Fireworks sales allowed in El Paso County

EL PASO COUNTY – El Paso County residents will be able to celebrate the Fourth of July with fireworks around unincorporated areas of the county. Fireworks stands are now open for business.

El Paso County Commissioners recently took no action on banning fireworks because the Keetch-Byram Drought Index did not meet the drought conditions to call for a ban.

However, fireworks are still not allowed in the city of El Paso, Horizon, Clint, San Elizario, and the Village of Vinton.

The city of Socorro will have a fireworks display as part of its Independence Day Extravaganza, from 7 p.m. to midnight, Thursday, July 1, at Cougar Park.

Admission will be free.

In Anthony, Texas, individuals can purchase fireworks starting this week but they can only pop them on the Fourth of July.

The city of Anthony, New Mexico has a fireworks ordinance that allows the use of fireworks through July 6.

The index must reach 575 before June 15 in order for the county judge to declare an emergency disaster declaration and ask the governor to restrict the sales of sticks and fins fireworks. Those are considered more dangerous because they shoot into the air and are hard to control. The most recent drought index reading was at 528, according to county officials.

"We did not meet that index... we are essentially in the same spot we were last year," County Judge Veronica Escobar stated recently.

The drought index ranges from zero to 800, with zero representing no moisture depletion and 800 representing absolutely dry conditions, according to the Texas Weather Connection.

Fireworks in the county were allowed last year after a five-year ban due to the dry conditions in the region.

House Bill 25 removes option for straight-ticket vote from Texas ballots

TEXAS – Texas voters will no longer have the straight-ticket option to vote for an entire party's slate. Under House Bill 25 that was signed recently by Governor Greg Abbott, the new law will eliminate the straight-ticket voting option starting in September 2020.

Straight-ticket voting, the option for voters to check one box to cast a ballot

for every candidate from a single political party, accounted for nearly 64 percent of total votes cast in Texas' 10 largest counties in the 2016 general election.

Supporters of the bill say removing the option will force voters to make more informed decisions in individual elections, but opponents say the legislation will disproportionately impact minority voters.

During the Legislative session the

EL PASO COUNTY – Academy Award and Tony Award nominee Kathleen Turner will appear at the 10th anniversary edition of the El Paso Community Foundation's Plaza Classic Film Festival.

The two-time Golden Globe Award winner will sit down for an on-stage interview before a showing of the Francis Ford Coppola-directed *Peggy Sue Got Married* (1986) at 7 p.m. Friday, August 4 in the Plaza Theatre.

She'll return to the Plaza stage the next day to appear with another box-office hit, *Romancing the Stone* (1984), at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, August 5.

Turner will also appear for an autograph signing from 1 to 2:30 p.m. Saturday, August 5 in the Foundation Room, 333 N. Oregon Street, across from San Jacinto Plaza.

Turner, known for her intense performances and sensuously husky voice, was nominated for an Academy Award for her portrayal of the time-traveling Peggy Sue Bodell in *Peggy Sue Got Married*. She won a Golden Globe for playing romance novelist Joan Wilder in *Romancing the Stone*.

Turning your hobby into a career

You can break personal finance income, expenses and savings. into three broad categories: Your personal cash flow

statement lists your income and expenses and a common goal is to end each month with a positive balance – with money left over to put into savings.

We often tend to focus on how to make the most with what we have, but don't forget the third category. With planning, dedication and an understanding of how your skill set could benefit clients, you could make the transition to a more entrepreneurial role and increase your income.

16 agencies scammed, and no one noticed

A former National Guard veteran is going to jail for a long-running scam that netted him more than \$750,000.

The big question is how this could involve 16 different government agencies and have gone on for so many years. Those agencies included the Department of Veterans Affairs, the Department of Commerce, Social Security Administration and his state's employment security department.

The scam started in 2005 when Darryl Wright was serving in Iraq as part of the National Guard. A rocket landed some considerable distance away, and no one was injured. Wright, however, took it as an opportunity to cash in, beginning with using a fake photo of a damaged vehicle as part of his claim.

Among the many ways Wright had his hand out for money:

- His sister was recruited as his caregiver and was paid big money. The claim was that he was so disabled he couldn't even tie his shoes. Their mother was apparently in on the scam as well, falsifying nursing documents.

- While Wright was claiming that he couldn't even get out of bed two-to-five days a week, he was coaching a high-school team and playing basketball. He also was employed full time at the Department of Commerce.

- He then claimed disability at his Commerce job, defrauding the Office of Personnel Management, and turned in fake orders about being on military leave. He defrauded the state by claiming unemployment and used his alleged disability to keep from paying his student loans, defrauding the Department of Education.

The only person to catch on was a co-worker at Commerce who discovered the fake military-leave documents. Wright threatened a lawsuit, and as a result Commerce tried to suspend the co-worker. She had to spend tens of thousands of dollars to defend herself.

And did I mention that Wright also pushed for and received a Purple Heart and Combat Action Badge?

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
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SISD Technology Services wins 2017 Tyler Public Sector Excellence Award

The award submissions are evaluated by members of the Tyler leadership team


who judge the entry based on business value, maturity, innovation and relevance to other public sector organizations, according to Tyler Technologies.

• On July 10, 1962, the United States Patent Office issues Swedish engineer Nils Bohlin a patent for his three-point automobile safety belt. The National Traffic and Motor Vehicle Safety Act of 1966 made seat belts mandatory on all new American vehicles from the 1968 model year onward.

• On July 11, 1804, Vice President Aaron Burr fatally shoots his long-time political antagonist Alexander Hamilton in a duel. Charged with murder in New York and New Jersey, Burr, still the vice president, returned to Washington, D.C., where he finished his term immune from prosecution.

• On July 12, 1957, Dwight Eisenhower becomes the first president to ride in a helicopter. Although helicopters had been tested since 1947, it was not until 10 years later that a president considered using the new machine for short, official trips to and from the White House.

• On July 13, 1978, Ford Motor Company chairman Henry Ford II fires Lee Iacocca as Ford's president. The following year, Iacocca was hired as president of the nearly bankrupt Chrysler Corporation, which ended up getting a \$1.5 billion bailout from Congress.

• On July 14, 1789, Parisian revolutionaries and mutinous troops storm and dismantle the Bastille, signaling the start of the French Revolution. The royal fortress had come to symbolize the tyranny of the Bourbon monarchs.

• On July 15, 2002, John Walker Lindh, the "American Taliban," accepts a plea-bargain deal and pleads guilty to one count of supplying services to the Taliban and carrying weapons. Lindh was sentenced to 20 years in prison.

• On July 16, 1935, the world's first parking meter is installed on the corner of First Street and Robinson Avenue in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Indignant opponents of the meters considered paying for parking un-American, as it forced drivers to pay what amounted to a tax on their cars.

Stagnation in sports is never a good thing. Ask anyone associated with Major League Baseball, which has been stuck in a time warp for over a century.

Whether its rules or relocations or logos or even shameful gimmicks, every league had better be moving forward, or it'll suffer the alternative.

The NBA season just concluded with the Golden State Warriors winning their second championship in the last three years.

While everyone either loves to root for, or against, a dynasty, it's not good when the team on top can't even find a sniff of competition.

And that's exactly what the NBA suffered from this season. The regular season and especially the playoffs, were excruciatingly boring because everyone, including grandma, knew that the Warriors and the Cleveland Cavs were going to meet in the finals.

Just like in any relationship, once things

get that predictable, they turn sour pretty quickly.

Everyone who follows the game knows exactly who the good teams are, who the middle-of-the-pack teams are, and which teams barely have any business being in the league at all.

And guess what, there hasn't been any changes to that list in a few years... boring!

But just when it appeared that the NBA was going to go through another predictable copy-and-paste season in 2018, last week happened.

The NBA draft introduced a bevy of new faces and talent into the league that many feel will change things for the better. When you throw in a few trades and some upcoming free agent moves, the league will look quite different next season.

And that's always a good thing.

The biggest story of the draft has to do with Lonzo Ball and his new team, the Lakers, for many reasons.

Can Ball bring the Lakers back to prominence? Will Magic Johnson's influence make a positive difference? What kind of controversy will LeVar Ball's mouth bring to the team?

Of course it didn't take long for LeVar, who said because the Lakers drafted his son, they were guaranteed to make the playoffs next season.

Whether you love daddy Ball or hate him, he's never boring and that will bring tons of attention to a team that isn't used to needing any – but does now.

Then there was the shocking trade of Chicago's Jimmy Butler to Minnesota.

Many might think, what in the world is Butler going to do in Minnesota, a perennial loser?

But think about it, the Timberwolves now have Butler, and Karl Anthony-Towns (25 points, 12 rebounds) and Andrew Wiggins (23.6 points) and Ricky Rubio (11 points, 9 assists).

I'm not saying we'll see them contend for a title next season, but don't be surprised if the 31-51 team turns those numbers around in 2018.

Then there are the Boston Celtics, who are coming off a season in which they had the best record in the Eastern Conference, though everyone knew the best team was still the Cavaliers.

But Boston just got even better by drafting Duke's Jayson Tatum with the

third pick. Plus, there's been talk all season that Utah all-star Gordon Hayward will sign with the Celtics soon.

With a year's experience and the confidence of winning the East behind them, the Celtics should be considered a real threat next season.

It's gets even better. The Clippers' Chris Paul and Blake Griffin have both decided to test the free agent waters this year. Obviously both will affect greatly whatever team they sign with.

There's even talk that Clippers' center DeAndre Jordan will be traded.

Because of draft picks and trades, don't be surprised if teams like the Charlotte Hornets and the Philadelphia 76ers see a move upward.

Again, any shift up or down by teams is a good thing for the league. The unknown is quite exhilarating. Just like when you walk out of movie theater saying to yourself, "man, I never even saw that coming."

I'm not saying that the rest of the league has caught up with Golden State just yet, they are still the prohibited favorites to win it all next season.

But it'll sure be fun talking about someone else for a change.

Don't bet on it

So it's going to happen after all: Floyd Mayweather (49-0) will take on Conor McGregor (0-0) Aug. 26 at the T-Mobile Arena in Las Vegas.

The fight will be historic on several levels. If Mayweather wins, he will have a 50-0 record, breaking the 49-0 tie he now shares with Rocky Marciano. Also, it likely will be the highest grossing fight in history, pulling in well north of \$600 million when you factor in merchandising and licensing.

Vegas odds have Mayweather as the 6-1 favorite, but 90 percent of the action has been on McGregor, according to Caesar's Palace. My advice to any sane person? Don't bet on it. I see the

fight working itself out in the following scenarios:

1. Floyd toys with McGregor for 3-4 rounds before viciously knocking him out in the 5th or 6th;
2. McGregor is disqualified for kicking or doing something bizarre;
3. The ref stops the fight for humane reasons because McGregor won't go down; and
4. Floyd slips on McGregor's blood and McGregor catches him with a hard left and knocks Mayweather out, scoring the greatest upset in sports history.

That's my take. Here are a few other educated takes:

Sugar Ray Leonard: "It's boxing, the dominant boxer

wins... they say it's gonna make a mockery out of [boxing], I don't think so... not one fight." (TMZ Sports)

Mike Tyson: "McGregor doesn't win in a boxing match... [he's] going to look really ridiculous boxing him." (Sirius XM Channel 93)

Oscar De La Hoya: "McGregor is not a boxer. And he's going up against the best boxer on the planet? In our generation? Against Mayweather? And he's 0-0? It's impossible! I couldn't beat him!"

Jim Lampley: "McGregor's style is exactly the wrong style for fighting Floyd Mayweather. He's not an attacker; he's a counterpuncher... I'm a hundred percent certain the boxer is going to win." (Fight Hub TV)

the other guy always has a puncher's chance. A fluke left out of nowhere? It's happened before. You never know. Think Rocky and Apollo. By the way, what does Rocky think?

Sylvester Stallone (Rocky): "Mayweather would be facing first-degree murder charges [after the fight]. It wouldn't even be fair."

I wouldn't bet on that either, but we'll see soon enough.



Your good health By Keith Roach, M.D.

DEAR DR. ROACH: A few years ago, despite regular use of sunscreen, I noticed a couple of small, dark patches on my face. I began using a product that contained 2 percent hydroquinone, which the package says is a "targeted skin lightener." The problem is, those dark patches haven't changed at all, except that they are a lot bigger. My questions are: Is this product really effective? Would my skin discoloration be even worse if I hadn't used it? Does the product perhaps make the problem worse? Finally, what is your recommendation for treating skin discolorations? – N.C.

Hydroquinone can be very irritating to some people. A rare complication is ochronosis, a blue-black discoloration of the skin. The safety of hydroquinone is argued: It has been banned in Europe, although ochronosis happens primarily in Africa, where large portions of the body often are treated and the purity of the product is, at best, questionable.

Hydroquinone inhibits an enzyme necessary for making melanin, so if the darkening of the skin on your face is due to melanin (and most are), then hydroquinone ought to work. If it's not, it's possible that of the more than 50 conditions that can cause dark coloration of the skin listed in my textbook, you have one not due to melanin production.

It's unlikely that hydroquinone has made the problem worse, but I can't answer if things would be worse if you hadn't used it. As far as my recommendation goes, think twice before lightening the skin at all, and consider other options, including covering makeup or laser surgery. If you decide to continue hydroquinone, I would first visit a dermatologist to diagnose the type of dark coloration, give you your personal options and then use prescription-grade hydroquinone, if appropriate.

It's also possible that the 2 percent strength of hydroquinone isn't strong enough for you. Concentrations over 2 percent (up to 4 percent) are available only by prescription. Also, sunlight can reverse the effect of hydroquinone, so you need to stay out of the sun. I'd recommend both sun-protective clothing (e.g., a hat) AND a sunscreen of level 35 or higher. Not only will sunlight reverse the lightening effect, but your skin is more sensitive to the harmful and potentially cancer-causing effects of the sun after using hydroquinone.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I had tinnitus. I read a lot and found a research study at the Mayo Clinic that tests the effectiveness of magnesium 500 mg daily for moderate to severe tinnitus. I took a 500-mg tablet of magnesium (over the counter) and got relief fairly rapidly from the tinnitus. I stayed on the magnesium for about a year. Occasionally, it returned, and I went back on that supplement. – Anon.

The results of the study you found are not yet available, but I think there has been enough published on the possible effectiveness and safety of magnesium supplementation



that it is reasonable to give it a try. Magnesium deficiency is common, especially in people taking diuretics ("water pills") for high blood pressure. The major side effect of magnesium supplementation is diarrhea, which is unlikely at a low dose.
