Insurance coverage

Since Open Enrollment began on November 1, about 8.8 million consumers signed-up for health coverage through the HealthCare.gov platform or had their coverage automatically renewed, including 1,152,013 Texas. Today's enrollment snapshot includes the number of people who selected a plan or were automatically reenrolled within local media markets. This localized data provides another level of detail to better understand total plan selections within local communities. 59,098 consumers in the El Paso and Las Cruces local media market area selected or were automatically enrolled in a plan as of January 16. "As expected, consumer interest is beginning to increase again as we near the deadline for 2016 coverage," HHS Secretary Sylvia Burwell said. "We know we have more work to do and as we count down to the January 31 final deadline, we're focused on making sure consumers understand that they must act soon to find affordable health coverage and avoid the fee for choosing to not have health insurance in 2016. Consumers should know that we're here to help 24 hours a day, 7 days a week."

EPCU receives design funding for Montana Vista sewer system

EL PASO COUNTY – State officials have awarded a \$2.8 million grant to design a sewer system for about 2,400 households in the Montana Vista area in far east El Paso County.

The Texas Water Development Board voted recently to dedicate planning funds from the board's Economically Distressed Areas Program account to El Paso Water Utilities. The infrastructure's design is expected to be completed by January 2017, according to El Paso's state senator José Rodríguez.

However, the \$30 million needed to

County opens satellite booking office as part of pretrial services department

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso County residents with outstanding warrants will soon be able to take care of the issue at a new booking office in the lower level of the county courthouse instead of going to the county jail facility. The new satellite

office is part of the pretrial services department that was initiated by county commissioners court in October.

County Commissioner Vince Perez – who spearheaded efforts for implementing the new pretrial services department – said that the creation of the pretrial department is intended to enhance public safety and to improve efficiencies in the jailing process.

Before the pretrial services department was established, there were often times when people would bond out of jail before there was a background check done on their criminal history, Perez claimed. "The point of the department is to better screen individuals when they come into the jail... to do a more thorough assessment of their criminal background, to do a mental health assessment, and to also screen for indigence to see if they qualify for an appointed attorney," he stated.

The satellite office is just another feature of the new pretrial services department. It is expected to be operational in February. According to the commissioner, many individuals who have outstanding warrants hesitate to turn themselves in at the current main booking office because it is located in the county's downtown jail house and they are concerned about being arrested.

"What the satellite booking office is intended to do is to create a space in the county courthouse, so if an individual who has an outstanding warrant and he or she wants to take care of the warrant and wants to come in on his or her own,

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Report cards for Socorro ISD campuses are online

EL PASO COUNTY – In order for parents and stakeholders to learn about the progress and success at Socorro Independent School District (SISD) campuses, the State of Texas 2014-15 School Report Cards are now available on the SISD website and on the Texas Education Agency website. A print version also is available upon request at district schools or the District Service Center.

This is a report required by the Texas Legislature and prepared by the Texas Education Agency. It is to be shared with the parent or guardian of every child enrolled in a Texas public school. The report provides information concerning student performance on the State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR), as well as information on student enrollment, class size averages, and financial expenditures.

The information contained in the School Report Cards is required by state law and is briefly described in the "2014-15 School Report Card Definitions." The report for each school may or may not have all the information described, because the information presented depends on whether the school is an elementary, middle, or high school.

State law requires that the school report card display information about the state, the district, and the school. Where possible, the information must be reported by race/ethnicity and socio-economic status of the students and must include at least two years of results.

Making phased retirement work for you

Phased retirement – a catchall term that describes a variety of part-time and reduced-hour work arrangements before leaving an employer for good – is gaining steam. But before you sign on, it's important to understand how "phasing out" may affect your long-term finances.

Washington is leading the way. The federal government authorized the move for its own employees several years ago and began accepting applications in late 2014 from workers aged 55 and up with a desire to switch to half-time employment in exchange for receiving half their

salary and annuity.

For employees with a long-term view, phased retirement can offer significant benefits, but it requires due diligence and planning. Among the advantages, phased retirement means that there doesn't need to be a hard stop on a successful career. In fact, a 2014 study (<http://newsroom.bankofamerica.com/press-releases/global-wealth-and-investment-management/merrill-lynch-study-finds-72-percent-people-o>) by Merrill Lynch in partnership with Age Wave said that 72 percent of pre-retirees over the age of 50 report that their ideal retirement will include working "often in new, more flexible and fulfilling ways." The study also noted that 47 percent of current retirees were already working or planning to work during their retirement years.

If your company is talking about phased retirement or may do so in the future, here are some key questions to consider:

What exactly do you want to phase into? For some workers, retirement really will mean a classic vision of travel and leisure leading into old age. But for others, the picture may be different. Some retirees will want to work and some retirees will have to work. Such decisions will summon a host of personal finance and tax issues based on your personal situation – read heavily and consult qualified

experts before you make a decision.

What options will my employer offer over time? While the federal government is in the lead with phased retirement, most private employers are moving at a slower pace. This gives you time to plan. For example, in a 2013 benefits study, the Society for Human Resource Management noted that only 6 percent of employers had a formal phased retirement program that provided a reduced schedule and/or responsibilities prior to full retirement. Watch how your employer's plan evolves and ask questions.

Phased or not, do you have a retirement plan in place? The decision to make a full or transitional exit from one's employer should come after years of saving and investing both at home and at work. Years before deciding how you want to leave your career, talk to qualified retirement experts about your personal financial circumstances and what you want to do in the next phase of your life. If it's a new career, volunteer work or full retirement, develop a plan first.

Have you talked to your senior colleagues? There's nothing like direct advice from individuals closer to retirement to help you with your own set of pros and cons. Even if there's no phased retirement program at your organization right now,

it's still worth talking about retirement preparation with senior colleagues willing to share what they're doing. Also, start your own retirement planning in earnest with qualified retirement and tax experts.

How will phased retirement affect your overall benefits? If you're working at a lower salary level at the end of your career, ask how that might affect your future retirement benefits. Make a list of all the benefits and perks you now receive as a current full-time employee and investigate how every single one could be affected by phased retirement. And if you leave the company permanently before qualifying for Medicare, know how you'll pay for health insurance. This is a particularly important issue to discuss with a qualified financial or tax advisor.

Bottomline: Phased retirement can offer the opportunity to adjust to full-time retirement or set up a new career once you finally leave your current employer. However, before you leap, fully investigate how such a transition will affect your overall finances and future retirement benefits.

Slap in the face

For those who came by their service medals honestly, a recent federal appeals court ruling was a slap in the face. The court said you can wear medals you didn't earn. It's protected speech under the First Amendment.

To keep from giving him even more press, I'll call the central figure in the case ES, a three-year veteran who enlisted after the Korean War.

Forty years later he filed for PTSD benefits, saying he suffered because of the secret Korean combat missions he went on. He claimed he had been injured and when visited in the hospital by a captain, had been given a pile of medals, among them a Purple Heart, Silver Star and Navy Commendation with V. The Department of Veterans Affairs denied the claim (a written narrative).

ES then resubmitted and used a copy of a DD-214 that showed he had earned a bunch

of medals and had been shot. Based on that, the VA gave him \$2,366 in monthly benefits. In 2006, it was discovered that the copied DD-214 was a fake.

ES is all over the court system. A review of documents has him testifying at the trial of a man who offered him \$10,000 to kill a judge. After all, ES was a trained killer, given all his medals. ES was investigated for wearing a Purple Heart at the trial and was convicted of violating the Stolen Valor Act (in force at the time), faking his injuries to get benefits, forging his DD-214 and more. He got 12 months.

He later appealed, bringing us to today, where it's OK to wear medals you didn't earn because it's protected speech.

A fast Wiki-type search reveals that only one of the 11 judges in the appeals court ever served in the military.

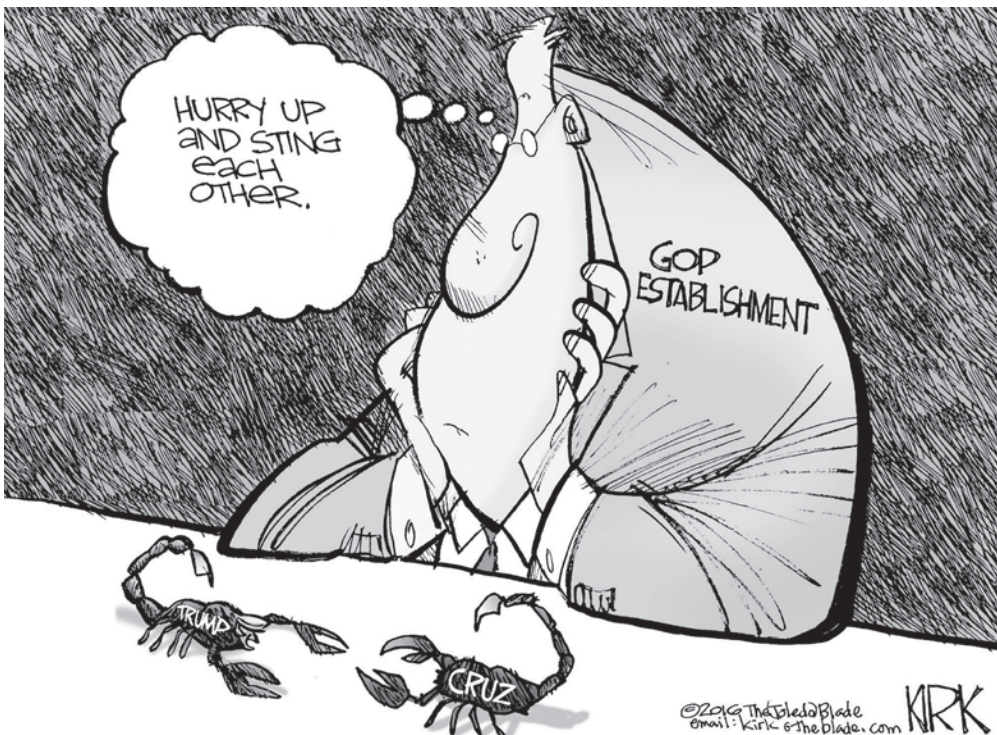

• On Feb. 14, 1867, Sakichi Toyoda, whose textile machinery company spawned the Toyota Motor Corp., is born. In 1937, Toyota was formed as a spinoff of his Toyoda Loom Works. "Toyota" reportedly was considered a luckier name than "Toyoda" and is easier to write in Japanese characters.

• On Feb. 11, 1937, after a six-week strike by General Motors autoworkers in Michigan, GM president Alfred P. Sloan signs the first union contract in the American auto industry. Among other things, GM agreed to give workers a 5 percent raise and permission to speak in the lunchroom.

• On Feb. 8, 1943, Japanese troops evacuate Guadalcanal, leaving the island in Allied possession after a prolonged campaign in which an estimated 1,600 American troops were killed.

• On Feb. 10, 1962, Francis Gary Powers, an American who was shot down over the Soviet Union while flying a CIA spy plane in 1960, is released by the Soviets in exchange for the U.S. release of a Russian spy. The event was chronicled in the 2015 film "Bridge of Spies" starring Tom Hanks.

• On Feb. 9, 1971, pitcher Leroy "Satchel" Paige becomes the first Negro League veteran to be nominated for the Baseball Hall of Fame. In August of that year, Paige was inducted. Joe DiMaggio once called Paige "the best and fastest pitcher I've ever faced."

• On Feb. 12, 1988, in the waning days of the Cold War, two Soviet warships bump two U.S. Navy vessels in waters claimed by the Soviet Union off the Crimean peninsula. A confrontation was defused when the U.S. ships departed.

• On Feb. 13, 1991, Sotheby's announces the discovery of a manuscript of "Huckleberry Finn" by Mark Twain. The manuscript, missing for more than a century, was found in a trunk with some old papers.

The Safe Sports School Award champions safety and recognizes secondary schools that provide safe environments for student athletes. It reinforces the importance of providing the best level of care, injury prevention and treatment.

"Our efficacious and passionate athletic trainers have propelled Pebble Hills High School to achieve Safe Sports School status," said Marivel Macias, SISD Assistant Superintendent of Administrative Services. "They have worked 24/7/365 to promote, plan, develop, and provide a collaborative vision and system within our Pebble Hills community that ensures the needs of our student athletes are

a priority for all stakeholders. In their hearts, our students' health and safety comes first!"

In order to achieve Safe Sport School status, the Pebble Hills High School athletic program has:

- Created a positive athletic health care administrative system;
- Provided or coordinated pre-participation physical examinations;
- Promoted safe and appropriate practice and competition facilities;
- Planned for selection, fit function and proper maintenance of athletic equipment;
- Provided a permanent, appropriately equipped area to evaluate and treat injured athletes;
- Developed injury and illness prevention strategies, including protocols for environmental conditions;
- Provided or facilitated injury intervention;
- Created and rehearsed a venue-specific Emergency Action Plan;
- Provided or facilitated psychosocial consultation and nutritional counseling/education; and
- Ensured athletes and parents are educated of the potential benefits and risks in sports as well as their responsibilities.

that person can come to the courthouse as opposed to the jail," Perez explained during a recent commissioners' meeting.

Construction of the revamped satellite office is expected to cost about \$35,000. The project will transform about 500 square feet of available space into the new booking office, according to the county's public works director. The funds being used for the

job are part of the \$1.83 million allocated in the 2016 fiscal year budget for the pretrial services department, officially known as the Criminal Justice Coordination Department (CJCD).

Perez noted that the county's pretrial services department is not a new concept. He said that these types of services have been available in the U.S. since the 1960s with the Manhattan Bail Project in New York and that other large counties in Texas have been using pretrial departments for years.

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Lady Miners, Adams, are forces to be reckoned with

Back in the 1960s, Texas Western College made one of the smartest decisions in the history of the school.

The school took a chance on a girl's high school basketball coach and hired him as the men's college basketball coach.

At the time, the program was so bad that it really didn't matter who they hired. But they gave this guy from Oklahoma the chance to try and do something positive with the program.

Of course, we're talking about the legendary Don Haskins and his humble beginnings as the coach of the, now UTEP Miners.

Everyone knows how he took a failing program and led it all the way to an NCAA championship in 1966.

Now I'm not saying the same thing is going to happen with the women's basketball program, but the school did take a chance on an assistant, and then head coach, at Independence Community College in Kansas.

And though it might not get the kind of fanfare the men's program gets, what Keitha Adams has done with the UTEP women's program will eventually become legendary.

Adams has the Miners at 16-1 so far this season, tied atop the C-USA standings at 7-0 with Western Kentucky.

This is the best start in the program's history and it's beginning to resemble the season that had the city jumping in 2014. That's the year Adams and her team finished 29-8 and advanced all the way to the Women's NIT championship game, losing to Rutgers 56-54.

But fans around the city are beginning to take notice of what the team is doing. And with the team sure to crack the top 25 in the very near future, the rest of the country is starting to take this program seriously again.

Just like UTEP was extremely lucky to keep Haskins in El Paso all those years, the school has been fortunate to keep Adams in orange and blue.

Adams came to UTEP in 2001 and has slowly turned the program from a perennial loser to one of the consistent

powerhouses of the league.

Only the seventh head coach in the school's history, Adams has already garnered three C-USA titles and has earned two C-USA Coach of the Year awards.

To say she is the most successful women's coach in the school's history is a foregone conclusion. Her 251 wins more than doubles her nearest competitor, Sandra Rushing, at 123.

As far as this year's team, it all starts with the defense. The Miners are holding their opponents to just 35 percent shooting and they chase the ball all over court, forcing nearly 22 turnovers a game.

They force their opponents to rush things on offense because of the pressure they put on. And of course once they force a turnover, they're off to the races toward the other end of the court.

The Miners have four players averaging double figures in scoring led by Janel Nash and her 14 points game. Not bad for a player who missed all of last season to become a mom.

Three other players, Cameasha Turner, Sparkle Taylor and Starr Breedlove are all averaging 11 points a game.

This season the Miners are a veteran bunch, able to count on many different players to come in and contribute when needed.

And for many El Pasoans who haven't yet seen this team, the school is doing something very smart. This Thursday at 7 p.m., the team will be hosting "Pack the House" night as the Miners take on Southern Miss.

The admission to this game is free for everyone. And everyone can afford that.

It's a chance to let fans into the Don Haskins Center, who may not have otherwise, and get a chance to watch this team.

The school remembers how fans packed "The Don" a couple years ago on their WNIT run.

With the men struggling at 3-4 in the league, fans are starting to swing their attention toward the women's team and their success.

The school was very smart to sign Adams to a six-year contract after the 2014 season. Because, the way things are going, in 20 years they'll have to rename it the Haskins-Adams Center.

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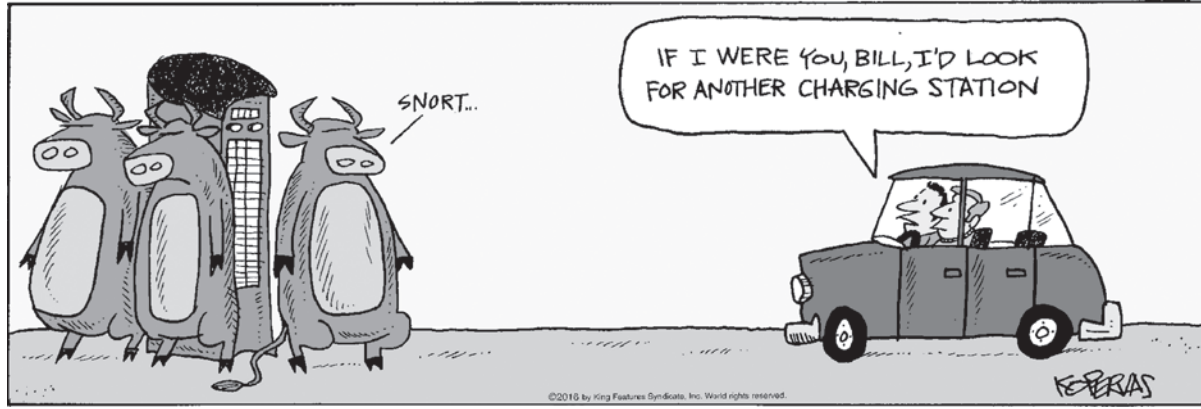

Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: About seven years ago, my blood pressure was high, and I was overweight and in a stressful job. I quit the job, my blood pressure went down, and I lost over 40 pounds. I have kept the weight off all these years. I work part time, standing on my feet about 25 hours a week. My doctor has been happy with me. At my last appointment, I was told my BMI is too high and that I am obese. Where did this "BMI" come from? I am 5 feet, 6 inches tall and weigh 194 pounds. I am a large-framed woman (I delivered 12-pound babies through NATURAL childbirth!). Now I feel like I should forget it and go back to eating what I want, when I want! – P.S.

By finding a less-stressful job. Your BMI is 31, just in the "obese" range. However, women of your BMI but whose waist circumference is less than 31.5 inches (80cm) have a much lower risk of medical complications later.

By the way, having babies that large does indicate an increased risk for Type 2 diabetes later in life. Your doctor hopefully is checking you periodically. Getting regular exercise and eating a good diet reduces your risk for Type 2 diabetes and heart disease, so please don't get frustrated by this single, incomplete measure of your health.

DEAR DR. ROACH: Last night I washed my face with soap and water. I towed dry and saw blood dripping from the side of my nose. I figured I must have scrubbed too hard and opened a pore. This pore bled and bled for over an hour before I used styptic powder. That stopped the bleeding instantly. Now I'm afraid to wash that area, as it may start bleeding again. I'm 61. I don't take any medication except a baby aspirin every night, and Aleve when my arthritis kicks up. Is this common? – J.R.

BMI, the body mass index, is a way of determining obesity by standardizing weight for people of different heights. It is equal to weight (in kilograms) divided by height (in meters) squared. BMI predicts the development of Type 2 diabetes, heart disease and even overall mortality rates moderately well. It is certainly not a perfect measurement. Someone whose BMI is obese (over 30) might have very little body fat; he or she might be very muscular or have larger bones than another person of the same height.

Some physicians measure waist circumference, since that looks at abdominal fat, and research shows that using both measurements gives a more complete picture of health.

Personally, I congratulate you for getting and keeping off 40 pounds, and think you made a wise investment in your health

No, that isn't common. It makes me concerned that the pore you think is bleeding actually may be a subtle or early skin condition predisposed to bleeding. The ones I am most concerned about are basal cell and squamous cell cancers. See a dermatologist and get it examined.

Aspirin and naproxen (Aleve)

Social Security Q&A By Ray Vigil

Q: Next month I'll turn 65 and, because of my financial situation, I thought I'd be eligible for Supplemental Security Income (SSI). But my neighbor told me I'd probably be turned down because I have a friend who said he might help support me. Is this true?

A: If your friend helps support you, it could have an effect on whether you get SSI and on the amount you receive. Whether you can get SSI depends on your income and resources (the things you own). If you have low income and few resources, you may be able to get SSI. However, if you are receiving support from your friend or from anyone else, that income will be considered when making a decision on your SSI eligibility and amount. Support includes any food or shelter given to you or received by you because someone else pays for it. For more information, visit www.socialsecurity.gov.

Q: What can I do if my Medicare prescription drug plan says it won't pay for a drug that my doctor prescribed for me?

A: If your Medicare prescription drug plan decides that it won't pay for a prescription drug, it must tell you in writing why the drug isn't covered in a letter called a "Notice of Denial of Medicare Prescription Drug Coverage." Read the notice carefully because it will explain how to ask for an appeal. Your prescribing doctor can ask your Medicare drug plan for an expedited redetermination (first level appeal) for you, if the doctor tells the plan that waiting for a standard appeal decision may seriously harm your health. actually build the sewers has not been secured, Rodriguez acknowledged. "It is important to provide Montana Vista with sewers so it can shake its status as a *colonia*," Rodriguez stated. (A *colonia* is characterized as a neighborhood lacking infrastructure such as municipal water, sewers, drainage and paved roads.)

Before any work can be started, construction funding must be found, the state senator conceded. If that doesn't happen before the 2017 legislative session, Rodriguez stated that he would seek to include it in the state's next biennial budget.

Rodriguez, elected in 2010, noted that he has been working to bring utilities to Montana Vista since he was county attorney. Prior to his election, Rodriguez was county attorney for 17 years.

In October, Rodriguez took Chris Traylor, executive commissioner of the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, and other officials on a tour of Montana Vista to help show the need for the recently awarded design funds and eventual sewer system installation.

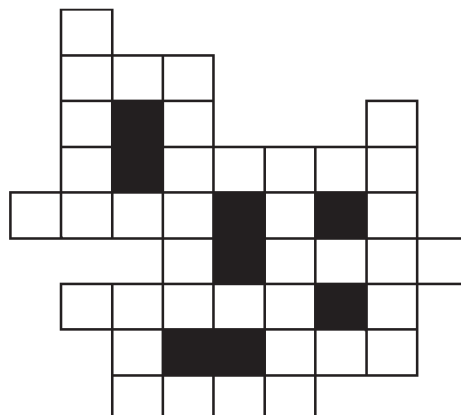
