'DWI Not So Fun House'

As summer celebrations enter their final weeks, the Texas Department of Transportation is taking its "DWI Not So Fun House" to community events across the state as part of its "Drink, Drive, Go to Jail" campaign. The vintage-style interactive carnival trailer allows the public to experience the dangerous and potentially deadly effects of impaired driving. "Don't turn your summer fun into a life-changing tragedy by being irresponsible when it comes to drinking and driving," said TxDOT Deputy Executive Director John Barton. "A safe and sober ride should be at the top of your list when making plans with family and friends. If not, you run the serious risk of being pulled over by law enforcement, being killed or killing someone else. It's just not worth it." The "DWI Not So Fun House" allows visitors to see and experience the simulated effects of alcohol on motor skills and driving. Participants wear vision-blurring "drunk goggles" and try to complete simple, eye-hand coordination tasks while being "impaired." The slowed reaction times and distorted perception are designed to remind Texans about the deadly risks of drinking and driving, and encourage them to always plan for a sober ride. Last summer in Texas, 336 people were killed and 680 were seriously injured in alcohol-related crashes. Texas drivers convicted of DWI face up to \$17,000 in costs, possible jail time, limited career prospects and loss of driver license. In an effort to curb impaired driving, TxDOT's "Drink, Drive, Go to Jail" campaign is supported by increased law enforcement efforts between Aug. 21 and Sept. 7. TxDOT strongly encourages everyone to plan for a sober ride before going out. Visit SoberRides.org to find alternatives to drinking and driving, such as:

- Calling a taxi or using a transportation app on your smartphone;
- Using mass transit;
- Asking a sober friend or family member for a ride home; or
- Staying put.

Northeast El Paso residents oppose development

EL PASO COUNTY – Northeast El Paso residents aired their concerns during a recent Open Space Advisory Board (OSAB) meeting held at city offices on Texas Street regarding a proposed housing development that encompasses land that lies adjacent to Castner Range and stretches along the slopes of the Franklin Mountains.

The residents met with OSAB members to convey to city officials that they want the land to remain in its natural state.

About 100 individuals showed up for the meeting. Among them were John Cook, former mayor of El Paso; Carl Robinson, city representative of District 4; Joe Moody, state representative; and Larry Nichols, director of City of El Paso Planning and Inspections Department.

Spearheading the push to gain city officials' attention about its opposition to the housing development is a group calling itself Save our Sierras (SOS), which is a committee within the Franklin Mountains Wilderness Coalition (FMWC).

The land to be developed is more than 300 acres between existing homes and Franklin Mountain State Park, located south of Hondo Pass and west of Magnetic and Alabama.

Developer Daniel T. Knapp is proposing residential development in the area that is zoned as planned mountain development. He has already submitted a land study application with the city for the initial 175-acre section that he has named Sierra del Puente.

Knapp's application for building 319 single family units along with 87 acres of open space was approved by the City Plan Commission (CPC) in February.

Knapp is now interested in submitting a second land study application for developing an additional 135 acres just west of Stony Hill Drive. Plans for this section have not yet been submitted.

The concerned citizens group went to the OSAB meeting because its members are the ones who make recommendations to city council about lands that should be acquired for open space designation. City council, in turn, can use funds from several sources to purchase these lands and convert them into open space

retreats.

Some of these funds can come from the 2012 Quality of Life bonds, which set aside monies for the acquisition of open space. Also, the El Paso Water Utilities has storm-water funds that can be transferred to the city to purchase open space. Additionally, city development regulations contain various incentives to encourage property owners to dedicate land to open space.

During the OSAB meeting's public comments period, SOS members voiced several issues of concern regarding the adverse effects of the proposed development. They stated that there are numerous homes currently for sale in the area so there is no need for more homes. They pointed out that the proposed development will add to the water shortage in El Paso County and that proposed homes will be built in a flood zone which will create a problem for homeowners downhill of the development.

Furthermore, SOS members asserted that the development will remove wildlife habitat and will force existing wildlife

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Canutillo ISD holding late registration



2015 Property Tax Rates in El Paso County Emergency Services District #2

This notice concerns 2015 property tax rates for the El Paso County Emergency Services District #2. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.




10 reasons why you might be financially stressed

Stress can come from everywhere – career, school, family, relationships, health – and especially money.

The American Psychological Association (APA) recently reported that money remains the number one stressor for 72 percent of Americans. In fact, money has led the APA's annual stress survey since its debut in 2007, the year before the financial crash that took the U.S. economy into its worst slump since the Great Depression.

Are you financially stressed? Here are 10 major signs of financial stress and ways to take action.

1. You wonder if your job is secure. Even though the economy has improved in recent years, employers still cut and reassign workers and make occasional adjustments in pay and benefits. If you've spotted

changes in other departments or news accounts suggest a shift in your industry, start thinking ahead. Action Plan: Build up your emergency fund to cover six months or more of basic living expenses, update your resume and get organized for a potential job search.

2. There's no money to save or invest. If meeting basic expenses is a struggle and you have no savings or investments at all, it's time for a serious review of where your money is going. Action plan: Making a basic budget is the first step to tracking every penny spent. Figure out extras you can cut and set more aside for savings and debt payoff.

3. You have disagreements with a spouse or partner about money. A 2013 University of Kansas study noted that

arguments about money are the top predictor of divorce. Action plan: Share information about all debt and legal issues and exchange respective credit reports and credit score data as you plan to solve all money problems together.

4. You are paying bills late. Late payments can hurt your credit score (<http://www.myfico.com>). Action plan: Set up a physical or digital calendar to keep track of payment dates and budget in order to put more money toward debt and eventually savings.

5. You imagine a windfall. Waiting for a bonus, an inheritance or even a winning lotto ticket to ease your financial stress indicates you have a tendency toward financial denial. Action plan: If your current efforts at budgeting, saving money or paying off debt aren't working,

consider a reality check with a qualified financial advisor.

6. You use your home equity like a cash register. Home equity loans or lines of credit can provide an interest-deductible solution for a variety of important needs, but a down housing market can wipe out your equity. Action plan: Either refinance if you qualify or stop using the line entirely until you can pay down the balance.

7. You're considering drawing from retirement funds to solve money problems. Think twice before taking out loans against these funds. Interrupting your retirement planning, particularly over the age of 50, can have significant financial consequences. Action plan: Re-budget your finances and seek qualified advice to help you find another solution.

8. Late and overdraft fees are piling up. According to the Pew Charitable Trusts, the average bank overdraft fee is \$35; credit card late fees are similar. Action plan: Schedule bill payments and opt for online billing when possible to save time on mailing. If you have to pay additional late fees, ask your bank or credit card company if it might forgive the fee; many will remove one fee a year.

9. You're late on student loan payments. It is difficult to have student loans (<https://studentaid.ed.gov/sa/>) forgiven, cancelled or discharged (eliminated) in bankruptcy if you can't pay. Paying late can also hurt your credit score. Action Plan: Seek qualified financial advice that specifically addresses the type of student debt you have and resolve to pay bills on time.

10. Your accounts are disorganized. It's difficult to reach important financial goals when you really can't track your finances. Action plan: Get some advice from a trusted friend or a qualified financial professional about how to best organize your accounts and whether online account management may be right for you.

Bottom line: Reducing your financial stress is a healthy decision. Review your money habits and get qualified help if necessary to lessen this burden.

The History Channel

- On Aug. 28, 1877, Charles Stewart Rolls, co-founder (with Henry Royce) of the Rolls-Royce automobile company, is born in London. In 1900, Rolls reportedly was responsible for changing the national speed limit from 4 mph to 12 mph.

- On Aug. 30, 1918, in Belfort, France, Colonel Arthur L. Conger plants a false operational order for an impending Allied attack in the wastebasket of a hotel where a German agent was on staff. As intended, the order was found and the Germans chose to withdraw from the area.



onto less land. As it is, they said, this area is seeing more wildlife because the west side of the Franklins is being developed.

"Development will require dynamite which will shake and potentially damage existing homes nearby," stated Judy Ackerman, an SOS member. "Additional development will add to the 'heat island' effect of the city, and traffic will increase in the existing neighborhood where the ground is unstable," she claimed.

Ackerman noted also that area homeowners have already been warned to buy flood insurance due to the potential damage from storm-water and that their property value will probably decrease.

Concerns were also expressed about the impact that the new neighborhoods will have on the nearby schools, such as Edgar Park Elementary and Chapin High, which they said are already overcrowded.

Because SOS members' issue was not on OSAB's agenda for that meeting, board members listened attentively but were unable to take any action.

Former mayor Cook suggested that the SOS group talk to city representative Robinson about putting this issue on an upcoming city council meeting agenda so that city staff can address the details of the development.

Representative Moody also suggested that each member on the open space board should speak to the city council member who appointed him or her about this issue.

OSAB Member Jim Tolbert said that the concerned residents came to the right place to address open space with a storm-water function, which applies to this property. He said that this much support of the people gets attention and that he will speak to city council member Claudia Ordaz, who appointed him to OSAB, about this issue.

Katrina Martich, chair of the OSAB, thanked the individuals for attending and said that it was nice to see the public interest in open space because at most of their meetings only a few members of the public are in attendance.

winning the French Open. Zack Johnson won the 144th Open Championship at St. Andrews, Scotland. The women's national soccer team won the World Cup in decisive fashion. We even won the Pan-American Games.

Off the field, South Carolina finally ceded the Civil War, and thanks to NASA, we now know more about Pluto than we know

about Idaho and South Dakota. Good news was coming out of the technology sector and job market.

Then we fell down the stairs. Shootings in movie theaters. Routine traffic stops turned into horror flicks, speed traps became death traps, and a campus policeman in Cincinnati had more firepower than Marines at our

DEAR DR. ROACH: My daughter was diagnosed with Lyme disease. I'm from Michigan, in a county with open spaces and lots of animals. Probably a tick caused it. Are there doctors who treat this disease in our area? Lots of people in this area have it. - P.A.

"Dizziness" is a very nonspecific term. It can mean vertigo, which is a sensation of movement when there isn't any; lightheadedness, such as we can all get sometimes when standing too quickly; or a disorientation that can happen when blood sugar is low. Meniere's disease is a cause of true vertigo, often with ringing in the ears and hearing loss.

Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria, *Borrelia burgdorferi*, which in turn is spread by the black-legged deer tick, *Ixodes scapularis*. I checked with the health department in Michigan and found that there has never been a reported case from your county. That doesn't mean it's impossible - you are not far from some counties in western Michigan where Lyme disease is known to be present. It's possible your daughter traveled, or it's possible she is the first case in your county.

Shuffling of the feet is a red flag for Parkinson's disease. Dizziness is a common if not universal symptom in people with Parkinson's. However, only a thorough history and physical exam can make the diagnosis. If your regular doctor hasn't been able to help, you might see a neurologist, who is an expert in making diagnoses about neurologic symptoms such as dizziness. There are many possible causes.

Most cases of Lyme disease start with a characteristic rash, sometimes with fever or other symptoms. It can be treated effectively, in the vast majority of cases in early stage, with oral antibiotics, such as doxycycline.

An infectious-disease expert can help confirm the diagnosis and make sure she is properly treated.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 85 and in good health, except for dizziness spells. It was said that I have vertigo, but I do not believe this to be the case. Meclizine is of no help. The symptoms are worst when I close my eyes: When I do, I feel like may fall. Other symptoms are shuffling of feet, dizziness and dizziness on standing too quickly. Is it possible I have Meniere's disease? - A.T.H.

DEAR DR. ROACH: You wrote about the health benefits of nuts. Does roasting them matter? A friend says they need to be raw. - A.

The data showing improved heart disease rates in people who eat nuts looked both at raw nuts and roasted. Many roasted nuts include more salt than you want,

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Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: I will rely on Medicare when I retire. Can you explain the different parts of Medicare?

A: The different parts of Medicare cover your specific needs. There are four parts, all of which work in tandem to deliver healthcare services.

- Part A (hospital insurance): Hospital insurance helps pay for inpatient care in a hospital or skilled nursing facility (following a hospital stay), some home health care, and hospice care.

- Part B (medical insurance): Medical insurance helps pay for doctors' services and many other medical services and supplies that hospital insurance doesn't cover.

- Part C (Medicare Advantage plans): If you have Medicare Parts A and B, you can join a Medicare Advantage plan. Private companies offer Medicare Advantage plans which are approved by Medicare. These plans generally help you pay the medical costs not covered by Medicare Part A and B.

- Part D (prescription drug coverage): Prescription drug coverage helps pay for

medications doctors prescribe for treatment.

Q: Can I receive Social Security benefits and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) benefits at the same time?

A: You may be able to receive SSI in addition to monthly Social Security benefits if your Social Security benefit is low enough for you to qualify for SSI. Whether you can get SSI depends on your income and resources. Resources are things that you own—other than your home—such as additional property, vehicles, or anything else you could exchange for cash. If you have low income and few resources, you may be able to supplement your Social Security benefit with an SSI payment. You can find out more about SSI at www.socialsecurity.gov/disabilityssi/ssi.html.

Q: I'm retired, and the only income I have aside from my Social Security retirement benefit is from an Individual Retirement Account (IRA). Are my IRA withdrawals considered "earnings?" Could they reduce

my monthly Social Security benefits?

A: No. We do not count non-work income, such as annuities, investment income, interest, capital gains, and other government benefits, and they will not affect your Social Security benefits. Most pensions will not affect your benefits. However, your benefit may be affected by a government pension from work on which you did not pay Social Security tax. If you have wages or self-employment income and you are under your full retirement age, this income may affect your benefit amount. 
