Sanctuary Cities

Senator Charles Perry has filed SB 4 to eliminate Sanctuary Cities in the State of Texas. It requires local governments and law enforcement to uphold the rule of law and enforce the immigration laws currently on the books. Texas Lt. Dan Governor Patrick listed ending sanctuary city policies as one of his top 10 priorities for the session stating: "No city in Texas should be allowed to ignore the law. We will end this practice once and for all this session." "By electing a Republican president and Republican majorities in Congress, the American people made it clear that solving our illegal immigration crisis must be a priority," said Senator Charles Perry. "That starts by eliminating sanctuary cities, securing our border, and enforcing the immigration laws we currently have on the books. We cannot sit idly by and allow local policies to undercut efforts made at the federal and state level." In 2015, Perry authored SB 185 that would have eliminated Sanctuary Cities within the State of Texas. Later that year, the murder of Kate Steinle in San Francisco led to a national uproar and movement to eliminate Sanctuary City policies. In July of this year, the U.S. Department of Justice released updated rules disqualifying sanctuary cities from receiving U.S. Department of Justice grant money. "Banning sanctuary city policies will help prevent criminal aliens from being put back on our streets," continued Perry. "I have no doubt that with the help of my colleagues in the Texas Legislature, we will pass this bill."

Spinach benefits

Scientists at MIT may have found yet another beneficial use for spinach, especially when it is sprinkled with what they call carbon nanotubes, says the Association of Mature American Citizens. Nanotubes are actually tiny semiconductors that when combined with leafy spinach may be capable of sniffing out bombs and other explosive devices. The plant, itself, is "very environmentally responsive," as research team leader Michael Strano puts it. The nanotubes make it receptive to the ingredients of landmines and other such deadly devices.

UTEP to negotiate for old Asarco site

EL PASO COUNTY — The University of Texas at El Paso (UTEP) has the green light to start negotiations for purchase of the former Asarco land in northwest El Paso County, as the University of Texas Board of Regents in Austin approved recently UTEP's request to acquire the 458-acre parcel.

The desired land is east of I-10 in the mountain area where the Miner soccer and softball fields and new student housing facility are, as well as land across the freeway from the campus where the Asarco smokestacks once stood.

UTEP officials acknowledged that they have had their eyes on that land for a long time. They stated that the property would provide room for future expansion. They pointed out that presently the university campus is landlocked by businesses along Mesa Street to the east, a historic neighborhood to the southeast, and by mountains to the northwest.

The parcel, which is divided by the Interstate-10 highway,

Year-end tax moves that could save you money

The end of the year is approaching and between visiting friends and family and celebrating the holidays, your taxes may be the last thing on your mind. However, putting off tax preparation until later could be a costly mistake. While tax season doesn't start until mid-January, if you want to affect the

return you file in 2017, you'll need to make some tax moves before the end of 2016.

You might make this a yearly tradition – while there may be slight alterations in the rules or numbers from one year to the next, many of the fundamentals behind tax-saving advice remain the same.

Sell losing investments and offset capital gains or income. Do you have property, stocks or other investments that have dropped in value and you're considering offloading? If you sell the investments before the end of the year, you can use the lost value to offset capital gains (profits from capital assets). Excess losses can offset up to \$3,000 from ordinary taxable income and be rolled over to following years.

Optimize your charitable contributions. Many people make an annual tradition of donating their time and money to support charitable causes. It's a noble thing to do and could come with a tax benefit. The value of your donation to a qualified charitable organization, minus the value of anything you receive in return, could offset your taxable income.

Charitable contributions are deductible if you itemize deductions. However, most taxpayers find it best to take the standard deduction – \$12,600 for married people filing jointly, \$9,300 for heads of households and \$6,300 for single or married people filing separately for the 2016 tax year. If it's best for you

to take the standard deduction for 2016 but you think you may itemize your deductions next year, consider holding off until the new year to make the donations.

Defer your income to next year. You might be able to lower your taxable income for 2016 by delaying some of your pay until after the New Year. Employees could ask their employer to send a holiday bonus or December's commission in January. It could be easier for contractors and the self-employed to defer their income since for them, it's as simple as waiting to send an invoice.

Don't let FSA savings go to waste. Employer-sponsored Flexible Spending Accounts (FSA) let employees contribute pre-tax money into their FSA accounts, meaning you don't have to pay income tax on the money. FSA funds can be spent on qualified medical and dental procedures, such as prescription medications, bandages or crutches and deductible or copays.

FSA funds that you don't use by the end of the year could get forfeited. However, employers can give employees a two-and-a-half month grace period or allow employees to roll over up to \$500 per year. Check with your employer to see if it offers one of these exemptions, and make a plan to use your remaining FSA funds before they disappear.

What can wait until after January 1? Procrastinators will be pleased to hear that there are

tax moves you can make after the start of the new year.

You have until the tax return filing deadline, April 18 in 2017, to make 2016-tax-year contributions to a traditional IRA. The money you add could offset your income, and you'll be saving for retirement – a double win.

The maximum contribution you can make is \$5,500 (\$6,500 if you're 50 or older) for the 2016 tax year. However, the deductible amount depends on your income and eligibility for an employer-sponsored retirement plan.

Bottom line. Don't wait for the tax season to start to take stock of your situation and get your finances in order. While there are a few tax moves that can wait, what you do between now and the end of the year could have a significant impact on your return.

includes 248 acres on the south side of the freeway and 210 acres on the north side. Possible plans mentioned for the land north of the freeway are to build additional student housing and recreational facilities.

What to do with the acreage on the south side of the freeway – where the main Asarco smelter plant was – has not been determined. Because it stretches almost to downtown El Paso and is bordered on one side by Mexico and on the other by the freeway, UTEP officials asserted that the parcel has a number of unique possibilities.

No timetable has been set to complete plans and start construction according to UTEP officials. They say, however, that an environmental cleanup of the site had already been completed earlier this year.

The Asarco site has a long history in El Paso. Pilots routinely used the towers as a navigation aid. It is where a smelting plant first started operations in 1887. In 2005, the Asarco conglomerate filed for bankruptcy; and in April 2013, the two iconic smokestacks that once dominated the area were torn down.

Another 'gift' from Vietnam

Just when we thought we had a handle on the consequences of our service in Vietnam – Agent Orange – we now have another potential killer on our hands. Bile duct cancer, known as cholangiocarcinoma, can appear 25-40 years after eating raw fish in Asian countries. The fish contain small worms called liver flukes that burrow into the liver ducts, where they remain, causing inflammation for many years until the liver can turn cancerous.

The Department of Veterans Affairs has turned down most of those who apply for benefits – generally the widows of veterans who have died of this cancer. It's difficult to pinpoint something that happened so long ago, especially something as oddball as eating the wrong kind of fish or wading in the wrong body of water. The denials of benefits run the standard gamut. However, it's now coming to light as more veterans are being affected, and the VA can't ignore it.

Lesser complications from fluke exposure can include

cirrhosis, liver bile-duct stones and hepatitis. If you ate the fish, swam in the water, cooked or made Kool-Aid with unsterilized water, are getting jaundiced or are losing weight for no obvious reason, go to the VA immediately.

Diagnosis can be tough. This isn't generally considered an American cancer, but it's now beginning to receive some attention, especially if you go to a VA doctor.

If you are a Vietnam veteran who has been diagnosed with cholangiocarcinoma or have been denied benefits for it, make a note of these links:

Both of these are appeals that were decided in favor of the veteran. The text of the 2012 appeal says that they "support a finding that the veteran's cholangiocarcinoma was due to liver fluke exposure in Vietnam."

Repealing and replacing Obamacare will be complicated

There is genuine concern that the repeal and replacement of Obamacare will be a lengthy and complicated process despite Republican control of both the White House and Congress starting in 2017.

"However," says Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens, "it can be done. There is more than one way to skin a cat, as the saying goes, although it might take longer and require more ingenuity than one might think because the Affordable Care Act was designed by Democrats to be a can of wriggling worms. The law, itself, is about 2,700 pages but the complex rules and regulations that accompany the ACA are estimated to add more than 20,000 additional pages."

House Speaker Paul Ryan's "Better Way" offers a market-oriented substitute for Obamacare but it has come under bi-partisan fire. Forbes Magazine columnist Avik Roy, an Obamacare expert, points out that even if the House manages to come up with a feasible way to repeal and replace the ACA, such legislation would likely be turned down in the Senate where it would need 60 votes to pass. Although the Republicans control the Senate, there aren't enough of them to overpower Democrats anxious to preserve President Obama's signature accomplishment.

But in a recent column, Roy explained how a bill might be constructed that can pass muster in Congress and that President-elect Trump could sign into law. "It is definitely possible for the GOP to repeal and replace Obamacare," he wrote.

Roy notes that while Democrats could use a filibuster to preserve provisions of the law that make up the substance of Obamacare, they cannot use it as regards its financial aspects. Thus, the Republican majority can use what is called budget reconciliation to undermine the funding of key ACA provisions. Reconciliation requires only a simple majority for approval and is filibuster-proof.

Therefore, the partial repeal of Obamacare can be brought about using reconciliation, creating "a pathway to market-based universal coverage that reduces, instead of increasing, the federal role in health care." It would allow Congress to rescind the ACA's premium subsidies and substitute them with a system of means-tested tax credits, he explains.

Roy's approach would also prominently feature expanded use of Health Savings Accounts (HSA), a proposal that is strongly supported by Weber's Association of Mature American Citizens. "The Health Care Choices Act, which has been proposed in the House, would get rid of unnecessary and overburdening regulations that limit the use of HSAs. For example, under current law, HSA owners are barred from using HSA funds to cover insurance premiums, direct primary care costs, over-the-counter drugs, and several other commonsense expenditures related to their health."

AMAC wants to change all of that. Weber says that "Americans, and senior citizens, in particular, should have complete and total control over the purchasing and saving powers inherent in an HSA. This bill puts the decision-making power back in the hands of account holders by doubling the contribution limit—empowering individuals to determine how much money they need to save for their healthcare."

Meanwhile, if President-elect Trump and the Republican Congress have their way, next year individuals would be able to put away, tax free, as much as \$6,550 instead of the current limit of \$3,400 and families would be able to make up to \$13,100 in tax free contributions instead of the current limit of \$6,750.

I can hear the fat lady warming up backstage.

Instead of making waves on the football field, the Miners find themselves in a very familiar situation, drowning in a sea of disappointing losses against what was considered to be inferior opponents.

Local fans love to complain about UTEP being in a sub-par conference with a bunch of no-names. But the difficult-to-swallow truth is that UTEP's football program is a couple notches below those no-name teams.

What does that make us?

I know the attendance figures at the Sun Bowl are always announced at 17,000-20,000, which sounds minuscule for an arena that holds 52,000. But believe me, I'm there every game and the actual number of butts in the seats are much less.

It's got to be disheartening for UTEP players to come out onto the field 30 minutes before the game to a nearly empty Sun Bowl. Do you have any idea how much bigger the Sun Bowl looks when it's empty?

There's another saying about being careful what you ask for.

Local fans were asking for the head of former coach Mike Price when his teams began winning only five games a season. They forget what it was like to win five very exciting, competitive games against tough competition in a Sun Bowl with 35,000-45,000 in attendance.

Let's face it, the Miners not only can't string very many wins together, they play a very boring brand of football.

Except for the brother tandem of Aaron Jones on offense and Alvin on defense, UTEP is about as plain as you can get. There isn't much imagination on offense or toughness on defense.

So questions abound about what should be done.

There's no doubt that local fans really love coach Sean Kugler and desperately want him to succeed. But they also know that he hasn't, and some have been suggesting that a change be made.

When you consider all the money UTEP is losing in potential ticket revenue, it's staggering. But there's a reason certain movies flop and some companies go under – people aren't in the habit of dishing out

money for a bad product.

And UTEP certainly doesn't help itself out by promoting its product. It's no secret that many consider it one of the most fan-and media-unfriendly environments in town.

What's worse is that all the complaints seem to fall on deaf ears. Like on the football field, there has to be more imagination in the front office as well.

The most successful businesses in the world have the ability to adapt to changing times. Those that are stuck in the past quickly fall behind and eventually become ghosts.

What is the answer? I don't know, I'm not that smart. But I do know that the status quo isn't even close to working, and won't work.

So the obvious answer is to make some changes. Kugler's record in 3-1/2 years at UTEP is 17-30 and this year's three wins have come against teams with a combined 10-18 record.

What makes this year's collapse all the more disappointing is all the promise it began with.

With apologies to Yogi Berra, this season was over a long time ago.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a reasonably healthy 66-year-old male. I walk 5 miles a day. I have no knee problems. My doctor says I am walking too much and will wear out my knees. Do you agree? – M.D.

No, I don't agree at all. I think I understand why your doctor said that: osteoarthritis, the most common arthritis in the knee, used to be considered a wear-and-tear injury, and if that were the case it might make sense to protect your joints by not overdoing it. However, we believe now that osteoarthritis is caused by an injury to the joint, not by regular exercise. More importantly, studies show clearly that people who are very active don't have higher arthritis rates than sedentary people. Most important of all, people with osteoarthritis who exercise get better, not only in pain and stiffness levels, but also in ability to walk.

Exercise is good for your body, mind and spirit. This persistent myth needs to be corrected.

When you see multiple opinions on a topic in medicine, it usually means there is conflicting evidence, and that certainly is the case with aspirin. The difference of opinion takes place at the highest levels: the United States Food and Drug Administration recommends, in general, against using aspirin to prevent heart attack and stroke in people who have not already had a heart attack or stroke. However, the US Preventive Services Task Force recommends aspirin in general for men age 45-79 and women age 55-79. The USPSTF makes no recommendation about men or women over age 79. Both groups agree that your physician should be helping you make the decision about whether to take aspirin.

Aspirin has the risk of causing bleeding, and the bleeding can be more serious than a nosebleed. A bleed inside the stomach or intestines can be life-threatening, and there also is a very small risk of bleeding in the brain.


As a physician, I prescribe aspirin for those at increased risk based on multiple factors, and do not prescribe aspirin to people at high risk of a gastrointestinal bleed. This is a judgment call about which physicians may differ.





Orange Bowl history. Picked in the fourth round by the Cowboys in 2016, he broke the rookie record for most completions without an interception as a rookie, a record once held by a guy named Tom Brady... a guy who didn't break 38 records at Michigan.

Prescott plays like the pro he is every week, he plays as if he's been there before, and he plays like a leader who will take you places that you've never been before. When you can orchestrate not one, but two game-winning full-field drives to come from behind at Pittsburgh, you are treading on untouched real estate. But that is, of course, exactly what Prescott did.

The Cowboys as a franchise know how to deal with the press. While more than a few players aren't smart enough to keep their names out of the police blotter, they know better than to tip their hand regarding the quarterback situation. "I'll let those in charge of making that decision make that decision" is the common refrain. The team's larger-than-life owner is a near-obsessive fan of Tony Romo. (He has gone on record saying that he would be heartbroken if he didn't win Romo a championship. Huh? Shouldn't that be the other way around?) Even he had to begrudgingly admit that the team had to go with "the hot hand."

The aforementioned hand is Prescott's, and no doubt about it, it is scorching hot. Romo may be burning to get back into the game, but with each passing win – and I do mean "passing" win – the more it appears that we will be seeing Romo in another uniform come next fall. Time waits for no one, and in the NFL, you're only as good as your backup's first game.
