
A trip to remember

EL PASO COUNTY – Tom Mays Park will be teeming with outdoor entertainment when the Eleventh Annual Chihuahuan Desert Fiesta comes alive for an afternoon affair in the foothills of the Franklin Mountains.

The annual celebration, which is free and open to the public, will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Saturday, September 19, at the Tom Mays section on Franklin Mountains State Park's westside, off of

Transmountain Road.

The fiesta will feature animals native to the area, like Jasper the opossum. Short walks along desert trails will be conducted, and brief presentations about the geology of the region's mountains, plants, and wildlife will be provided.

"Local environmental education groups will be on hand to offer free demonstrations and guided tours; also available will be guest speakers and informational booths designed to introduce the curious to the wonders of our fascinating desert," stated Dr. Gertrud Konings, a fiesta representative.

"The outdoor venue is meant to celebrate the natural wonders of the Chihuahuan Desert and Franklin Mountains State Park," Konings said. "Every year the event attracts hundreds of people to the desert mountain park in northwest El Paso," she added.

The event is sponsored by Texas Parks and Wildlife Department with the help from volunteers of the Chihuahuan Desert Education Coalition (CDEC).

Ramirez recognized for school volunteer work

EL PASO COUNTY – Socorro Independent School District's (SISD) parent volunteer, Joe Ramirez, was recently selected as a Hero for Children by the Texas Board of Education.

Ramirez, who volunteers at Eastlake High School, was honored along with 14 others at the September 11 meeting of the State Board of Education in Austin.

"It was a great surprise," said Ramirez, who has been helping out in schools for more than 12 years. "It was so unexpected."

The Heroes for Children award program recognizes individuals who volunteer time, effort and support to public schools and students. They are presented annually by the State Board of Education in recognition of outstanding service and dedication, and for providing each Texas student with a meaningful, positive learning experience in school.

This is not Ramirez's first accolade for service. In April, he was named the district's 2014-2015 Secondary Volunteer of the Year.

"He is a big advocate for our teachers and our kids," said Gilbert Martinez, principal at Eastlake. "He is full of ideas and is an outstanding volunteer. He definitely is a motivator, who leads by example."

Ramirez is the third SISD volunteer to receive state recognition. Community member, Susan Hill, earned the award in 2005 and Flor Gentry from Bill Sybert School was selected in 2007.

10 open enrollment mistakes to avoid

How much time do you spend reviewing your benefits before open enrollment each year? If your answer is “not much,” you’re not alone. A recent survey by insurer Aflac (<http://workforces.aflac.com/about-the-study.php>) says that 90 percent

of Americans choose the same benefits year after year and that 42 percent forego up to \$750 annually by making poor choices.

Rushing through annual benefits updates or making such uninformed decisions in insurance, retirement or other workplace-based benefits are actually part of a bigger story. Open enrollment is just one part of an overall financial plan. Unfortunately, too many employees see it as the only financial planning they have to do all year.

In reality, a safe financial future depends mostly on the savings, investing and spending decisions you make outside the workplace. As many employers are looking to shrink or discontinue the retirement and health benefits they offer, it’s time to take a fresh look at open enrollment.

Here are 10 benefits mistakes you might want to avoid.

Not having an overall financial plan. Your company may offer excellent benefits now. However, the Labor Department reports that average worker tenure at U.S. companies is only 4.6 years, so the biggest open enrollment mistake might be assuming your current benefits assure your financial future. It’s important to work alone or with qualified advisors to determine the right work-based benefits as part of overall spending, savings and investment activities throughout your lifetime.

Making choices at the last minute. Your benefits are important and deserve time for consideration. Put your open enrollment dates on your personal calendar with a reminder a few weeks ahead of time to coordinate with qualified

advisors if you have them.

Forgetting to coordinate with your spouse or partner. Many employers are planning big changes to spouse/partner benefits. While the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (ACA) lets parents keep children on their health plans until age 26, more employers are instituting “spousal surcharges” or excluding spousal coverage altogether if they already have access to employer health insurance.

Ignoring your state’s Health Insurance Marketplace. Even if you have employer health insurance, things change. If you lose a job or cannot stay on your spouse or partner’s health plan, it might be worthwhile to familiarize yourself with your state’s ACA-mandated health insurance marketplace ahead of time.

Underestimating how big life events might affect your benefits. Salary changes, marriage, divorce, serious illness or starting a family are big signals to check your benefits, preferably well in advance of open enrollment. Think through every potential situation you might face and ask questions about how those changes might affect your benefit selections.

Passing on flexible spending accounts (FSAs) and health savings accounts (HSAs). FSAs are workplace-based accounts that allow you to set aside money on a pre-tax basis to help you pay for healthcare and dependent care expenses during the calendar year. HSAs, if you qualify, also allow you to set aside pre-tax dollars in a qualified investment or savings account for long-and-short term medical expenses not covered by insurance. They don’t

require you to spend out those funds every year. Your workplace benefits counselor, qualified financial advisor and Internal Revenue Service Publication 969 can assist with eligibility, types of accounts, contribution limits and tax issues associated with these choices.

Leaving retirement selections unchanged. As the Aflac data indicates, many individuals don’t change their investment focus in self-directed retirement plans for years. That’s why reviewing options in advance is essential.

Overlooking wellness options. Many employers pay for exercise, cholesterol screenings, weight loss, smoking cessation, immunizations or related benefits that can make you healthier, save money and possibly lower health premiums.

Bypassing transportation breaks. If you drive or take public or company-sponsored transportation to and from work, you may qualify for specific discounts or tax deductions. IRS Publication 15-B covers these programs and how to use them most effectively.

Forgetting education benefits. If an employer is willing to train you to advance in your career, don’t pass it up. However, get advice on the possibility of tax liability for these benefits. Separately, check out employer-sponsored education grant or scholarship awards for you or your kids – that can be free money.

Bottom line: Open enrollment is just one piece of a well-organized financial puzzle. Make sure your employer provided benefits choices compliment savings, investing and spending decisions you’re making on your own.

Crystal ball at the VA

An interesting story played out recently in Philadelphia involving an assistant director, a manager and a psychic.

In the past year, the Department of Veterans Affairs office in Philadelphia has been looked at by the Office of the Inspector General for claims processing inaccuracy, manipulating claim dates, canceling pending claims and more.

The new story: An assistant director threw a party at her home so a subordinate’s wife could do psychic readings for employees. The subordinate was a manager. Each private reading cost \$35, with a minimum of six people.

After the assistant director had another subordinate make all the arrangements, three employees agreed to attend the party. An email (that contained the assistant director’s VA position title) went out to solicit the participation of other employees to reach the six-person minimum. Eight employees ended up going. Rule: An employee can’t use her position to endorse a service for friends.

The Inspector General (c)2015KingFeaturesSynd.,Inc.

got involved and did an investigation.

The assistant director claimed that the attendees were her friends, thereby breaking another rule: Bosses can’t give preferential treatment to subordinates. However, all the subordinates in attendance for a psychic reading complained about how long it was taking, and all left immediately after their reading, not staying to socialize despite the availability of “munchies, wine/beer/vodka.” These were friends?

The VAOIG additionally made a criminal referral to the Department of Justice for the manager’s failure to report his wife’s psychic income on his Office of Government Ethics forms for two years running.

The VAOIG also discovered a number of fun facts, among them that the manager had failed to claim his psychic wife’s income on his tax returns. The VAOIG helpfully reported that failure to the Internal Revenue Service as well as to the Pennsylvania State Department of Revenue.

2015 STAAR scores released

EL PASO COUNTY – Teachers and parents of Texas elementary, middle and high school children may now view on the Internet the latest battery of student performance tests that were administered in the spring.

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) announced recently that it was releasing the 2015 State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) tests and making them available for review on the TEA website.

The released tests includes the following STAAR general assessments: grades 3–8 reading; grades 4 and 7 writing; grades 5 and 8 science; grade 8 social studies; Algebra I; English I and English II; biology; and U.S. history. All 2015 STAAR released tests – except for grades 3–8 mathematics – are now posted online.

A partial release of the grades 3-8 mathematics questions (including grades 3-5 Spanish) is also

posted online. A partial release is a subset of test questions that are eligible for the assessment but do not represent the entire test blueprint. According to TEA officials, because the mathematics tests have undergone major revisions, there are not enough approved test questions in reserve to permit the release of full tests this year.


TEA has previously released – in 2013 and 2014 – the first test form administered in the spring for each general STAAR assessment. The next scheduled STAAR release is set for 2016 and then every third year thereafter.

“Released test questions on the TEA webpage do not represent all the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS) student expectations eligible for assessment on STAAR,” stated a TEA report.

USDA to hold loan meeting in Anthony

EL PASO COUNTY – The USDA Rural Development El Paso Area Office, which provides service to El Paso County, will be holding a housing information meeting on September 21, 2015 at the Anthony Town Hall Court Room, 401 Wild Cat Drive, Anthony, TX from 9:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. to provide information regarding the availability of housing loans and grants to assist residents.

USDA Rural Development’s Rural Housing Direct Home Loan Program offers 100 percent financing with no down payment required for low and lower income individuals or families at a fixed interest rate. These loans are made directly through USDA Rural Development and are offered for a period of 30-38 years. The repayment on the loan may be subsidized by the Federal Government, based on the household income. Direct loans may be made for the purchase of an existing home or new home construction.

The loan amount is determined by repayment ability of the borrower. Loans made under this program are to individuals and families with income that does not exceed 80 percent of the median income level of the county where they live and who would not otherwise qualify for a conventional loan. County Income limits for the programs are posted on the USDA Rural Development Texas website at <http://www.rd.usda.gov/tx> and clicking on “Check Eligibility” on the bottom of

the screen. Funds are also available through Rural Development’s 504 Home Repair loan and grant program. The program is available to low income recipients to make essential repairs to modernize and repair homes, and to remove health and safety hazards. Most repairs completed under the program are for roof, window and door replacements, as well as electrical, plumbing and air conditioning upgrades as well as other repairs needed to increase the home’s energy efficiency and overall comfort and quality. Renovations to make a home wheelchair or handicap accessible are also considered. To qualify for the program, applicants must own their home, and fall within Rural Development’s income guidelines, defined as below 50 percent of the area median income and unable to obtain affordable credit elsewhere. Homeowners, at least 62 years old, may qualify for a grant. Grant funding, for the purpose of removing health and safety issues in the home, up to \$7,500 is limited and many times repairs will be funded with a combination of loan and grant. One percent loans up to \$20,000 will be on a repayment term of up to 20 years and will require low monthly payments. USDA, through its Rural Development mission area, administers and manages housing, business and community infrastructure and facility programs through a national network of state and local offices. These programs are designed

your benefits if you currently receive them; and

- Manage your benefits;
- Change your address;

Do you also remember the times that you were very disappointed to find out that the big box with your name on it was filled with clothes instead of that cool new gadget?

It's a bummer when you expect something to be a certain way – and later find out that it isn't.

Especially when it's something that you've waited a long time for.

But I guess that's just the way life can be sometimes, the more you anticipate something the more you build it up in your head.

Take UTEP football for example – specifically the UTEP football defense.

The Miners were expected to be hammered against Arkansas in their season opener, but there was the hope they'd keep the game respectfully close.

They were hammered.

How in the world can a mid-major team like UTEP ever compete with the likes of an Arkansas, on the road? It's impossible!

But then holy Toledo! To make matters ever worse for the Miners, an ever less mid-major like Toledo goes to Arkansas last week and not only competes with them, Toledo beats them 16-12.

Remember, UTEP was physically man handled by the Razorbacks in a 48-13 loss.



Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 22, and I am a security guard at a local store. Just recently, I detained a suspect for shoplifting. We were in a room no bigger than a small office, and she was coughing up a storm. I was in and out of the room for a half-hour or so. When the local police department showed up, she revealed that she has active tuberculosis. I did my research, and it is contagious when it's airborne. How much exposure is necessary to catch it? What are the symptoms of TB? Is it curable? Please, I'm in need of answers. — E.A.M.

DEAR DR. ROACH: My wife drinks in excess of 3 liters of diet soda a day, sometimes even more. She has colitis, for which she takes Lialda, and on her last visit to her primary care physician, her blood work revealed borderline bad levels in her liver. The doctor seems to think she needs to stop "drinking alcohol," but I have been married to her for more than 30 years, and I know it's not drinking that is causing this. We both consume only moderate amounts of alcohol. Could it be the chemicals in diet soda? — F.J.R.

Tuberculosis is an infection caused by the bacteria *Mycobacterium tuberculosis*. The most common body location is the lungs, but tuberculosis can infect the kidneys, lining of the brain, bones and lining of the heart, among others. It is contagious by air only when in the lungs, as you said. The major symptom is cough, but weight loss also is frequent in advanced stages, giving TB its old name, consumption.

The likelihood of getting infected after exposure depends on many factors, including some things we don't know in this case, such as whether she is being treated and whether she has cavities in her lungs.

The good news is that you would be considered a low-risk contact, having been in a room with her only for a relatively short period. The bad news is that it is possible to have acquired an infection. Your doctor or a public health official should evaluate you for evidence of prior infection with a skin test, which should be repeated in

eight to 10 weeks. Tuberculosis is almost 100 percent curable. People with active infection usually are treated with several medications for six months.

Three liters a day is a lot of diet soda, and that much caffeine probably isn't good for her. However, I don't think it is likely to be affecting her liver. Mesalamine (Lialda and others) rarely can cause abnormal liver tests — specifically, high levels of the same enzymes that might lead a doctor to suspect alcohol use.

You didn't tell me what kind of colitis your wife has, but ulcerative colitis, a form of inflammatory bowel disease, is associated with several kinds of liver problems, including fatty liver and primary sclerosing cholangitis, which is potentially severe. I don't think either alcohol or diet soda should be blamed until she has had a


