SISD walk

Socorro Independent School District administrators, principals, assistant principals, counselors, and other staff members are gearing up to walk SISD neighborhoods and encourage students who have left school to return to the district during the third annual Walk for Success on Sept. 17 from 8 to 11 a.m. Team SISD conducted a call-out day on Aug. 27 to begin the outreach to students who have not returned to school this year. During the call-out, high school principals and counselors personally called students to invite them back. As a result of the call-out, 13 students already have returned and re-enrolled in Team SISD schools. In addition, as a result of the last two Team SISD Walk for Success events in 2014 and 2015, 26 students returned to school and graduated from high school. The students who are reached during the walk will be given information about how to re-enroll and the support services that they will receive to help them continue their educational journey to earn their diploma.

Buildings rise in San Elizario ISD

SAN ELIZARIO – Construction is underway for three new, state-of-the-art buildings for the San Elizario Independent School District. The buildings include a new Field House for the high school, an additional building for Career & Technical Education courses, and a Support Services Operations Center.

Thanks to the 2014 Bond that was approved by the voters, the development of this project is afoot. The upcoming Field House will be adjacent to the new artificial turf field in the football stadium. It will have a weight room, locker areas separately for boys and girls, Coach's offices, multipurpose rooms, and a dance studio.

Career & Technical Education (CTE) courses are aimed at promoting advanced skills to students. These high demand career paths are required to provide the opportunity to transition to a post-

Fabens High School expands curriculum

FABENS – Fabens High School has made some new courses available to students this year. Having been designated a T-STEM Academy last year, the school added a Concepts of Engineering class to incoming freshman enrolled in the T-STEM academy or who opted for a STEM endorsement on their high school diploma plan. The class was designed as an introduction to the different

types of engineering so students could begin deciding which career path they liked best.

This year Engineering Design and Presentation will teach students to draft, design, and use software to create final products such as blueprints and land surveys using U.S. government standards from the American National Standards Institute and ASME, American Society of Mechanical Engineering.

To prepare for the course,

Desert fiesta connects people to natural wonders

EL PASO COUNTY – The Twelfth Annual Chihuahuan Desert Fiesta will be held from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., September 17, at the Tom Mays Unit of the Franklin Mountains State Park. Because of on-going road construction, access to Tom Mays and the fiesta is only on the westbound side of Transmountain Road (Loop 375). To reach the park safely, fiesta officials recommend that would-be visitors coming from the west side of El Paso take I-10 east and then 54 north and exit on Transmountain Road (Loop 375), turn left under 54 and go west. The free park entrance will be on the right by the road construction zone.

A program schedule will be passed out at the park entrance on the day of the event. Highlights of this year's event will include local musician Brandon Baily Johnson, who will open the event with the National Anthem and entertain guests until 10 a.m. The remainder of the entertainment schedule will be: Champion Studio (Folklorico), 12 to 12:30 p.m.; Samathan Zumba Crew (Low Impact Zumba), 12:45 to 1:15 p.m.; Maru Zumba Crew (Zumba), 1:30 to 2 p.m.; and April Ticket (Duo), 2:15 to 2:45 p.m. The live entertainment will be presented by the City Parks and Recreation Department.

The fiesta will also include a Chihuahuan Desert animals presentation, a Serna Ranch Dutch Oven cooking exhibition, and a cowboy coffee demonstration. Also available will be guided walks and education partners booths to share information about this desert region. In addition, from 10 a.m. to noon, local, favorite mascots will greet young guests to add to the festive atmosphere and to provide photo opportunities for kids of all ages.

“The theme for this year's celebration is ‘It's Y(our) Desert’. The fiesta is an opportunity for our community to

Preparing to become a caregiver

Becoming a caregiver for an aging relative is a profound expression of love. You may find that you will begin to take on many of the responsibilities they might have had while raising you. Like raising a family, being a caretaker can

be physically, emotionally and financially challenging but it is also extremely rewarding. It's a responsibility that millions of people take on each year out of love for their families.

Whether you are preparing to care for a parent or another

relative, understanding and preparing for the financial implications can help you provide the best care possible.

Start the discussion with your family

Whether you think you'll provide direct care, decide to

hire a caregiver, or both, you can work with your family members, including the relative in question, to create a plan.

Starting the conversation early can help you all reach conclusions without pressure to make a quick decision. You may want to cover the types of care that are available and learn which your parent prefers. For example, does he or she want to stay at home for as long as possible or prefer to live in an assisted-living home or elderly community?

You should discuss who'll be responsible for managing personal, financial and medical affairs if your parent can't handle those responsibilities anymore. Beyond making a verbal agreement, a parent can give someone legal authority by signing durable power of attorney agreements, which keep the delegation of decision-making authority intact even if your parent becomes incapacitated. There are two durable powers of attorneys, one for medical-related decisions, and a second for legal, personal and financial decisions.

Your parents might also want to execute a living will, also known as an advance directive. It has instructions for the medical treatments they want, or don't want, if they are unable to communicate.

Determine what resources are available to your parent

Your financial situation may depend in part on your parent's finances and the assistance that's available to him or her from outside sources. Creating a list of these resources ahead of time can help you all plan for the future.

• Your parent's finances. Together with your parent, and possibly with the assistance of a financial planner, you can create a list of your parent's current financial assets and future income.

• Government and non-profit programs. Medicare and Veteran Affairs benefits may be available for those that are 65 or older. Medicaid, a joint federal and state program, often provides benefits to those with limited income, although the qualifications and benefits can vary by state. There are also non-profit organizations that provide

Services are provided to identified auditory and visually impaired children who reside within the district from birth through age twenty-one.

In compliance with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 and Public Law 105-17, parents and adult students have the right to inspect educational records. District policy FL provides for record access, confidentiality, and complaint procedures.

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


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Veterans Post By Freddy Groves

A vet's success story

I'm always impressed by people who do things for themselves. Marine veteran Nick Baucom is one of those people. Not only has he created employment for himself, but he's built a growing company that provides solid jobs to other veterans.

Why are his services so popular? It's the quality of work that veterans bring to the job, he says. Tenacity and perseverance and getting the job done. Decisiveness, gathering data and moving forward. Initiative, stepping up when you see something that needs to be done.

In 2008 Baucom started building a moving company – Two Marines Moving – that now has so much business that he's booked three to four weeks out. He made it to Inc. magazine's list of fast-growing companies by the time he was 24 years old. A year later, the company hit its first \$1 million in revenue.

At this point, Two Marines Moving has completed over 20,000 moves and employs 90 veterans, half of whom are Marines.

science teacher Julieta Bañuelas attended a 40 hour, week-long, hands-on training at Austin Community college. "It was very interesting, exciting and very intense," Bañuelas said. "It's just so amazing to see what we are exposing our kids to in school now compared to when I attended high school. I know if I had been exposed to engineering earlier, I would have gone into the field."

The two new courses also focus on teaching students the Research, Development and Design loop. They learn how to meet deadlines, work in teams and present their projects orally – all skills they will need in college. "With the R, D and D loop, the high schooler's

mentality is changed from 'my end product receives the grade it deserves' to 'my end product must be revamped over and over until it works,'" Bañuelas said.

By the end of the year, students will have a blue print of a cabin house complete with floor plans, elevation, foundation plans and a survey of lot and block. "I hope that the kids don't just stop there," Bañuelas said. "I would want for them to further their education and make a career of it."

Bañuelas' commitment to her students' education is what earned her the runner-up place at Region 19's Teacher of the Year Gala. Let's be honest, the UTEP Miners don't exactly have the best resume when it comes to fielding a football team.

Oh, there have been times when they've bucked the trend and put some good seasons together. But no college football fans have suffered more than those living here in El Paso.

Maybe those fans in Las Cruces come the closest.

The expectations are always high at the beginning of the year and by the third or fourth game, reality sets in and fans start looking forward to basketball.

Making things even worse are the usual opponents local fans have to endure, like the Florida International's and Old Dominion's and Middle Tennessee's and Western Kentucky's and Florida Atlantic's of the world.

Not exactly teams that get butts off the couch and into the stadium.

But there are those rare occasions when Houston or Texas Tech or even Oklahoma and Texas come to town. Those are the

once-every-five-years-or-so times that the city is a buzz and the Sun Bowl is rocking.

And even if the Miners get blown out, the fans are just appreciative of seeing their team get the chance to take on one of the big boys in our own backyard.

One of those rare occasions takes place this Saturday at the Sun Bowl.

They may not have the firepower of Ohio State, Alabama or Clemson, but the name, the reputation and the significance of this weekend's opponent speaks for itself.

Army comes to town this Saturday night and the excitement in the Sun Bowl will be as high as it's been in a few years.

The Black Knights from West Point will bring all their history and notoriety with them. And with the proximity of Fort Bliss, the Sun Bowl should be filled to capacity.

There were only 30,000 fans on hand for UTEP's impressive victory over NMSU in the season opener.

But having Army come to El Paso brings the best of both worlds. The very rare combination of facing a nationally recognized football program that UTEP can actually compete with.

And maybe even be favored against.

How often does that happen? This may be the first time.

Army may not be the strongest football program in the country, but they always play a schedule El Pasoans would give anything for.

Still on their schedule is Wake Forest, Duke, Air Force, Notre Dame and of course, Navy.

And speaking of Fort Bliss, the Sun Bowl should be jam-packed with soldiers who are stationed here from all over the country. The patriotism should be at a fever pitch for those men and women who risk their lives for the freedoms we often take for granted.

Though it isn't often that big-name schools make their way to the Sun Bowl, El Pasoans won't have to wait long for the next big event.

Next season, the Arizona Wildcats come to El Paso. The Miners will go on the road to meet Oklahoma and Army, but as long as UTEP can schedule that one big home opponent – the fans will stay interested.

The Army game this weekend has the town talking. Fans are asking each other if they are going to the game? Strangely, no one is talking about UTEP basketball this week.

Because UTEP does next to nothing to promote the football program, it relies a lot on the schedule to sell itself.

And this Saturday, with the Army Cadets coming to town, this is one of those very rare instances when the fans are truly excited about the opponent.

Heeere's Carson!

I was eating a grilled octopus at Dimitri's in Philadelphia when I learned that the Eagles had traded Sam Bradford to the Vikings in exchange for a first-round pick in the 2017 NFL draft.

All I could do was take a deep breath, because I knew I had to pace myself. The news made a walk across the street to the New Wave, a legendary Philadelphia sports bar, mandatory.

I cannot honestly say whether or not Philadelphia has the best sports fans, but I can tell you that they come off like the perfect sports-fan stereotype you often see caricatured in sitcoms and

film. In Philadelphia, the mere notion of a casual sports fan is abhorrent. You don't have to paint your face, but you must own at least one article of officially licensed clothing and you must get to the stadium off of I-95 at minimum once per year or you risk expulsion.

To recap, tonight we learned that Sam Bradford, a former top pick in the draft, was traded to Minnesota, elevating the Eagle's first-round pick from this year, Carson Wentz, to the helm. Wentz, billed as a "smart" mobile quarterback with a cannon arm, put up very

impressive numbers at North Dakota State. The Eagles worked very hard to explain this rationale to their fans, and for the most part the strategy seemed to work as most Eagle fans condoned the pick.

Well, at least they didn't boo.

Bradford was never really beloved in Philadelphia. Fans appreciated his talent but really disdained his fragility (yeah, and that's how they talk at the New Wave... "You know something? I really disdain Bradford's fragility... wanna shoot some darts?"). The guy always got hurt. So what do the Eagles do? He will be playing for rookie head coach Doug Pederson, a guy who brings great bonafides as a former Eagles QB and from his years of coaching the Kansas City Chiefs under former Eagle's head coach Andy Reid. For good measure, Pederson also brought along former Mizzou QB standout Chase Daniels to back Wentz up.

If Pederson thought Missouri was the "Show Me" state, he has to know that Philadelphia brings that mentality to a completely new level. Vegas has them at 100-to-1 odds to win the Super Bowl, but they are loaded with talent, having signed Darren Sproles at running back and Rodney McLeod for their secondary. They have a great set of tight ends in Brent

Celek and Zach Ertz. Still, even with Bradford, this season was considered to be a rebuilding year. What do they have now? A quick survey at the New Wave sets the tone.

"All I can say is this, the Eagles just better win... I'm not into this 'rebuilding' (expletive)," says a fan who hails from Pennsauken. "Let's see what this guy (Wentz) can do."

That about sums it up. Looking for a great storyline (and great meal) to follow this season? On the whole, you'd rather be in Philadelphia.



DEAR DR. ROACH: I have been diagnosed with multiple myeloma in the smoldering stage, based on a bone marrow biopsy and blood tests. Every three months, my hematologist checks my blood tests and tells me that when I feel bone pain, it will be time to begin chemo. While I am in the smoldering stage, is there anything I can do to prolong the shift to the full-blown stage? I am 79 and otherwise in good health. My only symptoms are some fatigue and lack of energy. – W.K.

for people with MGUS or smoldering myeloma.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had colon cancer nine years ago and had 12 inches of my colon removed. Quite a few times since then, I have lost control of my bowels, or have had a large movement that I couldn't stop. Last night, I had one in my sleep. This is the first time that has happened. I take Metamucil, which was recommended by my internist, but it doesn't seem to work. What kind of doctor should I see to help it? – J.W.

Multiple myeloma is a type of cancer of blood cells – the plasma cells, which are responsible for making antibodies. Most, if not all, cases of myeloma have a precursor stage called MGUS, monoclonal gammopathy of uncertain significance. About 3 percent of all people over 50 have MGUS, and about 1 percent of people with MGUS will develop MM per year. “Smoldering” MM is the diagnosis when the bone marrow biopsy shows evidence of MM, but there are no other signs of MM. Signs of MM include myeloma in the bones (on X-ray or CT, called lytic lesions, since they cause holes in the bones), anemia, high calcium, poor kidney function and high viscosity of the blood, which predisposes a person to strokes.

Fecal incontinence is a common problem, but one that is so embarrassing for some people that they won't bring it up with their doctor. It can lead to social isolation, and is the No. 2 cause listed for nursing-home placement. Incontinence has many possible causes and, therefore, many types of treatments.

Your internist is probably right about fiber, as it is very helpful in people with liquid stool, but it can make things worse in people with a stricture, such as from radiation, a common cause of incontinence. If you do try fiber, adjust amount so that you are having one or two soft but formed bowel movements daily.

In addition to looking for physical symptoms, your hematologist is searching for any of these findings. In addition, the amount of immunoglobulin in the blood predicts risk for developing overt MM (the higher the immunoglobulin, the higher the risk). A level over 1.5 g/dL puts you at high risk. Although trials are ongoing, there are no generally accepted treatments to prevent progression to MM

Other types of treatments depend on the underlying problem. Biofeedback, medications, surgery and nerve stimulation are all treatments that have been useful in some people. A gastroenterologist, the specialist in this area, or your cancer surgeon would be the right person to start with.

helpful services to the elderly.

• **Family assistance.** Whether it's unpaid care or financial assistance, also take into account the family's contribution to your parent's care. Call a family meeting with your parent, siblings and extended family to discuss how you'll take care of each other.

• **Professional support.** You could hire an outside expert as well. A quick internet search may turn up organizations that specialize in working with families and elderly family members to plan for the future.

After gathering this information, you'll have a better understanding of where the caregiving funds will come from and how they can be used. You may also discover gaps in coverage that you may want to fill in on your own.

Look for tax savings while paying for care

As an adult child and caregiver, there may be ways to structure an arrangement to improve your parent's, and your own, financial situation.

Working with a tax professional, you may find there are ways to

use the tax laws to maximize your parent's money. For example, if your mother has gifted you money, you could then use it to pay for her medical expenses. If you're able to claim the expenses as a deduction, you could put your tax savings back into her "medical care" fund. You might also be able to claim medical expenses you paid on behalf of your parent, which could include supplies and at-home caretaking, as an itemized deduction.

Find the best services you can afford

There are many different types of programs available, and someone might move back and forth from one facility or service to another as their health and preferences change.

• **Home care.** Non-healthcare related assistance, such as buying groceries, preparing meals, cleaning the home, helping with bathing and other day-to-day tasks.

• **Home health care.** At-home health-related support, including services from a physical therapist, nurse or doctor.

• **Assisted living.** Assisted living homes are non-healthcare providing facilities that may provide supervision, a social environment and personal care

services.

• **Skilled nursing home.** A care facility designed to deliver nursing or rehabilitation services.

Your parent's location can impact which option makes the most sense, and you can research and discuss the pros and cons of your parent moving. For example, some states have Medicaid waiver programs that allow Medicaid recipients to receive care in their home or community rather than in a nursing home or long-term care facility. Also, a parent that lives near or with a relative might only require part-time outside care.

Bottom line: As you prepare to take care of aging parents, work with them to understand their wishes, needs and financial situation. Together you can explore the family's ability to provide physical and financial support and learn about the help available from government, non-profit or other programs.


