of diverticulosis and no recommendation for future follow-up. My previous doctor has retired, and I just received a letter from his replacement that I am due for another procedure. I am not inclined to do this at my age, and considering the "all clear" reports of the previous exams and my general good health. I would appreciate your thoughts and recommendation. – B.J.M.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My grandson, who is 8 years old, twitches in his sleep. He is tired during the day, but he sleeps eight to 10 hours. While he is sleeping, his body just jerks. Some nights are good and some not. Do we need to address this to the doctor? – C.G.J.

Muscle jerks or twitches at nighttime are normal. There is a very, very small risk that this is a type of epilepsy, but if it is occurring only at night, and there is no family history of epilepsy, it is almost certainly normal. It may lessen as he gets older, but is probably nothing to worry about.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 68 and take seven to eight pills daily, including lisinopril, Caduet, a beta blocker, gout medicine and Flomax. My question is, Can I take them all at once in the morning, or should they be spaced out throughout the day? Does taking them all at once diminish their effectiveness? – B.H.

The odds are low that the colonoscopy would find something there, but there is still a small chance, especially with your mother having had colon cancer. Not having it is reasonable. But since you seem to be otherwise healthy and can expect a longer life than average, I would still say to get it. In fact, I would encourage you to have it.

The medications you list are commonly taken together with no problems. However, your pharmacist is the best source for questions about drug interactions and when to take what. Although there are excellent pharmacists at national chain stores, my patients generally report a better relationship with pharmacists at smaller mom-and-pop pharmacies.

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I currently receive Social Security disability benefits. I now have a second serious disability. Can my monthly benefit amount be increased?

A: No. Your Social Security disability benefit amount is based on the amount of your lifetime earnings before your disability began and not the number of disabling conditions or illnesses you may have. For more information, go to www.socialsecurity.gov/disability.

Q: My mother receives Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits. She may have to enter a nursing home later this year. How does this affect her SSI benefits?

A: Moving to a nursing home can affect your mother's SSI benefits but it depends on the type of facility. In some cases, the SSI payment may be reduced or stopped. Whenever your mother enters or leaves a nursing home, assisted living facility, hospital, skilled nursing facility, or any other kind

of institution, you must tell Social Security. Call Social Security's toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213 (TTY 1-800-325-0778). We can answer specific questions and provide free interpreter services from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday. We also provide information by automated phone service 24 hours a day.

Q: I found out that my daughter submitted incorrect information about my resources when she completed my Application for Help with Medicare Prescription Drug Plan Costs. How can I get my application changed now to show the correct amount?

A: You can call 1-800-772-1213 (TTY: 1-800-325-0778) and let us know. We will match information on your application with data from other federal agencies. If there is a discrepancy that requires verification, we will contact you. For additional information about Medicare prescription

drug plans or enrollment periods visit www.medicare.gov or call 1-800-633-4227.

Q: I'm expecting a baby this June. What do I need to do to get a Social Security number for my baby?

A: Apply for a number at the hospital when you apply for your baby's birth certificate. The state agency that issues birth certificates will share your child's information with us, and we will mail the Social Security card to you. You can learn more about the Social Security number and card by reading our online publication on the subject, available at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs.


