Remembering soldiers' sacrifices 75 years later

To pay homage to the brave men who endured the Bataan Death March in the Philippines in April 1942, the El Paso Archaeological Society's (EPAS) will host a special presentation by Mike Bilbo, a history buff who spent years researching through military archives for information about the original death march episode during World War II (WWII, 1939-45), especially about the New Mexico National Guard's 200th Coast Artillery unit's involvement.

Bilbo will talk about the historic Bataan Death March and about the annual memorial marathon at White Sands Missile Range that commemorates these soldiers' sacrifices, at EPAS's next monthly gathering, which is scheduled for 2 p.m., Saturday, April 15, at the El Paso Museum of Archaeology, 4301 Transmountain Road. The event is free and open to the public.

WWII chronicles report that after the April 9, 1942 United States surrender of the Bataan Peninsula on the main Philippine island of Luzon to the Japanese during WWII, approximately 75,000 Filipino and American troops on Bataan were forced to make an arduous 65-mile march to prison camps. That grueling trek became known as the Bataan Death March.

The marchers made their way in intense heat and were subjected to harsh treatment by Japanese guards. The exact figures are unknown, but it is believed that thousands of troops died because of the brutality of their captors, who starved and beat the marchers, and bayoneted men too weak to walk.

Among those on this death march were more than 1,800 members of the New Mexico National Guard's 200th Coast Artillery, of which only 987 survived. All survivors were taken to prisoner-of-war camps, where thousands more died from disease, mistreatment, and starvation.

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Bilbo will share the past and current history regarding the 200th Coast Artillery, New Mexico National Guard through recently-found photos of the 200th regimen training in the Tularosa NM area and at Fort Bliss TX. The photos were discovered at the New Mexico National Guard Museum (Bataan Museum) in Santa Fe.

Bilbo will also share information about the memorial death march marathon which has been held every spring since 1990 in the high desert terrain of White Sands Missile Range. This year's marathon was held Sunday, March 19, and attracted over 7,000 participants.

Bilbo stated that he has walked the Bataan Memorial Death March marathon for the past ten years, and that every time he travels the 26.2-mile marathon, he is

reminded that the Bataan Death March was a horrific experience for a large number of young American soldiers. "Just before they deployed to the Philippines, the very same men- memorialized by the annual marathon event- trained for eight months at Fort Bliss," he stated.

Bilbo recently retired from the Fort Stanton-Snowy River Cave National Conservation Area, a unit of the Roswell Field Office, Bureau of Land Management. He is a volunteer docent at Fort Stanton Historic Site, which is located between Lincoln and Capitan, New Mexico, and he is a member of the Fort Stanton Garrison (a living history group). He stated that he has had ties to El Paso since arriving at Fort Bliss as an Army brat in 1957 and later graduating from Andress High School.

Having joined in 1973, Bilbo served in the U. S. Army Infantry, 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment at Fort Bliss and later was an Army reservist in various combat arms and transportation training units. In 1987, he received a B.S. degree in Park Administration from Texas Tech University. In the late 1980s, he was a boating officer with New Mexico State Parks. Since 1991, he worked as an outdoor recreation planner/cave specialist with the U.S. Dept. of Interior, Bureau of Land Management until his retirement in 2016.

As a member of the El Paso Museum of Archaeology, Bilbo has authored about 30 published papers, mostly on rock art research, including a rock art recognition

Practical financial planning for parents-to-be

Planning for a baby is exciting and sometimes a little frightening for expectant parents, especially first-time parents. Saving money during the first few years. As you adjust to life as a new parent – sleepless nights, bath times and diapers galore – you'll likely be tempted by a wide range of childcare products. Some are necessary, but there are many ways to save on everyday infant purchases.

Ask at the hospital, research online and check with pediatricians for free childcare samples. They may not last long, but having a stockpile of various sample-size products can come in handy. Also ask about a free breast pump, which you may have a right to with an ACA healthcare plan.

Consumables, such as formula, diapers and wipes, can be bought in bulk at warehouse stores or shipped to you via a subscription from an online retailer. Either

option could provide long-term savings compared to buying as you go.

Discuss childcare options. Some families need the income from two working parents, others can choose to stay at their job or become a full-time parent.

Weighing the pros and cons of leaving work can be difficult as you'll want to consider a variety of ancillary costs and benefits. In the end, the decision may not be entirely financial. You could value extra parent-child time over a second income, even if it means

living with a tighter budget. But even if you're unsure of daycare, you may want to sign-up for local centers' waitlists now because it can take years to get a spot.

Plan for the worst-case scenario. As a parent, you're responsible for the wellbeing of your child. Now may be the time to prepare or revise a will and consider appointing a guardian. Also, if you don't have life insurance, this is a good time to start shopping for a policy. If something happens to you, life insurance can help provide financial support for your child in the coming years.

Whole or permanent life insurance policies will cover you for as long as you pay your premium while term life insurance covers you for a specific period, such as 10 or 20 years. Premiums on term policies may be lower than on whole life insurance, and this could be the better option if you're only looking for coverage while you support your child.

Whether you're early in the planning process or already expecting, it's never too early to prepare for the cost of raising a child. Appeal backlog growing

The Government Accountability Office recently issued a report to Congress about the Department of Veterans Affairs disability-claims appeal backlog.

The stats are grim. In 2015, more than 427,000 veterans had appeals pending and had waited for over three years. Of those, 81,000 veterans had waited five years. By 2026 veterans might have to wait an average of 8.5 years to have their appeals resolved.

During the audit, the VA noted three problem areas:

1) The VA said staff resources could not keep pace with the number of appeals, and it needs more people. The board approved a hiring surge in 2017. The GAO, however, discovered that the VA has not addressed training or space problems surrounding that hiring. VA then said that the 2017 hiring won't be enough and they want more people in 2018.

2) The VA blamed the process itself – a veteran can send in

new evidence at any point, delaying the whole appeal. Also when the VA sends out denials of initial claims, it's not clear how to file an appeal or what paperwork is required. Veterans appeal without the correct documentation, adding to the backlog.

3) The VA says it needs new computers, but didn't indicate how and when they'd begin using a new system, which, the GAO says, means they have no idea how and when the new computers would work with a new appeals process.

Do you see the pattern here? If you need to file an appeal, get help from an appeal representative. Go online and search for information about how to file an appeal, and read everything you can. Remember that the VA has a statutory duty to help you find your records, but you have to be specific about doctors, dates and places of treatment.

Sanctuary cities do not have a mandate to protect criminal illegals

“The last time I looked, aiding and abetting a criminal in the commission of a crime is, itself, a crime and the perpetrator is usually charged, arrested and held. So, why are Mayors DeBlasio of New York City, Eric Garcetti of Los Angeles and their colleagues in so-called sanctuary cities across the nation not behind bars? They should be arrested for being accessories in the crimes committed by illegal immigrants under their protection?” That is the question on Dan Weber’s mind.

Weber is president of the Association of Mature American Citizens, the largest conservative watchdog organization for seniors. He says the protection of illegal immigrants who have committed crimes is “indeed a crime and a preposterous stretch, even for leftist ideologues such as DeBlasio and Garcetti. A Harvard-Harris poll conducted just last month showed that 80% of the country oppose sanctuary cities. Obviously, there is bipartisan support for President Trump’s efforts to protect American citizens from illegal immigrants who could do them harm. Why? Because the mayhem these criminals cause has become an almost daily occurrence. Some pretty dastardly crimes have been committed by miscreant illegals that sanctuary cities and sanctuary states protect.”

Weber was referring to the arrest of an illegal charged with sexually attacking his girlfriend’s two-year-old daughter. He also stabbed a woman outside of a local bar and then stabbed his girlfriend when she confronted him about the sexual abuse of her daughter.

“The man in this case, Tommy Alvarado-Ventura, is from El Salvador and has been deported four times for entering the country illegally. He keeps coming back like a bad penny. The incident occurred just two weeks ago in Nassau County in New York, State which established itself as a sanctuary state. The Police Commissioner of Nassau County, Thomas Krumpert, told reporters that it was ‘probably the most heinous criminal act I’ve ever seen.’ But, it is probably even more of a criminal act on the part of some elected officials that they are willing to sacrifice the safety of law abiding residents in order to provide a safe haven for villains like Tommy Alvarado-Ventura.”



That vicious attack was no isolated

incident, Weber notes. He points to the pending case in Rockville, MD where two illegals from Guatemala who are 17- and 18-years-old are set to stand trial charged with raping a 14-year-old girl in a high school bathroom. That arrest came as the city of Rockville was about to vote on whether to become a sanctuary city. And, he says, Google the topic and you’ll find numerous such crimes that have been committed in every corner of the country.

“It is interesting to note that against this backdrop the Department of Homeland Security says that in a period of one week recently there were more than 200 instances of local authorities refusing requests to detain illegal immigrant criminals. The madness must end lest the United States gains a reputation for being a safe haven for all manner of criminals. If illegals from south of the border can set up their criminal enterprises in America so readily, what is stopping illegal ISIS terrorists from entering the country to wreak havoc? The poem at the base of the Statue of Liberty reads ‘Give me your tired, your poor, your huddled masses yearning to breathe free.’ The invitation does not include malicious rapists and murderers. Whether you voted for Mr. Trump or not it is sheer insanity to oppose him on the issue of whether cities and states should cooperate with Immigration and Customs Enforcement authorities,” says Weber.

He adds that illegals also have a significant negative impact on our economy and cites a report issued by the Federation for American Immigration Reform claiming that undocumented aliens cost U.S. taxpayers some \$100 billion a year. Weber points out that senior citizens bear the brunt of that cost. “Every dollar a sanctuary city or state spends on protecting illegals is a dollar that is not available to support services for the elderly.”

APPLICATION. El Paso County Tornillo Water Improvement District, P.O. Box 136, Tornillo, Texas 79853, has applied to the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) to renew Texas Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (TPDES) Permit No. WQ0014529001 (EPA I.D. No. TX0126772) to authorize the discharge of treated wastewater at a volume not to exceed a daily average flow of 730,000 gallons per day. The domestic wastewater treatment facility is located at 695 Henderson Road, Tornillo, in El Paso County, Texas 79853. The

discharge route is from the plant site to Tornillo Drain; thence to Rio Grande Below Riverside Diversion Dam. TCEQ received this application on March 8, 2017. The permit application is available for viewing and copying at the El Paso County Tornillo Water Improvement District, 19225 Highland Street, Tornillo, Texas. ADDITIONAL NOTICE. TCEQ's Executive Director has determined the application is administratively complete and will conduct a technical review of the application. After technical review of the application is complete, the Executive Director may prepare a draft permit and will issue a preliminary decision on the application. **Notice of the Application and Preliminary**

Decision will be published and mailed to those who are on the county-wide mailing list and to those who are on the mailing list for this application. That notice will contain the deadline for submitting public comments.

PUBLIC COMMENT MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting on this application. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit comments or to ask questions about the application. TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the Executive Director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the application or if requested by a local legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

OPPORTUNITY FOR A CONTESTED CASE HEARING. After the deadline for submitting public comments, the Executive Director will consider all timely comments and prepare a response to all relevant and material, or

significant public comments. **Unless the application is directly referred to a contested case hearing, the response to comments, and the Executive Director's decision on the application, will be mailed to everyone who submitted public comments and to those persons who are on the mailing list for this application. If comments are received, the mailing will also provide instructions for requesting reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision and for requesting a contested case hearing. A contested case hearing is a legal proceeding similar to a civil trial in state district court.**

TO REQUEST A CONTESTED CASE HEARING, YOU MUST INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING ITEMS IN YOUR REQUEST: your name, address, phone number; applicant's name and proposed permit number; the location and distance of your property/activities relative to the proposed facility; a specific description of how you would

be adversely affected by the facility in a way not common to the general public; a list of all disputed issues of fact that you submit during the comment period and, the statement "[I/we] request a contested case hearing." If the request for contested case hearing is filed on behalf of a group or association, the request must designate the group's representative for receiving future correspondence; identify by name and physical address an individual member of the group who would be adversely affected by the proposed facility or activity; provide the information discussed above regarding the affected member's location and distance from the facility or activity; explain how and why the member would be affected; and explain how the interests the group seeks to protect are relevant to the group's purpose.

Following the close of all applicable comment and request periods, the Executive Director will forward the application and

any requests for reconsideration or for a contested case hearing to the TCEQ Commissioners for their consideration at a scheduled Commission meeting.

The Commission may only grant a request for a contested case hearing on issues the requestor submitted in their timely comments that were not subsequently withdrawn. If a hearing is granted, the subject of a hearing will be limited to disputed issues of fact or mixed questions of fact and law relating to relevant and material water quality concerns submitted during the comment period.

TCEQ may act on an application to renew a permit for discharge of wastewater without providing an opportunity for a contested case hearing if certain criteria are met.

MAILING LIST. If you submit public comments, a request for a contested case hearing or a reconsideration of the Executive Director's decision, you will be added to the mailing list for this specific

application to receive future public notices mailed by the Office of the Chief Clerk. In addition, you may request to be placed on: (1) the permanent mailing list for a specific applicant name and permit number; and/or (2) the mailing list for a specific county. If you wish to be placed on the permanent and/or the county mailing list, clearly specify which list(s) and send your request to TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk at the address below.



Moments in Time The History Channel

- On April 17, 1964, the Ford Mustang is officially unveiled by Henry Ford II at the World's Fair in Flushing Meadows, New York. The new car debuted in Ford showrooms on the same day, and almost 22,000 Mustangs were immediately snapped up by buyers.
- On April 18, 1906, an earthquake estimated at close to 8.0 on the Richter scale strikes San Francisco, toppling buildings, igniting fires and breaking water mains. An estimated 3,000 people died and 30,000 buildings were destroyed.
- On April 19, 1775, the American Revolution begins when 700 British troops march into Lexington to find 77 armed Minutemen waiting for them on the town's common green. Suddenly, the "shot heard around the world" was fired. Eight Americans lay dead or dying and 10 others were wounded.
- On April 20, 1841, Edgar Allen Poe's story "The Murders in the Rue Morgue" first appears in Graham's Lady's and Gentleman's Magazine. The tale, widely considered to be the first detective story, describes the extraordinary "analytical power" used by Monsieur C. Auguste Dupin to solve a series of murders in Paris.
- On April 21, 1865, a train carrying the coffin of assassinated President Abraham Lincoln leaves Washington, D.C. on its way to Springfield, Illinois, where he would be buried on May 4. The train traveled through 180 cities and seven states, stopping at each town for a ceremony.
- On April 22, 1945, Adolf Hitler, learning from one of his generals that no German defense was offered to the Russian assault at nearby Eberswalde, admits to all in his underground bunker that the war is lost. He committed suicide a week later.
- On April 23, 1987, the Chrysler Corporation purchases Nuova Automobili F. Lamborghini, the Italy-based maker of high-priced, high-performance cars, for a reported \$25 million.

The month of April has been proclaimed "Fair Housing Month"; copies of the official proclamation are available at the Anthony Town Hall between the hours of 8:30 A.M. and 4:30 P.M., Monday through Friday.

Vegas on ice

Looks like when you bring \$750 million to the table, having a professional football team in Las Vegas doesn't look like such a bad bet anymore, does it now?

Since Vegas' inception as America's gambling mecca, professional sports has eschewed the town, ostensibly because they didn't want to be hit with the gambling tar brush. And it wasn't without good reason – in those days, the people taking bets weren't math nerds working for corporate, capeesh? Not that gambling hasn't always been pervasive in sports in any city anyway... it's just that putting your sport in Vegas would be like locking yourself in a cage with a

mama grizzly after she just saw you kick her cub through the uprights. (She bet the under.)

On March 27, the great city of Oakland got kicked in its rotten teeth yet again by the Davis family, those leather jacket-wearing sadists who love nothing more than to bring pain to the NFL's most passionate, cosplaying fanbase. 



Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: After being on Paxil for about 15 years, it wasn't working anymore. My doctor decreased my dose, and I slowly started Viibryd. The first week I felt great. When I increased the dose of Viibryd, I began feeling sick. I had a bad headache, anxiety and couldn't sleep, and my muscles began jerking. I went to the doctor, and she had me stop immediately, prescribed Deplin for seven days, and said that I'd had serotonin syndrome. When I looked it up, I found it can be fatal if the SSRI is not stopped. I was off all SSRIs for about 10 days but started feeling unconfident and fragile, so I began taking 25 mg of Paxil CR. My doctor seemed concerned that the serotonin syndrome could return, and advised me to take Deplin along with the Paxil. How common is this syndrome? I am weaning myself off the Paxil, but what if I need an antidepressant? – M.M.

Treatment is stopping the medication that caused the symptoms. Many experienced practitioners will use the same or similar medications that caused the serotonin syndrome at a lower dose if it is the only effective treatment, but this requires expertise and careful monitoring.

Deplin, a brand of methylfolate, is a B-type vitamin that can make SSRIs work better. It's not associated with serotonin syndrome, as far as I have been able to find.

DEAR DR. ROACH: A diagnosis of "Cameron erosions of the esophagus" was made after my gastroscopy. I was not able to find that term at nlm.nih.gov/medlineplus. Have you ever heard of this? – A.M.

To be honest, no. However, I did look it up, and found that Cameron erosions are found only in people with a hiatal hernia. A hiatal hernia isn't like an umbilical or groin hernia; in a hiatal hernia, the stomach goes upward into the chest through the diaphragm, the sheet of muscle that separates your chest from your abdomen. It is our primary muscle for breathing. There normally is a hole in the diaphragm (the hiatus), but in a hiatal hernia, the structures that hold the stomach in place weaken and allow it to go into the chest. The part of the stomach inside the chest is prone to bleeding, and the areas that bleed can be seen by the endoscope and are called Cameron erosions, or ulcers.

Serotonin syndrome is more common than often is suspected. It is an abnormality of brain chemistry caused most often by medications, especially selective serotonin reuptake inhibitors (SSRIs), like paroxetine (Paxil) and vilazodone (Viibryd).

You had many symptoms of serotonin syndrome. Serotonin syndrome may consist of mood changes such as anxiety and restlessness, but a person may develop confusion and disorientation. Abnormalities of the muscles, such as rigidity and the uncontrollable jerking you mention, are very common. Finally, sweating, high body temperature, vomiting and diarrhea also may be part of the syndrome.

Small hiatal hernias usually can be managed with medication as

As Tax Day approaches, get your benefit statement online

Social Security is with you through life's journey, putting you in control of your finances and future. With this in mind, we have made getting a replacement Social Security Benefit Statement even easier. Now you can instantly print or save a replacement any time you want.

The Benefit Statement, also known as the SSA-1099 or the SSA-1042S, is a tax form Social Security mails each year in January to people who receive Social Security benefits. It shows the total amount of benefits you received from Social Security in the previous year so you know how much Social Security income to report to the IRS on your tax return.

An SSA-1042S is for a noncitizen who lives outside the United States and received or repaid Social Security benefits last year.

If you currently live in the United States and you need

a replacement form SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S, simply go online and get an instant, printable replacement form with a *my Social Security* account at www.socialsecurity.gov/myaccount.

If you already have a *my Social Security* account, you can access your online account to view and print your SSA-1099 or SSA-1042S. If you don't have a *my Social Security* account, creating a secure account is very easy to do and usually takes less than 15 minutes.

Keep in mind, your Social Security benefits may be taxable. Visit www.socialsecurity.gov/planners/taxes.html if you have other substantial income.


