El Paso County ESD No. 1 puts Heavy Rescue to use


HORIZON CITY — El Paso County Emergency Services District #1 (ESD #1) rescue team got an opportunity to use their skills and equipment recently. They, along with members from COMSAR and Montana Vista Fire stations, extracted a man from atop a mountain peak in the Hueco Tanks Mountains. The individual needing help had broken his leg and couldn't walk. He was eventually carried down by the rescue team.

The quick action by the firefighters in the recent mountain rescue is credited largely to the various equipment that is incorporated into ESD #1's newest truck — the Heavy Rescue. The truck is housed in ESD #1's Fire Station in Horizon City.

"All of the equipment that we used in that rescue came off of our truck," stated Ron Larson, administrator, firefighter, and emergency medical technician for El Paso County's ESD #1.

The Horizon City fire station took delivery of the new heavy rescue truck

Volunteers needed for tax preparation

Keeping moving expenses under control

Even if you're only moving across town, it's likely to cost more than you think.

According to the latest figures from the American Moving and Storage Association, the average

cost of an in-state professional move – based on 7,570 pounds of stuff – is \$1,170. The average state-to-state move costs \$5,630.

How can you control moving expenses? Start making a master checklist to collect data and consider all costs and personal aspects of a potential move. You may even want to include a pro-and-con list that addresses all conceivable economic and lifestyle outcomes – the real long-term costs and benefits of a move. After deciding whether the move is worthwhile, consider these subsequent steps:

Seek solid advisors. Whether or not you plan to sell a home with a licensed real estate broker or agent, most are open to do a market valuation of your property and suggest repairs or improvements that could maximize a sale price. If you use a qualified financial planner or tax advisor, include that individual in early discussions on how a move might affect your finances. Also, if you're selling property, find an experienced real estate attorney to review broker and sale contracts.

Get multiple estimates from movers. An early walk-through at your home or apartment by

two to three U.S. Department of Transportation (DOT)-registered movers (<http://ai.fmcsa.dot.gov/hhg/search.asp>) can provide a reality check on how much you'll want to take and whether you can afford luxuries like packing or storage. Online resources can also help you evaluate those estimates.

Watch for fraud. Recent news reports have highlighted a trend called "hostage load," a practice whereby unscrupulous moving companies demand more money from customers before finishing a delivery. Getting references from trusted friends and advisors is a good first step to finding the right registered mover for your relocation. DOT has launched the "Protect Your Move" (<http://www.fmcsa.dot.gov/protect-your-move>) site that allows you to download a moving fraud protection guide and offers tips on proper ways to investigate and hire a mover.

Start downsizing – now. Getting early estimates from movers certainly helps you decide what you're really willing to take. If there are valuables you think you can sell, consult professional appraisers and even general marketplace sources like eBay to get a realistic idea

of value. Otherwise, consider garage sales and donations for the rest.

Insure what you're moving. Whatever plans you're making for home or renter's coverage at the new destination, make sure you have proper coverage in place for the contents of your move. The Insurance Information Institute provides a useful guide (<http://www.iii.org/article/getting-right-insurance-coverage-moving>) to properly insuring the possessions you're moving.

Build a cash reserve for deposits, fees and incidentals. Keeping moving costs low can help you handle dozens of smaller and sometimes unexpected expenses that crop up immediately before, during and after a move. Budget for those hidden costs which can include deposits, fees and multiple trips to the discount store, home center or grocery.

Bottom line: Thinking about moving? Give yourself adequate time and resources to plan all aspects of this major life and money event.

Blue Water vets and Agent Orange

The Department of Veterans Affairs decided long ago that for a Vietnam veteran to have been exposed to Agent Orange, he or she would have had to actually step foot on land. For those veterans, the VA developed a list of presumptive illnesses – among them peripheral neuropathy, non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, Parkinson's disease, prostate cancer and more – for which it would pay disability benefits.

"Blue water" veterans – on ships offshore in deep-water harbors – got nothing. Here and there an individual claim would be approved for those who had docked and set foot on land or were on patrol boats on inland waters.

The Institute of Medicine was asked to determine if blue water veterans could somehow have been exposed to Agent Orange even if they never left the ship, determine the possible method of transmission and compare them to troops on the ground.

The IOM committee held three open meetings, the last aboard the USS Midway, now a museum in San Diego. What

members specifically wanted to see: the distillation plants.

Navy ships had their own drinking water supply systems, converting seawater to drinking water. And where did that water go? Everywhere. It was used for drinking, cooking, laundry, showers and making coffee.

The IOM called it a "plausible pathway of exposure." It concurred with an Australian study that concluded the distillation plants "had the potential to enrich" the concentrations from the source water to the drinking water on the other end.

The IOM couldn't, however, determine whether blue water veterans had a higher or lower level of risk than those who served on land or traversed the inland waterways.

The VA estimates that of the 80,000 living blue water veterans, about 40,000 have been found eligible for benefits, while about 20,000 have been denied benefits.

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Canutillo ISD seeks volunteers for committee

of Trustees regarding the future direction of CISD.

Members will hold four work sessions and two community dialogues. The four work sessions will occur from 6:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. at the Canutillo ISD Central Office located at 7965 Arcraft on Tuesday, Dec. 1, 2015; Thursday, Dec. 3, 2015; Thursday, Feb. 11, 2016; and Thursday, March 31, 2016. 

Driving ambition

A British team seeks to set new land speed records with a car they say can travel at 1,000 miles an hour. An earlier version of the vehicle already holds the world record of 763 miles per hour set in 1997. The new Bloodhound SSC [supersonic car] is powered by a jet engine rated at 133,151 horsepower, reports the Association of Mature American Citizens. The speed demons plan to first break the existing record by accelerating their car to some 800 mph in a trial slated to take place in South Africa next spring. Later they'll attempt to reach their goal of traveling at 1,000 mph or more – a rate of speed that, if it was possible to sustain, could get them from New York to Los Angeles in less than three hours.

Detectives are asking for the public's assistance in identifying this armed robber, through the Crime Stoppers. Both robberies took place in El Paso's Mission Valley and within blocks of each other. On Sunday, Oct. 4, 2015 at 4:34 a.m., a man walked into the Seven Eleven store located at 7400 Alameda. The man walked in, covering his face with a white shirt, and holding a large knife. The man immediately ordered the store clerk to the ground and demanded money from the register. The man fled the scene with an undisclosed amount of cash. He was last seen walking westbound on Alameda. Almost a week later on Saturday, Oct. 10, 2015 the same suspect walked into another Seven Eleven located at 7150 Alameda at 2:49 a.m. In this case suspect entered the store with a bandana covering his face. The suspect walked behind the counter and with a knife ordered the clerk to the ground and demanded money from the register. The suspect fled the scene with an undisclosed amount of cash. The suspect is described as a White or Hispanic male, average height, about 180 pounds. He is believed to be in his mid 20s. 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
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



Basketball starts to hold court around the country

The Cavs are the favorite to make it to

the finals from the East but any chances they have of winning depend on a healthy LeBron James and a resurgent Kevin Love, who missed most of the playoffs last season due to injury.

The big battles will occur on the Western side of things with powerhouses like the Golden State Warriors, Los Angeles Clippers, San Antonio Spurs, Houston Rockets, Memphis Grizzlies, Dallas Mavericks, New Orleans Pelicans and Oklahoma City Thunder all vying for the crown.

What everyone will want to see is how Golden State reacts as defending champion. Will they come out as strong as ever or will there be a letdown after an offseason of patting themselves on the back.

Will the Spurs return to their usual spot atop the league standings with the additions of veterans LaMarcus Aldridge and David West?

In his absence, Russell Westbrook put on his own MVP performance last season and it will be interesting to see how the two coexist with only one basketball on the court.

The Clippers, Grizzlies and Rockets will all win over 50 games again this season and will all be talked about as serious contenders, but can they take the next step?

The Clippers added veterans Paul Pierce and Lance Stephenson. The Rockets added point guard Ty Lawson and the Grizzlies added some veteran depth in Matt Barnes.

Of course it'll also be interesting to see the emergence of New Orleans center Anthony Davis. Can he make them a serious contender?

For the answers to all these questions follow the NBA season closely, it'll be worth it.

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

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 83 years old. I was lifting a heavy end table back in November, and I heard a crack. I knew I was in trouble, as that had happened on the golf course many years ago. I went to the hospital and was there for six days. They took an X-ray, which showed moderate facet arthropathy, mild degenerative disc disease and a mild compression fracture at T12. I was prescribed a back brace, and have been wearing it for three months. However, both feet have begun tingling in the toes, and my foot is numb all the time. I have had periodic ankle swelling, but now the swelling is up to the knees in both legs. Does the back brace have something to do with it? – L.B.

Facet arthropathy is a term used by radiologists to describe arthritis in the back. Degenerative disc disease is very common, if not universal, in 83-year-olds. Both can cause back pain.

However, the "crack" you heard and the finding of a compression fracture are more troubling. A compression fracture of a vertebra is like what happens to a cardboard box if you put too much weight on top of it. The combination of a compression fracture, tingling and numbness is concerning. It's time to go back and get re-examined. Compression fractures can lead to nerve compression.

Kidney, liver and heart problems can all cause swelling of the feet, but I think the most likely cause may be that you aren't elevating your feet as much as before because of the back brace.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Can you explain the condition known as "stone shoulder"? I am a man, 67 years old, and I believe I have it. I spent 45 years as a TV news photographer, handling heavy cameras, tripods, etc. – B.J.

"Stone shoulder" is a new one for me. Maybe you mean frozen shoulder, a condition also called "adhesive capsulitis." It's not a strictly accurate term, since the loss of movement the name implies is gradual. It starts with shoulder pain, often worse at night, lasting for months. Stiffness develops, and then the loss of shoulder movement can be severe.


A careful physical exam by a regular doctor, a rheumatologist or sports medicine doctor, or an orthopedic surgeon can make the diagnosis. Often, the doctor will inject a steroid and anesthetic into the shoulder: The pain relief and improved movement within a minute make the diagnosis. I refer patients to physical therapy for a gradually increasing exercise regimen. Sometimes, additional injections are necessary. In your case, I would worry about a rotator cuff tear or




