EPCC foodbank

Simulator brings new facet to training

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso Community College (EPCC) Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and Paramedic students have a new tool for "real-life" training. As part of a \$123,000 grant from the Texas Association of Community Colleges – Texas

Success Center, EPCC has installed a \$40,000 state-of-the-art Ambulance Simulator in its classrooms at the Mission del Paso Campus.

"The EMT and Paramedic program is required to train and educate students in a variety of lifesaving treatments and assessment techniques," said Tony Ayub, Program

TEA approves Trailblazers Early College

EL PASO COUNTY – Trailblazers Early College, the Socorro Independent School District's fourth early college program, has been designated as an Early College High School for 2017-2018 by the Texas Education Agency. SISD's three other early college programs also were re-designated by the TEA for the coming school year.

The new Trailblazers Early College will be housed at Americas High School, and will welcome 135 students during its inaugural year. Eighth-graders

in the Americas feeder area may apply to the program, which offers students an opportunity to earn an associates of arts in a comprehensive high school environment.

"We are proud to have the official designation for our fourth early college high school program," said SISD Superintendent Dr. José Espinoza. "This new program is another one of the endless opportunities we are offering our students to prepare them for college, careers and life."

Early college high schools are innovative programs that provide dual credit

Flipping houses: It's not like it is on TV

Flipping a house can seem like a walk in the park when it's wrapped into a few montages during a half-hour TV segment. Find a run-down property. Buy it. Take out a few walls, paint, replace carpets, upgrade the kitchen and voilà – you could make tens of thousands of dollars in just a short time. Reality is seldom so straightforward. Flipping a home can be risky, and there's no guarantee you'll profit.

Finding and buying the right house at the right price point can be difficult. The shows often start with the submission of a winning offer on a home. You may not realize that it takes a lot of work to determine what a potentially good flip looks like and find a property to match.

Experienced flippers have learned how to estimate costs and work backward. A rule of thumb in the industry is to take 70 percent of the potential selling price (what's known as the after-repair value, or ARV), subtract the renovation costs and use that as the maximum buying price.

You'll need a lot of background information, including comparable selling prices of

similar homes, to figure out the right numbers. The ability to be honest with yourself while estimating the cost of parts and labor is also important.

For example, if you estimate that you could sell your renovated home for \$200,000, you'd start at \$140,000 (70 percent of a \$200,000). If you calculate that the renovation costs will be \$40,000, you'll arrive at the maximum buying price of \$100,000. The 30 percent margin that remains if everything goes according to plan isn't entirely profit; you may still have expenses like closing costs or reimbursing your investors.

You need a lot of working capital. While paying cash for a home can expedite the sale and increase profits, it might not be an option for beginner flippers. However, traditional lenders don't necessarily offer financing for flips, especially if you're trying to fix up a dilapidated home. Even when they do, you might not be able to borrow enough to cover all your expenses.

Instead, some flippers turn to hard-money lenders, private individuals or companies that

issue short-term loans backed by real assets (such as the home you're buying). With either traditional or hard-money lenders, expect the financing costs to be higher than what you'd pay for a mortgage if you're buying a home to live in.

Keeping an eye on your total budget is essential. If you borrow enough money to make the purchase but don't have cash on hand to pay for the renovations and unexpected contingencies, you'll be stuck before you even start.

In addition to the purchase price, you'll need money for renovations, upgrades, inspections and permits. Also, consider the cost of ownership between the purchase and sale. Carrying costs, including utilities, financing, insurance and property maintenance, can add up each month.

You want to move fast. One thing you pick up from TV is that time is of the essence. In competitive markets, you'll need to move quickly to evaluate a home and put in an offer before someone else buys it.

Successful flippers may have a real estate license or work with a real estate agent to get

access to the multiple listing service (MLS), a directory of homes that are for sale. Others look for homes that are for sale by owner (FSBO) or use direct mail campaigns to reach out to prospective sellers.

Once you buy the home, there's another race against time to complete the work and make a sale. Working with a trusted contractor and real estate attorney could expedite the project. Once you've developed a strong working relationship, you may even want to invite others to join your team and contribute their work in exchange for a cut of the profits.

Bottom line: Flipping homes can be profitable, particularly for those who have professional real estate experience, but don't expect it to be easy money. Months of hard work can go into a flip without any guarantee of success.

• On May 8, 1945, both Great Britain and the United States celebrate Victory in Europe Day. Both nations, as well as formerly occupied countries in Western Europe, rejoiced in the defeat of the Nazi war machine, when German troops throughout Europe laid down their arms.

• On May 14, 1913, in Sportsman Park, Illinois, Washington Senators pitcher Walter Johnson throws his 54th consecutive scoreless inning. Johnson's record stood for 55 years until Don Drysdale of the Los Angeles Dodgers pitched 58 and 2/3 innings without allowing a run.

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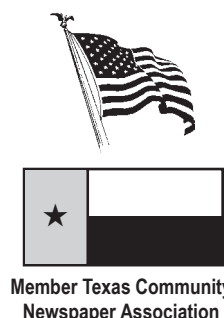

IG uncovers chaos at VA medical center

When the Department of Veterans Affairs issues a press release thanking the Office of Inspector General for a fast health care inspection on one of its medical facilities, you know it's big stuff. Sure enough, the OIG found so many things wrong at the Washington, D.C. facility that it quickly issued an interim report so problems could be addressed immediately.

Here are some of the horrors the OIG found as a result of an initial anonymous tip:

- There was no system to ensure that recalled supplies and equipment were not used on patients.
- It ran out of bloodlines for dialysis patients and had to borrow from a private hospital; 15 days later it ran out again.
- There was no oxygen on a hospital floor during a patient emergency.
- Nursing staff inventoried one storeroom three times a day and continually sent requests for supplies... that didn't arrive. Surgeries had to be postponed; others proceeded without required devices. In at least one case, surgical equipment was

removed because the vendor hadn't been paid.

- Most of the sterile storage areas for supplies were dirty; \$150 million in equipment and supplies had not been inventoried in over a year.

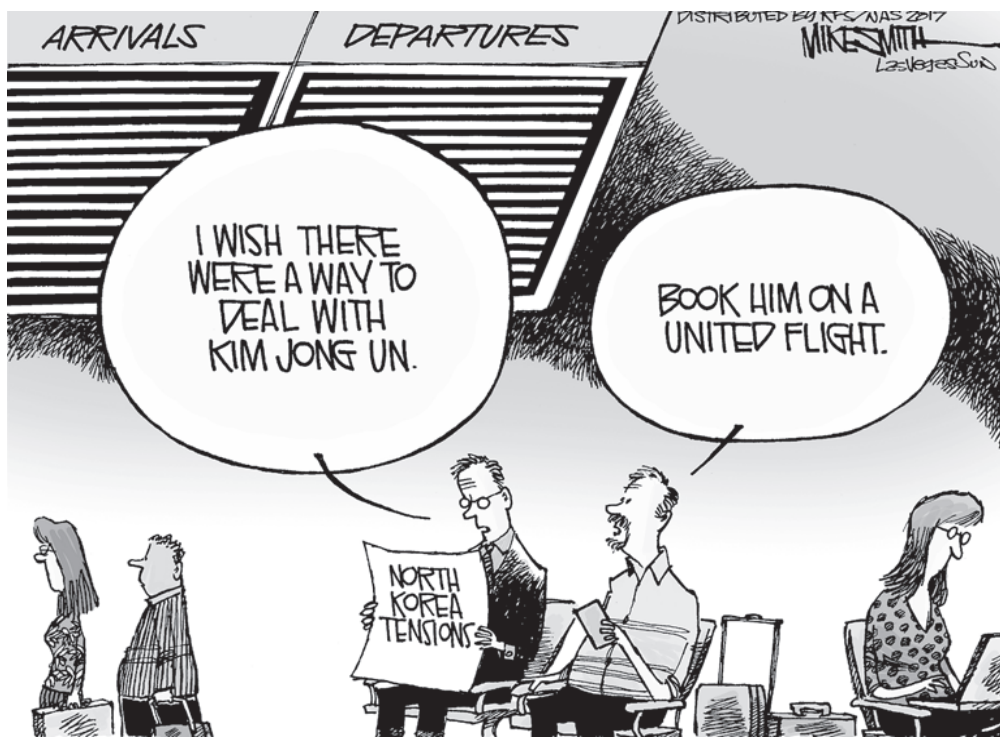
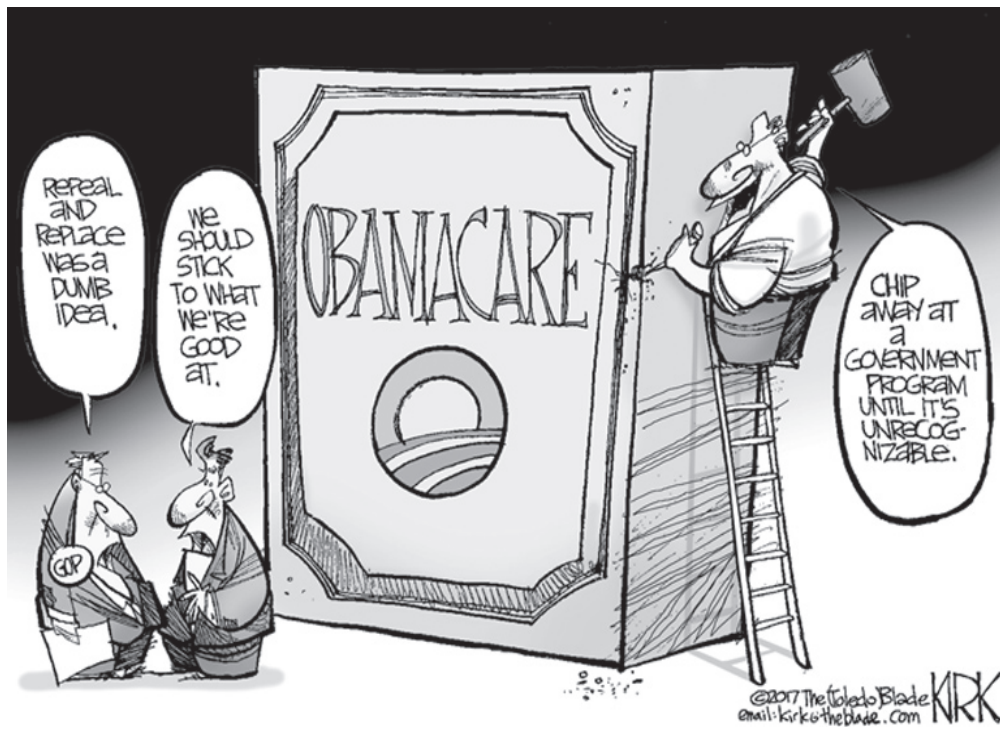
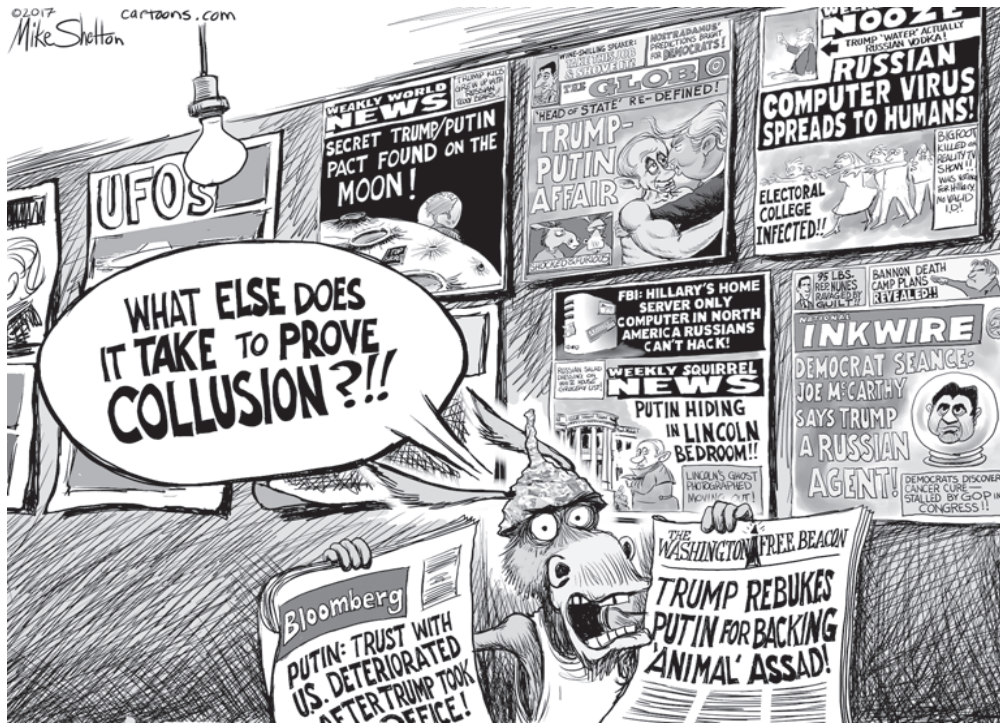
- The lease on a 100,000-square foot storage warehouse was due to expire within weeks, and there was no plan for moving the \$15 million worth of items, which haven't been inventoried.

- Four years ago, the facility got 50 handheld scanners to be used to track inventory. As of the OIG inspection, \$154,876,092 in materials was missing and not reported.

Throughout the inspection, it appears nurses were sending emails to the OIG detailing the problems of missing equipment and supplies. (Picture the nursing staff running from floor to floor and searching for emergency equipment.)

Healthcare and tax reform are linked

What does the movement to repeal and replace Obamacare have to do with tax reform? Plenty! As Newt Gingrich put it in a recent Opinion Article: “Health is the largest sector of the American economy and the most complex. Health care is at least 10 times more complicated than national security. It is one-fifth of our economy.”

Treasury Secretary Steven Mnuchin assures us that tax reform is top of mind for the Trump Administration and that it will fix our broken tax system this year, says Dan Weber, president of the Association of Mature American Citizens. But, Mnuchin points out President Trump needs to deal with healthcare and that should ease the minds of skeptics who were disappointed by the failure to pass first iteration of the American Health Care Act.

“The repeal and replacement of Obamacare is no easy task, as was evident the first time we tried it earlier this year. But, Mr. Trump is not one to give up. He is determined to give us what we want; not what the government thinks we should have. We need to deliver comprehensive health services that make sense and that won’t break the bank,” says Weber.

As the president put it in a recent interview: “We [will save] tremendous amounts of money on health care when we get this done, number one. And most importantly... we’re going to have great healthcare, and all of that savings goes into the tax. If you don’t do that you can’t put any of the savings into the tax cuts and the tax reform.”

Americans paid their taxes this week and surely there were many who were forced to

send the IRS money they could ill afford. It’s been 30 years since the tax system in this country was last overhauled. It’s time to revisit the issue for the sake of struggling families hit hard by the seemingly endless recovery from the recession. We need to fix what needs fixing in order to bolster the economy, help create jobs and ensure that our children and grandchildren will be able to keep more of the money they earn, says Weber.

“I don’t necessarily want to put accountants out of work, but I do think that the majority of our citizens would like to have a simpler way to file our tax returns. I also think that we all should be paying our fair share, with the emphasis on fair. Not to disparage the wealthiest among us, but low income earners need a break the most. So, it is only right that the focus be on the needs of the workforce when establishing new tax brackets. After all, it’s America’s workers who keep the economy going.”

There’s sure to be scrutiny with how the new administration deals with corporate America, including small businesses, in their efforts to reform the tax code. They should pay for the opportunity to create profits, but by imposing some of the highest corporate tax rates in the world only serves to hurt our own economy.

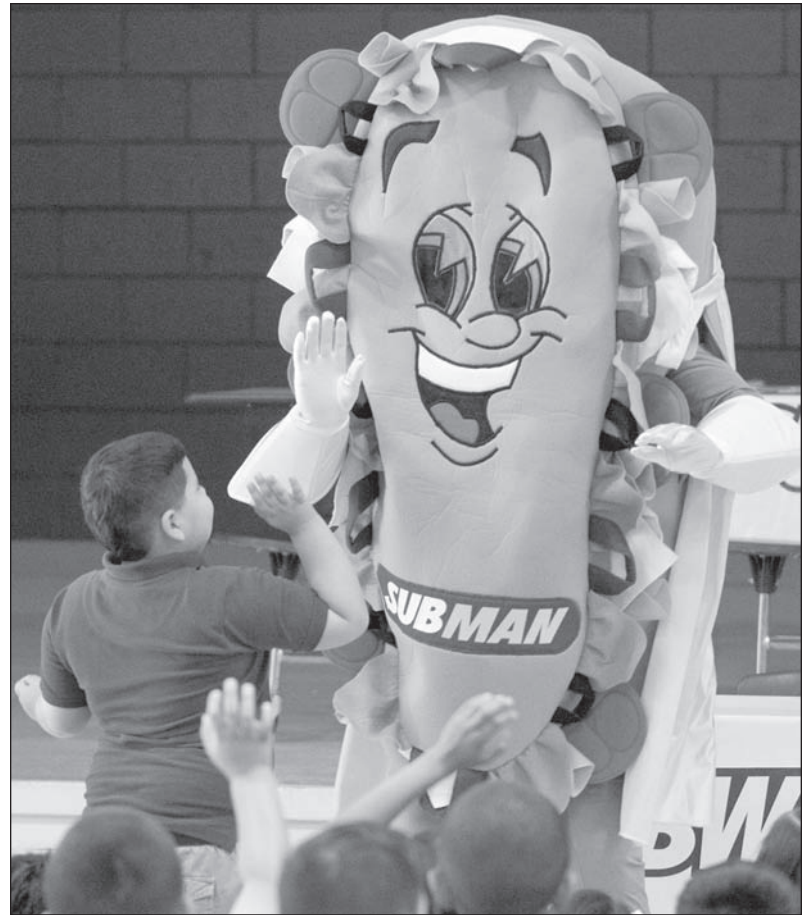
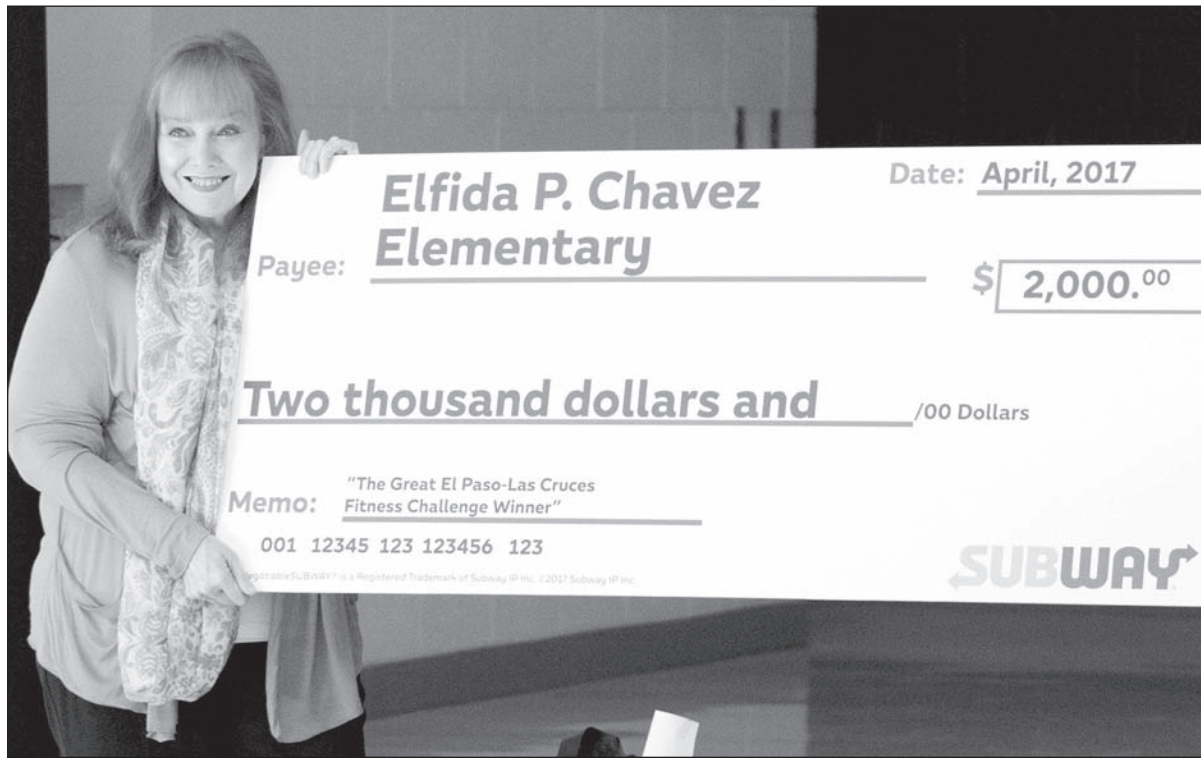

Aging with parents

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LVWD starts wastewater collection projects

EPA provides \$3.1 million in grants for wastewater collection systems in Cuadrilla and Cotton Valley

EL PASO COUNTY – Last week Congressman Will Hurd, U.S. Representative of the 23rd District of Texas, Alex Hinojosa, Acting Managing Director of the North American Development Bank (NADB) along with representatives of the Border Environment Cooperation Commission (BECC) and U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), visited the communities of Cotton Valley and Cuadrilla, where the Lower Valley Water District (LVWD) is getting ready to start construction on two projects that will provide wastewater collection and treatment services for more than 365 residents in both areas.

Altogether, LVWD is receiving a total of US\$3.1 million in grants for construction of both projects. The funds are being provided by EPA through the Border Environment Infrastructure Fund (BEIF), which is administered by NADB and BECC. A ceremonial signing of the \$1.8 million grant agreement for the Cuadrilla project was held during the visit.

“Making sure that these families have access to sanitary sewer services is critical and urgent. With these federal resources, the Lower Valley Water District will be able to improve wastewater collection and treatment for more than 350 residents and provide a healthier and cleaner environment in the region,” stated Congressman Hurd. “I am proud to have recommended these projects for federal grants, and am confident that the NADB and BECC are looking out for the best interests of El Paso residents.”

“These projects will allow for the proper collection and treatment of wastewater flows for residents in these areas,” stated Mr. Hinojosa. “The projects would not be possible without BEIF funding, which has been instrumental in the development of priority wastewater projects in communities along the U.S.-Mexico border.”

During the visit, LVWD General Manager Jack Alayyan explained that in Cuadrilla, approximately 27 homes are

connected to a deteriorated sewer system that conveys collected flows to a small, non-compliant treatment plant that discharges untreated or inadequately treated wastewater to an irrigation canal adjacent to the plant. The project consists of replacing the sewer system and installing a new package plant with the capacity to treat up to 14,000 gallons per day of wastewater.

Mr. Alayyan also provided an update on the project for Cotton Valley, which consists of the construction of a new wastewater collection system to provide first-time sewer service to 78 households, including the decommissioning of their current on-site disposal systems. Construction is expected to begin in late May or early June.

Upon completion, the two projects will eliminate approximately 38,160 gallons a day of untreated or inadequately treated wastewater discharges.

In the water and wastewater sector, as of December 31, 2016, NADB has provided more than US\$927 million in loans and grants for 135 certified projects in the U.S.-Mexico border region.

Five years dead

Five years ago, Aaron Hernandez was one of the brightest prospective players in the NFL, a 22-year-old all-pro tight end out of the University of Florida who had just signed a lucrative five-year, \$40 million contract with the perennial champion New England Patriots.

During that span of time, if Aaron Hernandez had chosen to walk a different path, barring injuries, he would have made the playoffs all five of those years and would be wearing two Super Bowl rings. More than likely, he would be negotiating an extension. On April 19, he'd be joining his teammates at the White House, celebrating their latest Super Bowl victory.

Instead, sometime during the early morning of April 19, Aaron Hernandez hanged himself inside his cell at the Souza-Baranowski Correctional Center in Lancaster, Massachusetts, where he was imprisoned for life for murder, five days after being acquitted in a separate double murder trial.

Think about that for a moment. The man could have made millions... won two Super Bowls as part of the best TE super tandem in NFL history with Rob Gronkowski, lived happily ever after with his pretty fiancée and beautiful daughter in their mansion with in-ground pool, but he thought this was the better path to take:

July 16, 2012: Two men, Daniel

de Abreu and Safiro Furtado, are shot to death in their car as they wait at a red light in Boston's South End neighborhood.

August 27, 2012: Hernandez signs a five-year, \$40 million contract with the New England Patriots.

February 2013: An associate, Alexander Bradley, is shot in the face in Florida. Bradley files a lawsuit alleging that Hernandez shot him after they argued at a strip club.

June 17, 2013: The body of Odin Lloyd, a semi-professional football player who was dating the sister of Hernandez's fiancée, is found about a mile from Hernandez's mansion in North Attleborough, Massachusetts.

June 26, 2013: Hernandez is arrested on a murder charge in

Lloyd's slaying and later pleads not guilty. The Patriots release him hours after his arrest.

May 15, 2014: Hernandez is indicted on two counts of first-degree murder and other charges in connection with the shootings of de Abreu and Furtado.

May 28, 2014: Hernandez pleads not guilty to charges in connection with the deaths of de Abreu and Furtado.

Jan. 9, 2015: Hernandez goes on trial for murder in Lloyd's killing.

April 15, 2015: Hernandez is convicted of first-degree murder; carries a mandatory sentence of life imprisonment.

Feb. 14, 2017: Hernandez goes on trial for murder in the 2012 killings of Daniel de Abreu and Safiro Furtado.

April 7, 2017: The jury begins deliberating.

April 14, 2017: Hernandez is acquitted of murder in the 2012 killings of Daniel de Abreu and Safiro Furtado.

April 19, 2017: Hangs himself at age 27.

This is a bizarre world, and the world of sports is supposed to offer you an escape. I have no words to convey how truly sad I am that Aaron Hernandez turned out to be such a disappointment. May God have mercy on his soul and bless his daughter and family.

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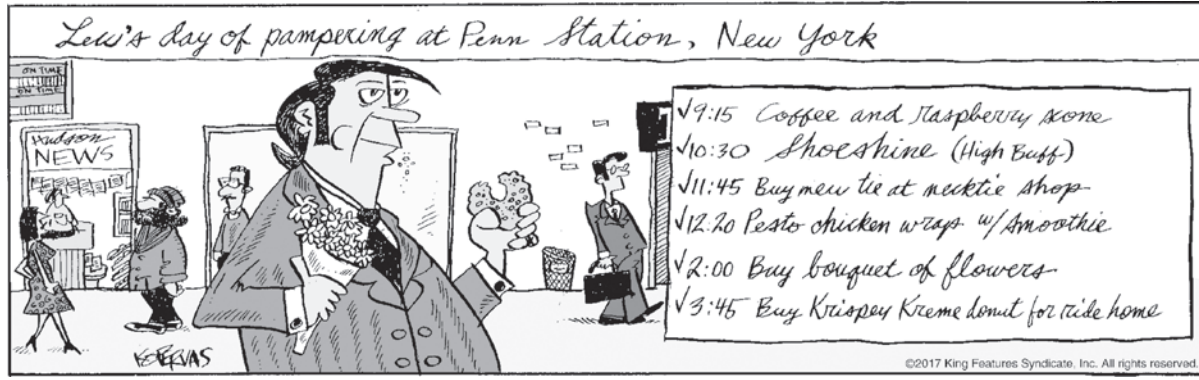

Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have been contending with blepharospasm for years. I got some relief from Botox for around four years, but then it stopped working and my doctor moved me to Dysport, which was horrible. It did not relax my symptoms, and it made me constantly very uncomfortable (with a feeling that my eyes were swollen all the time). I stopped the treatments and have been able to cope, until the past six months. I am almost unable to read, look at a computer screen or drive. Do you have any suggestions? I use Ativan to try to relax the stress of the blinking, but even that has lost its effect. I have been discouraged from getting a limited myectomy because of the risks. My ophthalmologist said that a neurologist would be a waste of time. I am desperate for another opinion. – B.B.

are the experts in dystonia. The neurologist will have an opinion on trying a different form of botulinum toxin, as well as other treatments.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I'm a 61-year-old woman who was diagnosed with notalgia paresthetica about five years ago. Several years later, my general practitioner told me to use capsaicin, which helps with the tingling feeling, but sometimes it feels like someone is pinching my spine and the skin tingles, bringing on a very uncomfortable feeling. Can you tell me any more about this skin condition? I am beginning to believe that it is getting worse. – Anon.

Notalgia paresthetica is common, but often not diagnosed, and usually causes an itching under one shoulder blade. It sometimes is associated with curvature of the spine (scoliosis). It isn't curable, and often gets better and worse. Capsaicin, lidocaine patch and other creams usually provide some relief. Botulinum toxin and nerve block occasionally are used for people with more severe symptoms who don't respond.

Blepharospasm is an uncontrollable muscle spasm around the eyes, often causing blinking and twitching. It ranges from occasional and mild to the much more severe and disabling condition you report.

Treatment with botulinum toxin is effective for most people. Botulinum toxin, directly injected into muscle, weakens or paralyzes the muscle. There are three types of botulinum toxin A currently available in the United States: Botox, Dysport and Xeomin, as well as botulinum toxin B (Myobloc). I suspect your ophthalmologist changed brands because of the concern of antibodies your body may have developed to the Botox.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am a 79-year-old male with mild Parkinson's disease and Type 2 diabetes. I can walk about 10 feet before becoming terribly short of breath and weak. I have been this way for several years, and it has become increasingly worse. Can you help me? – K.C.

I would never say that a neurologist would be a waste of time. Blepharospasm is a limited form of dystonia, and neurologists

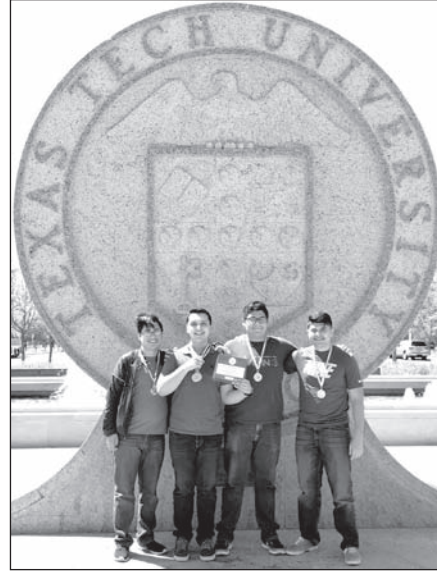

- Replace your pricey dryer sheets with a reusable alternative. To a jar with a wide mouth and tight-closing lid, add two to three dish sponges, and a 50-50 mix of liquid fabric softener and water. Cap jar and shake to distribute. When the washing is done and you have your clothes in the dryer, pull out a sponge, squeeze excess liquid back into the jar and pop the sponge into the dryer. When the clothes are dry, put the now-dry sponge back in the jar for the next time. Refill liquid as needed. This really extends your fabric softener!

- “I always keep a ‘toilet tote’ in my car when I travel. Inside the tote bag I put disposable gloves, a can of disinfecting spray, a container of bathroom wipes and a roll each of toilet paper and paper towels. 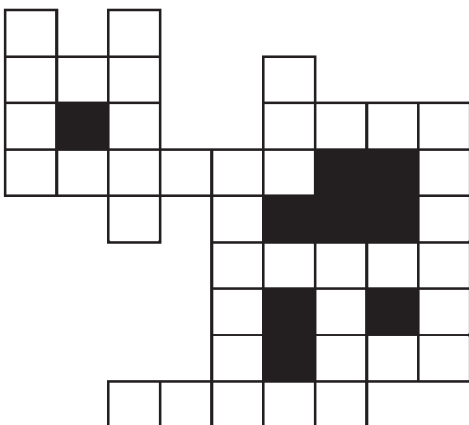
