### Socorro ISD STAAR report cards online

Parents in the Socorro Independent School District can now access their child's State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness (STAAR) report card on the Texas Assessment Data Portal. Scores are currently available on the data portal for students in Grades 8-12 who took an End of Course Exam (EOC). The Texas Assessment Data Portal allows parents to view their child's STAAR/EOC performance and learn how to provide their child additional educational support at home. To view the STAAR report card, parents can visit the Texas Assessment Data Portal at [TexasAssessment.gov](http://TexasAssessment.gov). Parents will need to log in with their child's unique student access code and date of birth. Parents can look up the access code on the same site with their child's first name and Social Security Number (or S-Number). SISD schools will issue STAAR report cards at the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year. STAAR report cards also can be picked up at the campus during office hours after June 17, school registration times and/or open houses. For more information, contact your child's school.

## Paso del Norte trail taking shape

EL PASO COUNTY – The Paso del Norte Health Foundation's (PDNHF) initiative for a 60-mile countywide trail is steadily taking shape with the completion recently of the master plan to guide its development.

The Health Foundation is now working with community leaders to create a nonprofit trail corporation to guide the implementation of the master plan, which was created by Sites Southwest and Alta Planning+Design after almost two years of public meetings, on-line surveys, and work sessions with community leaders, stakeholders, and trail enthusiasts.

The project was further supported by

a technical assistance grant from the National Parks Service's Rivers, Trails and Conservation Assistance Program. Leadership and input came, as well, from the County of El Paso, City of El Paso, El Paso Water, El Paso Water Improvement District No. 1, El Paso Metropolitan Planning Organization, Camino Real Regional Mobility Authority, Texas Department of Transportation, International Boundary and Water Commission, Housing Authority for the City of El Paso, Medical Center of the Americas Foundation, Velo El Paso, University of Texas at El Paso, El Paso Independent School District, neighborhood associations and countless other organizations and community residents.

The planned Paso del Norte Trail spans the length of El Paso county from its border with New Mexico to the agricultural areas of the Lower Valley connecting neighborhoods along the route to schools, parks, worksites and other destinations and providing greater opportunities for increased physical activity for residents and visitors alike.

"We are inspired by the enthusiasm for the trail concept and grateful to the leadership of our board of directors and all of the organizations and individuals who helped in the planning process," stated Tracy J. Yellen, CEO of the Paso del Norte Foundation. "The Paso del Norte Trail will be an important resource for our region connecting communities, celebrating El Paso's rich history and culture, highlighting the Rio Grande, and promoting health and active living," he added.

### Free online tool helps patients find independent doctors

Few consumers know that one of the best ways to save a lot on health care is to see an independent doctor. That one choice can save them up to half or more on their out-of-pocket costs, and many thousands of dollars should they need hospitalization.

However, knowing which doctors are independent and which are employees of a hospital or private equity group isn't easy. One way to know is to ask. Another way is to search with

this free online tool ([www.aid-us.org/directory](http://www.aid-us.org/directory)) that can help area residents easily find independent doctors by specialty.

"While not every independent doctor is on the list, many are," said Marni Jameson Carey, executive director of the Association of Independent Doctors. AID is a nonprofit organization dedicated to lowering healthcare costs.

"The tool raises awareness about an important question that consumers need to ask about their doctor before they go: Are

you independent or employed? That one question puts a lot of power – and dollars – back in consumers' hands," Carey said.

"The nationwide trend of hospitals buying physician practices and turning independent doctors into employed physicians is a leading driver in our nation's soaring health-care costs," said Carey.

In 2000, more than half of America's doctors were independent; today only one in three are, according to the consulting group Accenture.

"Patients often don't know their doctor has been acquired until they get their bill, which can be several times higher than it was before for the same type of office visit or procedure," said Carey. Hospitals layer in what are known as facility fees – often substantial additional charges that are of no value to the patient.

These costs add up when the employed doctor refers patients to other employed specialists, and imaging and surgery centers, all of which charge as much as two to five times more than independently owned centers.

"We all pay for this in the way of higher premiums, and taxes to fund Medicare and Medicaid," said Carey.

To avoid these snowballing costs, consumers should make that first healthy decision – to see an independent doctor.

### Robocall update

### FTC warns of more Social Security scams

Robocall Social Security Administration scams are on the rise. The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) says SSA telephone shakedowns specifically targeting senior citizens now surpass phony IRS calls, according to the Association of Mature American Citizens (AMAC).

For the past few years fake IRS calls topped the list of complaints received by the FTC. "But the new SSA scam is trending in the same direction – with a vengeance. People filed over 76,000 reports about Social Security imposters in the past 12 months, with reported losses of \$19 million," according to the FTC.

AMAC president Dan Weber notes that at its peak, between October 2015 and September 2016, losses from IRS scams reached \$17 million. Meanwhile, in just two months, February and March of this year, the FTC received some 36,000 complaints from individuals who received Social Security calls. And, \$6.7 million in reported losses were logged.

Weber says "these con men are 'phishing' for Social Security numbers that can be used to commit all kinds of online crime. They can use stolen SS accounts to take out loans in your name, leaving you holding the bag. In addition, while they are at it, they often try to extort money from you. Meanwhile, the solution is quite simple – just hang up."

In addition, AMAC advises that if you get such a phone call don't fall for the scam even if your caller ID shows that the Social Security Administration is calling you. The SSA does not make threats. In fact, you should never give out your SS number, your bank account number or any such sensitive personal information to anyone who calls you out of the blue – especially if the voice on the other end of the line is a recording.

Dan Weber also recommends that you simply hang up on such callers and then call the SSA at (800) 772-1213 to report the incident. He says the Social Security Administration has issued a procedure notification for those who might receive scam calls, which can be accessed on the <https://www.identitytheft.gov/SSA> online.

"Robocall scams are fast becoming the methodology of choice for tech-savvy crooks. And, while we are each responsible for protecting ourselves from these criminals, the government has a responsibility, too. To that end, there is legislation in Congress that seeks to address robocall stings."

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# 'The Daily Beast's' shabby scoop

Breaking news: Some guy posted a doctored video of Nancy Pelosi.

But fear not. The website *The Daily Beast* sprang into action. It tracked down the random, Trump-supporting man who allegedly posted the offending clip, hounded him until he talked, then published his name and other details about his life in a shocking instance of harassment masquerading as journalism.

The man whose identity was revealed by *The Daily Beast* is, by the publication's account, an unemployed African American forklift operator who lives in New York City and runs a couple of very minor Facebook pages. He had done it anonymously, one assumes, to avoid any professional and personal fallout, which *The Daily Beast* has now exposed him to.

The video in question, doctored to make it sound like Pelosi was drunk when talking about Donald Trump at a progressive conference, dominated a news cycle a couple of weeks ago. In other words, it was a big deal for about six hours, and then disappeared like most everything else in our disposable news culture.

The video was certainly a testament to the debased quality

of online discourse, but it was also quickly identified as a fake, because it was pretty obviously a fake.

None of this justifies outing the man supposedly responsible for it. In a better world, anonymous political commentators could be identified without fear of social media mobs attempting to ruin their lives. As has been demonstrated time and again, this is not the world we live in.

Widely criticized for its decision to name the man – or in online parlance, “dox” him – *The Daily Beast* defended its story as a way to show “that disinformation isn't the purview of Russia alone.” But who ever believed this?

Even if it's relevant that someone in the Bronx rather than St. Petersburg produced the video, that didn't require naming the man – let alone detailing his employment history, talking to his ex-girlfriend or delving into his guilty plea to a domestic violence charge and an outstanding warrant for his arrest on a probation violation. (The man denies many of the details of the story.)

All of this was completely gratuitous. The balance, which any responsible publication should have considered, between



the public benefit of naming the man (none) and the personal harm that might be done by naming him (considerable) isn't even close.

Of course, it matters that he is a Trump supporter. Outlets like *The Daily Beast* don't make a routine practice of hunting down trolls who are producing the vast sea of anti-Trump material online, because they don't consider spoofing or maligning Trump to be a threat to democracy, or at all undesirable.

Incredibly enough, according to *The Daily Beast*, someone at Facebook provided details about the man's posting history that were used to confirm the story. Users of Facebook should take note.

Although reporters might believe that rank abuse of America's high elected officials is something new, it's as old as the republic. And it's often been anonymous. By all means,



recreational areas and routes for the residents in the city and county of El Paso was the impetus behind the new, proposed 60-mile county-wide Paso del Norte Trail, PDNHF officials stated.

“For residents to lead active lives, the physical environment must enable and encourage physical activity. Trails and outdoor recreation opportunities are an excellent way for people to get outdoors, exercise, and explore their neighborhoods. They also create important connections between amenities (parks, schools, businesses), can lead to economic development, and improve overall quality of life,” according to a PDNHF report.

“PDNHF leads, leverages and invests in initiatives, programs and policies that promote health and prevent disease in the Paso del Norte Region. It has granted more than \$187 million to more than 300 organizations across the local border region and completed 2018 with \$224.6 million in assets, up from \$130 million in 1996, keeping administrative expenses below 1 percent,” the PDNHF report said.

## Three Canutillo ISD schools named to Star Honor Roll

CANUTILLO – Three schools in the Canutillo Independent School District have made the honor roll.

Jose Damian Elementary, Canutillo Middle School, and Northwest Early College High School have been named to the 2018 - 2019 Educational Results Partnership Star Honor Roll for their high achievement in student success.

The program, sponsored by the Campaign for Business and Education Excellence (CBEE), is part of a national effort to identify higher-performing schools and districts that are improving student outcomes. It recognizes schools and districts that have demonstrated consistent high levels of student academic achievement, improvement in achievement levels over time, and a reduction in achievement gaps among student populations. For high schools, the Honor Roll recognition also includes measures of college readiness.

These campuses are already on

the national map for high quality teaching and learning. Northwest Early College High School, who has been selected to the Star Honor Roll four consecutive years, was named a 2018 Blue Ribbon School by the U.S. Department of Education – the highest honor given to a school by the federal government.

Canutillo Middle School, who made the Star Honor Roll for the first time, was designated as a T-STEM academy by TEA, making the District one of only a few in the state of Texas to have a 6th - 12th grade T-STEM track.

Jose Damian Elementary, also on the STAR Honor Roll for the first time, is in its second year of being a STEM focused school and prides itself on its focus on intervention, acceleration, and closing the achievement gap.

"We continue our strong reputation and work hard every day to become a premier school district," said Dr. Pedro Galaviz, Canutillo ISD Superintendent of Schools. "Our principals create the conditions for teachers and students to thrive, leading to recognitions like this."

## Two are always better than one: Maybe that explains the Twins

Believe it or not, we are quickly approaching the midway mark of the Major League Baseball season.

Every team has played about 70 games so far. Of course a full season consists of 162 games.

So you would expect the six division races to still be pretty close, and some are. But three of the six are being dominated.

And two of the three teams doing the dominating played in the World Series a

couple years ago, the Houston Astros and the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Last year, the Astros lost to the Boston Red Sox in the playoffs and the Dodgers made it to the World Series, losing to those same Red Sox.

So it's no surprise that those two teams are off to great starts and are expected to win their divisions easily.

Also having good seasons are the New York Yankees, the Chicago Cubs, the Milwaukee Brewers, the Tampa Bay Rays and the Atlanta Braves. But all those teams were expected to do well.

The total surprise is that third team that is dominating their division – and dominating their opponents.

The Minnesota Twins had a losing season last year and finished dead last in their division in 2016.

But this year's Twins are fighting the Astros and the Dodgers for the best record in baseball. Nobody saw this coming.

Why are the Twins enjoying so much success this season? It's very simple, they are the best hitting team in the majors – by far.

The Twins are batting .272 as a team, which leads the entire league. They also lead the league in runs scored, home runs, runs batted in, total bases and slugging percentage. And they are second in total hits.

What the Twins are doing is getting on base and putting a lot pressure on defenses. How? By averaging nearly six runs a game.

# Flesh-eating bacteria is a rare condition

*DEAR DR. ROACH: What do you know about flesh-eating bacteria? After going to a hospital to get a mole checked, I developed an itchy rash that won't go away. I am worried. – H.W.*

Let me reassure you that this isn't flesh-eating bacteria. Itchy rash around a mole can be due to eczema, or it might be a fungal infection or one of several other benign skin conditions. A dermatologist can help figure out which. But, since you asked ...



The term "flesh-eating bacteria" is misleading since it's a disease, not a particular bacteria species. The term refers to a condition called "necrotizing fasciitis" ("necrotizing" means that the infection kills cells, and "fasciitis" references the connective tissue in the body that the infection proceeds along).

However terrifying, it is fortunately a rare condition. There are only about 1-3 cases per 100,000 people. It may occur in people who are otherwise healthy and who happen to get an injury that penetrates the skin. But it is more common in people who have a diminished immune system due to chronic illness (diabetes, kidney or liver disease, cancer, heavy alcohol use).

In most cases, in people with chronic disease, it is a combination of bacteria that cause the infection. In previously healthy people, the bacteria most associated are group A streptococcus. This bacteria strain has enzymes that damage the body and has the ability to evade the immune system. It can grow very rapidly, and early treatment is paramount to stopping the infection before permanent damage is done. In some cases, amputation is necessary; in others, no treatment is effective. The disease has a high mortality rate. The particular bacteria in a person with this diagnosis are very dangerous, and there are cases of person-to-person transmission of the bacteria, leading to additional cases, so caregivers and family need personal protective equipment.

Effective treatment starts with recognition of the diagnosis. That can be hard; initial signs, such as redness, swelling and fever, can be nonspecific. Skin lesions, like blisters or bruising, can be misleading. However, a very high fever and more pain than expected are big clues to the diagnosis. Treatment is primarily surgical. Antibiotics alone are ineffective.

*routine antibiotics. Your advice, while sound, does not apply to all of us. I am an MDS patient with compromised immunity. When I get sick, it takes three times as long to recover. I feel the rules may apply to "normal" people, but not all of us. What would you recommend for someone like me? – B.F.*

My answers certainly do not apply to all situations, and immunocompromised individuals are an excellent example. In the case of sinus infections, it depends on the person's exact type of immune problem. Immunocompromised individuals certainly are more likely to be prescribed antibiotics, and are more likely to be subject to diagnostic testing when things

don't go as expected. Some kinds of immune system disease predispose people to unusual infections, which require specific treatments.

Taking care of anyone requires judgment and experience, and physicians who have known their patients a long time are in a better position to judge who needs antibiotic treatment for sinus infection and who does well with supportive treatment. In the case of someone with immune system disease, that is even more important.

# Don't always blame the guys at the top

If you're still digging out At a Department of Veterans Affairs medical facility, a psychologist by the name of "Z" managed to find a way to increase income by overstating productivity by 43 percent.

This was done via double coding. Say the appointment with a patient should be classified as 123. The psychologist would code it as 123 and additionally as 456... meaning Z would appear to have done more work. Z averaged 15 hours of actual work in a 40-hour workweek yet managed to accrue payments for 243 hours of overtime.

It gets better. The chief of medical administration and the assistant chief didn't know

those review duties existed.

It gets even better. The medical center's director wasn't aware that coding reviews weren't being done.

How many layers is that? The medical center director is effectively supposed to do the job of all those underlings?


