Elder orphans

The number of aging Americans with no one to look after them is growing at a fast pace, says the Association of Mature American Citizens. The increasing population of what the American Geriatrics Society calls the "unbefriended" has prompted the non-profit group to call for a national effort to come to their aid. Geriatrics specialist Maria Torroella Carney says that 22 percent of seniors over 65 can be classified as "elder orphans." The problem can only become more severe in the future, says AMAC, noting that an updated U.S. Census report estimates that by 2050 the U.S. population of those 65 and older will stand at 83.7 million, almost twice the number estimated in a 2012 report.

Accessing mental health care

EL PASO COUNTY – Today, individuals are just as likely to struggle with mental illness issues in their lives and the lives of their family members and friends as they are to have to deal with the maladies incurred by cancer, according to a recent local healthcare research report.

In El Paso County alone, estimates are that over 150,000 residents and their families are dealing with some kind of mental challenges like anxiety, depression, or behavioral and emotional illnesses.

Children are of particular concern in the region. Over half of mental illnesses begin by age 14. The recent study showed that about 44,000 local children and adolescents need care for mental health or substance use disorders. About 13,000 of them live in poverty, and only about two in five end up receiving formal behavioral healthcare.

The endemic mental health problem has government officials and health care services providers looking for answers.

Locally, the El Paso Behavioral Health Consortium, in conjunction with the Paso del Norte Health Foundation, is spearheading efforts to help ameliorate the mental health services need in the borderland. Consortium members agreed during a recent summit meeting that they want to work jointly to help transform the current behavioral healthcare offerings into an ideal, accessible, person-centered system of care.

The consortium's goal is to build an inclusive collaborative system including criminal justice, law enforcement, veterans services, juvenile justice, child welfare, schools, homeless providers, and health systems and to develop programs that would help eliminate the negative bias associated with mental illness, according to its website.

At the state level, Texas House Speaker Joe Straus this summer formed the Select House Committee on Mental Health to come up with recommendations for the 2017 legislative session. This select committee is charged with undertaking a comprehensive examination of Texas' behavioral health systems for children and adults.


El Paso's state representative Joe Moody serves as vice-chair of the select committee. Moody stated that the select committee will review the state's overlapping and fragmented behavioral health systems, including those for substance use disorder treatment.

Moody related that committee members will work to identify methods to ensure accountability and to take a close look at underserved and rural areas, as well as



Efforts are underway to improve mental health care in the El Paso region. Studies show that untreated psychiatric disorders can lead to substance abuse, poor work performance, unemployment, homelessness, domestic strife, suicide, and even mass shootings. A group of health care stakeholders, called the El Paso Behavioral Health Consortium, has come together to identify community-based best practice programs that include preventive care approaches to help detect a mental health issue at its early stage.

VA pushes research on prostate cancer

The headline on the Department of Veterans Affairs news release cited a grim fact: 12,000 veterans are diagnosed annually with prostate cancer. The VA's partnership with the Prostate Cancer Foundation can't come too soon. Their goal: to prevent, screen and promote research to speed the development of treatments and cures among veterans.

To that end, they're bringing together the big guns: researchers, data, cancer experts, advanced screenings and diagnostics. The PCF kicked in \$50 million to get things started.

PCF will be partnering with many groups around the country to enroll more veterans in studies, provide data for studies, increase the number of VA facilities applying to them for funding and much more. Key in cancer treatment will be the development of precision medicine. The research and data also will be shared with public agencies and corporations.

This won't be the VA's first

time partnering with others to search for cancer prevention and cure answers. In 2016 alone, it was part of 262 projects.

The new efforts include the Million Veteran Program, the world's largest database of health, military and genetic data; VA Precision Oncology Program, providing state-of-the-art care; and VACOoperative Studies Program, a colonoscopy screening, which wants to enroll 50,000 veterans.

Meanwhile, don't wait for a call. Take charge of this. If you haven't had a prostate-specific antigen test in a while, go get one. It's a simple blood test that could save your life. Even if you have no symptoms at all, get the test. The result will tell you the likelihood that you'll ever develop cancer. You might just be told to come back for another test so the results can be compared.

The earlier you get on this, the better. So, go.

When joint bank accounts make sense

Did you recently get married, move in with a new roommate, see a child off to college or start managing a relative's finances? The change in relationship dynamics could prompt you to consider tying part of your financial lives together by opening a joint bank account.

You might enjoy the conveniences a joint account offers, or you could see it as a symbolic step in your relationship. But before you open a bank account with someone else, consider the potential benefits and drawbacks of the arrangement.

First, here's a quick introduction to joint accounts. Individual and joint accounts are similar in many ways. You can open a joint account at an online-only bank or local bank branch. However, with a joint account both co-owners can deposit or withdraw money as if it was an individual account. The account holders can also write checks, make online payments or transfers and use the account's debit cards (if it offers them) to make purchases or withdrawals.

Let's start with a few situations where you might want to use a joint bank account, followed by examples of why the arrangement might not make sense for you.

You might want a joint account if you share financial responsibilities with someone else. Sharing a joint account could be a good option if you're married or living with a significant other. Some couples keep their individual accounts and also create a joint account where they deposit a portion of their paychecks and use the money to pay for household expenses or a shared savings goal.

With two people contribution to and watching a shared account, it could be easier to meet minimum balance requirements and identify savings opportunities. Some accounts also offer higher interest rates the more money you have in the account.

A shared account could also help you care for a family member. A joint bank account could help you care for relatives, whether they live nearby or in another state. With co-owner access, it'll be easy to deposit or transfer funds online and at a bank branch, pay the person's bills from the account and keep an eye on the account's activity and balance.

But beware, joint accounts give everyone full

ownership of the money. No matter who makes the deposit, once money is in a joint account, each member "owns" it and can legally spend it however he or she wants. In other words, you might not have any recourse if your new roommate raids a joint account and spends the rent money on a weekend getaway.

A joint account holder's debt could also spell trouble for everyone on the account. Because every joint account holder has equal rights to the money, creditors can go after the money in a joint account if they sue one of the account holders. Meaning all the money is risk if one person gets sued, falls behind on bills or doesn't pay taxes.

If you're considering using a joint account to help manage an older relative's finances, a convenience account or getting power of attorney may be potentially safer alternatives.

Communication and trust are vital to managing a joint account. Lack of communication between joint account holders could lead to overdrawn accounts or low balances, and the corresponding fees. It can also lead to disputes if the owners have different ideas of how the money should be spent.

Some co-owners make an informal agreement before opening an account together. Although it won't have legal backing, you could create a rule that you have to ask the other person before spending \$150 or more. Using a mobile app to check a joint account's balance before making a purchase could also help you avoid mistakes.

Bottom line: While joint bank accounts let two or more people share access to an account, the convenience of the arrangement can sometimes be outweighed by the risks it poses to the co-owners. Even if you trust the other co-owner, having a clear understanding of the intention behind the account and how the money will be used are important to avoiding arguments and mismanagement of your joint funds.

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


special populations like veterans and the homeless.

Data shows that in times of a mental health crisis, sufferers often end up in the criminal-justice system. "Unfortunately, county jails are one of the biggest providers of mental-health care in the state," Moody stated. He related that providing such care in jails and emergency rooms are two of the least-efficient, most-expensive methods of doing so.

Moody acknowledged that the state legislature over the past few sessions has improved funding for mental health and must continue to do so. "However, it's not just an issue of adding more dollars," he stated.

Moody pointed out that leading mental health experts are recommending that Texas change the focus of its mental-health services. According to experts, presently the state aligns most of its resources to handle mental health issues once they have reached the crisis stage, the most expensive stage of mental illness. Instead, these experts claim that more resources should be redirected to existing, effective programs that can address concerns earlier and prevent expensive trips to jails or emergency rooms.

About \$2 billion a year is spent on mental-health and substance-abuse visits to Texas emergency rooms and jails, according to state reports. Moody stated that those resources would be better spent deploying care to keep people facing difficulty from becoming a crisis. And an important way of doing that, he said, is by surveying community resources and coordinating them to meet each region's unique needs.

At the national level, U.S. Congressman Beto O'Rourke has focused on the mental health needs of veterans. According to the

congressman, the El Paso region has an acute need for effective and accessible services for veterans and their families. He said that he has been urging the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs to fill this need by utilizing a flexible VA and community services partnership.

Nonetheless, healthcare advocates asserted that the multi-level approach has an enormous obstacle that is keeping resources from being able to significantly help children, veterans, and others who need mental health services and that hindrance is the shortage of trained mental healthcare workers that currently exists statewide.

Mental healthcare professionals warn that until all stakeholders address the lack of qualified personnel predicament, those seeking mental health care will not be able to expeditiously access the services they need, when they need them.

El Paso Sports Commission to bring in premier softball event

EL PASO COUNTY – One of the biggest sports competitions in the nation is coming to El Paso.

Under the leadership of President and CEO Brian Kennedy, the El Paso Sports Commission has won the official bid to host the 2017 Senior Softball-USA Texas State Championships in El Paso, officials announced Nov. 28.

“The Texas State Championships, hosted by the

for senior softball across the nation. It will be a wonderful collaboration, and it’s great that they are coming to such a softball city like El Paso, where the weather and the people shine.”

Senior Softball-USA became the first national senior softball organization in 1988 and has remained the leader in one of the fastest growing sports in America. The organization founded a variety of regional championships,

including the Texas State Championships, as well as the Tournament of Champions and the Senior Softball World Championships, which has established itself as the largest and more prestigious championship in the sport. Players range in age from 40 through 75-plus.

Winners of the regional tournaments, such as the Texas State Championships, earn a berth into the elite Tournament of Champions.



El Paso Sports Commission, is the premier senior tournament in Texas,” said Terry Hennessy, chief executive officer with Senior Softball-USA. “Top senior teams from throughout Texas and the surrounding states have been competing in the Texas State Championships for the past decade, and we are very excited to be working with the El Paso Sports Commission on this premier event.”

That's kind of the way I view this year's college football playoff.

But the four-team playoff system, especially this year, has left fans with far more questions than answers.

Questions like, "does anyone have a clue what the criteria is for choosing one team over another?"

So, the question remains, how did the committee determine one team was more deserving than the other?

The answer: your guess is as good as theirs.

On one hand, the committee took into consideration Ohio State's opponents and the fact that they scheduled Oklahoma during the regular season. So strength of schedule went a long way toward their nod.

On the other hand, Washington had only one loss, but had an easy schedule, piling up victories over the likes of Rutgers, Idaho and Portland State. So getting as many wins as possible, despite the easy schedule, got the Huskies in.

Surely, strong consideration would have to go toward achievement, like a conference championship.

But Penn State won the Big Ten Conference by beating Wisconsin in the championship game. And by virtue of their win over Ohio State in the regular season, Penn State would be automatic right?

Ohio State in, and Penn State out.

With all that Penn State accomplished,

Michigan, with just two losses by a combined four points, crushed them by the score of 49-10.

The idea is to select the four most dominant teams in the country. Clemson finished the season with a 12-1 record. Impressive, but six of those wins were by just seven points or less.

The College Football Playoff series, with its 12 wise men selection committee, was inherently flawed from the start. That's what happens when you build the playoff formula based

on five "power" conferences with only four playoff spots. This year, Penn State ended up with the square peg, despite having won the Big Ten conference championship.

The entire point of having a power-conference structure was to help ensure against situations where teams with great records and strong schedule bona fides like, say, Ohio State, weren't picked over teams that did what they were supposed to do by winning their conference. It was supposed to add a little stability.

But we live in unstable times. The playoff committee is always

quick to point out and tout the "human" side of the selection process. I'm not feeling it. While Michigan removed itself from the mix with two losses, Ohio State, which beat Michigan, gets the nod, despite losing to Penn State, who lost to Michigan but, again, won the Big Ten.

Alabama and Clemson are clearly the No. 1 and No. 2 teams in the country. I can see how Ohio State would be considered three or four. Washington, with 12 wins and one loss, can be seen as a contender for the four

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

DEAR DR. ROACH: Can you tell me if there is any hope of a cure for tree-nut allergy, particularly for a child? – X.M.

Tree-nut allergies, like all allergies, vary in severity from mild to life-threatening. Allergies to tree nuts (these include walnuts, cashews, almonds and others) are common, are more likely to be severe, and tend to persist throughout lifetime. People with one tree-nut allergy may have others, and about 30 percent to 40 percent also may be allergic to peanuts (despite their being legumes, they share enough characteristics for co-allergic reactions). Peanut and tree-nut allergies appear to be increasing in prevalence over time.

The mainstay of treatment is avoiding the allergen, which requires constant vigilance, careful reading of nutritional labels and a plan for treatment in case of ingestion, such as an epinephrine auto-injector.

Only about 15 to 20 percent of younger children will develop tolerance to (“outgrow”) their allergy; an allergy that develops later in life usually is life-long. Your allergist can do skin testing to see if the allergy is resolving.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm a retired ob-gyn and am married to a practicing MD. I'm writing you today about autism and its use as a diagnosis. My view is that each individual is unique, mentally and physically. While autism may be one way to describe a personality, each person must deal with the world on its terms, not because of a diagnosis. I personally believe I am a variant

of Asperger's, but who knows? I don't qualify as an Asperger's if given a test prepared by psychologists/psychiatrists. Yet, I have had many life experiences that are best explained by an Asperger's diagnosis. What are your thoughts on Asperger's syndrome? – A.G.

Since I recently published a letter by an adult who believed he was autistic despite never having received a diagnosis, I have had several letters like this.

Autism, including its variant Asperger syndrome, is a spectrum of illnesses that share deficits in social interaction, communication and stereotyped, repetitive behaviors. In Asperger syndrome, there is no clinically significant delay in language and intellectual development.

I certainly agree with you that each person is unique and that the label of a psychiatric condition, such as autism, bipolar or a personality disorder, has only limited usefulness. In the best case, it can give a person a way to start learning how to overcome challenges that similar people have faced. At worst, a label predisposes others to look at the person through a certain lens and to expect certain behaviors.

I have had many patients with psychiatric diagnoses ask me not to put that into their medical record, after having built up enough trust to share the diagnosis with me. People have had such negative experiences based on their diagnosis, their label, that I don't blame them for wanting to avoid being stereotyped. There is so much variation in all of these conditions – even in those of us

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Moments in Time The History Channel

- On Dec. 26, 1966, the first day of the first Kwanzaa is celebrated in Los Angeles under the direction of Maulana Karenga, the chair of Black Studies at California State University at Long Beach. The seven-day holiday celebrates African-American family, community and culture.
- On Dec. 27, 1932, at the height of the Great Depression, thousands turn out for the opening of Radio City Music Hall, an Art Deco theater in a formerly derelict neighborhood in Manhattan. Since its opening, more than 300 million people have attended events at Radio City.
- On Dec. 28, 1973, Aleksandr Solzhenitsyn's "literary investigation" of the police-state system in the Soviet Union, "The Gulag Archipelago, 1918-1956," is published in the original Russian in Paris. Soviet officials were livid, and Solzhenitsyn was arrested, stripped of his citizenship and deported.
- On Dec. 29, 1940, London suffers its most devastating air raid when German planes firebomb the city. The next day, a newspaper photo of St. Paul's Cathedral standing undamaged amid the smoke and flames seemed to symbolize the city's unconquerable spirit.
- On Dec. 30, 1903, a fire in the Iroquois Theater in Chicago kills more than 600 people. The fire inspector had declared the theater "fireproof beyond all doubt," even though it had no fire alarm and no sprinkler system over the stage. An asbestos curtain turned out to be made of paper, and the exits were locked.
- On Dec. 31, 1985, former teen idol Rick Nelson dies in plane crash in Texas. Nelson launched his pop career in 1957 by singing in an episode of "The Adventures of Ozzie And Harriet."
- On Jan. 1, 1959, a popular revolution led by Fidel Castro quickly takes over Cuba. After Castro nationalized American-owned property and allied himself with the Soviets, the U.S severed diplomatic and economic ties, and enacted a trade and travel embargo.


