EL PASO COUNTY – With the pandemic woes subsiding as the number of COVID-19 virus cases steadily decrease in the region, Coronado High School (CHS) band members are inviting El Paso County residents to join them in a community fun run celebration.

The CHS band is hosting its inaugural *Band on the Run* event that will include a Mini-K fun run for beginners and youngsters and a 5-K course for avid runners. The Mini-K and 5-K fun runs are slated to start at 6 a.m., Saturday, June 5, at the iFly indoor skydiving emporium, which is located at 430 Vin Rambla Drive, next to the Top Golf facility near Interstate-10 in West El Paso.

As part of the event, band members will also be hosting a virtual Mini-K fun run and 5-K fun run option for the Saturday

morning activity. All participants will receive a specially designed *Band on the Run* t-shirt. Virtual runners will receive their t-shirts through the mail.

"We are hosting this event to raise money for the 2021 Coronado High School Band program," stated James Smith, CHS band director. "This event will help the band raise money to pay for new instruments, music lesson scholarships, marching band show effects, and travel expenses," he noted.

Awards for the different age groups will be presented to the "live" run participants in the following categories- 14 & under; 15-19; 20-24; 25-29; 30-34; 35-39; 40-44; 45-49; 50-54; 55-59; 60-64; and participants over 65.

Smith stated that when registering for the Saturday morning event, be sure to mention if you are signing up to support a particular band student... "Be sure to enter his or her name while registering," he added.

Registration fee for the morning jog is \$25 for participants who are 18 years and older, and \$15 for individuals under 18 years of age. Registration closes at midnight May 21st.

Early Packet pick-up will be available from 4 to 7 p.m., Friday, June 4, at the Coronado High School Fine Arts building parking lot, on Cloudview Drive. Only virtual packets for registrants located outside of El Paso city limits will be mailed. Race day packet pick up will be from 6 to 6:45 a.m., with the race scheduled to start at 7 a.m.

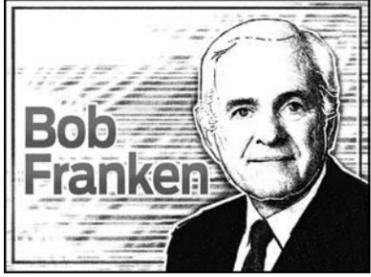

No COVID vax, no college?

Students looking forward to getting back to college are getting letters from 100 to 200 colleges notifying them of a new prerequisite: getting fully vaccinated against COVID-19. As one letter states,

this is because of our "our continued desire to protect the health and safety of our community." This includes high-risk individuals in the surrounding community or wherever the students go in the

purpose of the requirement is not to protect the students themselves. Of all COVID deaths, only about 0.1% have been in 15-to-24-year-olds². Yet young people can suffer death or serious disability after getting the jab. (Authorities point out that it is not necessarily because of the jab.) According to a controversial independent analysis, the aggressive Israeli vaccination campaign killed more than 200 times as many young persons as the coronavirus itself³ could have killed during the same 35-week period.

One of the commenters on the ACHA's recommendation wrote: "It is perfectly reasonable for a society to expect its members, *all* of its members, to take up such risks on behalf of everyone. Unless you plan on putting a bullet in your own

head on your thirty-ninth birthday, one day *you* will be that elderly person who benefits disproportionately from universal vaccination. To not accept that risk now, yet expect that protection later, would make you a hypocrite."

So much for the parental instinct to protect children - instead of using or sacrificing them!

We do not know the precise number of post-vaccine "adverse events," because of incomplete reporting, or the percentage that were caused by the jab and not coincidental. But one can see the number and types of events reported to the U.S. Vaccine Adverse Events Reporting System (VAERS⁴) or the more user-friendly British

Biden's child care folly

Joe Biden has a New Deal for America's kids.

He wants to spend more than \$225 billion on child care for infants and toddlers, and \$200 billion for free, universal preschool for 3- and 4-year-olds.

This is being hailed as a social revolution that will finally bring the United States in line with other advanced democracies.

In reality, it's a program that shows a pronounced class bias. And since it is heedless of the experience of other such mass programs in the United States and around the world, the Biden approach is also likely to fail to achieve its goals.

It's just not true, as the Biden program assumes, that parents of young children are eager to shuttle them off to industrialized daycare or pre-K programs.

An extensive survey for the populist think tank American Compass found a stark class divide in how couples think about child care. The survey asked couples if they preferred to have one parent working full time while the other parent provides childcare in the home, or to have both parents working and using childcare full time. One parent working was the preference of strong majorities of working-class (68%) and lower-class

couples (58%), with a plurality of middle-class couples (38%) agreeing. Only a plurality of upper-class couples preferred the childcare option (44%).

So, Biden is talking about using taxpayer dollars to create as a default an arrangement that most parents would rather avoid.

Then, there are outcomes. In a paper earlier this year for the Manhattan Institute, researcher Max Eden reviewed the literature.

The programs that have produced the most remarkable positive outcomes over the years tend to be small, expensive, and very difficult to replicate.

On the other side of the ledger, there's the Quebec Family Policy. The Canada province developed a crash program in the late 1990s that rapidly expanded childcare with generally deleterious effects. Researchers found increased behavioral, social, and health problems for the kids, and interestingly, worse outcomes for parents, too. The results were, in the words of one authoritative study, "striking in their consistent indication of a substantial negative impact of universal child care on children in two-parent families."

The exception in Quebec, per another study, was children from


single-parent families, where positive results were "particularly large for individuals at the very bottom of the distribution."

The Quebec outcomes, as Eden notes, accord with what's been found elsewhere – childcare is best for disadvantaged children and worst for children from two-parent families.

As for pre-K, the largest study of Head Start, the federal program for low-income children, found



any early benefits faded by the third grade. Other research has been more encouraging. But a rigorous, randomized control study of low-income kids in an extensive pre-K program in Tennessee showed initial gains washed away and then, over time, participants had worse academic and behavioral outcomes.

The research of James Heckman, a Nobel Prize-winning economist at the University of Chicago that studied one of the most successful programs, is often cited by advocates of



the Biden plan. In an interview last year, though, Heckman stipulated that he has never supported universal pre-K. He said the benefits of a loving, engaged family have never been

Yellow Card system⁵. These include death, clotting or bleeding problems, paralysis, blindness, and miscarriages (213 in VAERS as of today).

The long-term adverse events cannot yet be known. The prospect of most concern to the young women calling our office is infertility. There is no evidence that the products currently available cause infertility. And also no evidence that they don't. There are plausible reasons to worry. Viral spike protein has been found in placentas⁶ from mothers who gave birth after having COVID. And the spike protein itself⁷, without any virus, can attach to the lining of blood vessels and many tissues, and even cross the blood-brain barrier⁸, and wreak havoc.

Getting your own body to make spike protein is what these genetically engineered products do.

Concerning fertility, the one relevant animal experiment⁹, in 1,273 Sprague-Dawley rats, showed a numerically lower pregnancy rate, but within the facility's historical range. The rats were not injected in early pregnancy when organs are forming, to check for birth defects.

There are thousands of reports of menstrual irregularities¹⁰, though these are not officially recognized as side effects, and many things including anxiety can affect the menstrual cycle. There are worries disseminated in social media but debunked by fact-checkers that menstrual problems and other effects can result from contacts with vaccinated persons.

The vaccine-induced spike proteins are supposed to stay attached to your cells and cause your body to make antibodies that will recognize the virus. Can they be shed into the environment and picked up by others by contact or inhalation? I don't know of a mechanism. But it seems odd to me that the Pfizer experimental trials¹¹ not only excluded women who were or might soon become pregnant, but also required men to abstain or use a condom for 28 days post injection. Just FDA bureaucracy and "abundance of caution"?

There is no abundance of caution in forcing this product onto students entering their prime reproductive years. No concern about "reproductive rights."

It is unlawful to use coercion to gain acceptance of products available only through an Emergency Use Authorization, but colleges are confident of quick FDA approval, even though trials won't be

Attention Parents/Guardians, Former Students, Eligible (Adult) Students: Special Education records collected by the Clint Independent School District (CISD) related to the identification, evaluation, educational placement, or the provision of Special Education services must be maintained under state and federal laws for a period of five years after Special Education services have ended for the student. Special Education services end when the student no longer is eligible for services, graduates, completes his or her educational program at age 22, or moves from the district. Clint ISD intends to destroy Special Education records of those students that ceased receiving services during the school year 2015-2016.

Parents or adult students need to recognize that these records may be needed by the student or the parent for Social Security benefits or other post-school benefits. Its success paved the way for other adult-oriented animated series, notably "King of the Hill," "The Family Guy" and "South Park."

• On May 22, 1455, the battle of England's War of the Roses begins in St. Albans, 20 miles northwest of London. The forces of House of York, whose badge was a white rose, defeated the red-rose House of Lancaster. Both families claimed the throne and the war would stretch on for 30 years.

• On May 23, 1934, famed fugitives Clyde Barrow and Bonnie Parker are killed in a police ambush near Sailes, Louisiana. They died in a two-minute fusillade of over 150 bullets. The Barrow Gang was believed responsible for the deaths of 13 people, including nine police officers.

complete until 2022 or 2023.

The Association of American Physicians and Surgeons has written to college administrators¹² urging them to withdraw the mandate but has received no reply. Grants from ACHA, which receives grants from Pfizer and CDC¹³, probably talk louder.

So, what can students do? Be cheerful or reluctant participants in a massive uncontrolled experiment and hope for the best? Seek an exemption? Or pause their education plans – and outrageous tuition?

There are "help wanted" signs everywhere. For learning, there are libraries, and more on-line opportunities will spring up. A college degree may be unnecessary or can wait. The biological window for having a family will close. How much risk of infertility should young people take?





No miracle supplement can cure heart disease

DEAR DR. ROACH: I ran across a recent article of yours about carotid artery stenosis. In this article you state that "there is no miracle food, drink or supplement that can clear out arteries." This is actually not true. I'd like to point out Dr. Dean Ornish's work as well as Dr. Caldwell Esselstyn's work on heart disease. Both doctors showed regression in coronary plaques in their patients who followed a whole food plant-based diet. One young patient who suffered a heart attack even saw complete reversal in his coronary artery blockage on a whole food plant-based diet. I'd encourage you to check out their studies and books if you haven't done so already. Their work is very encouraging and shows that we do not have to succumb to heart disease. - K.G.

I appreciate your writing to give me a chance to make my point a little more clearly.

I do want to emphasize that the patient was asking specifically about YouTube videos for "food, drinks and diet regimens that clear arteries." I have seen some of these, which say, for example, all you need is a cup a day of lemon juice and turmeric to clear your arteries. There are health-care professionals in the media who tout simple cures to reverse heart disease. These are what I refer to when I say there are no miracle cures.

That is not what you are referring to in the work of Drs. Ornish and Esselstyn. Theirs was a significant lifestyle intervention, not a miracle supplement. Dr. Esselstyn did a small, uncontrolled observational study; Dr. Ornish did a small controlled study. In the Esselstyn study, the diet was quite restrictive:

"Initially the intervention avoided all added oils and processed foods that contain oils, fish, meat, fowl, dairy products, avocado, nuts and excess salt. Patients were also asked to avoid sugary foods (sucrose, fructose and drinks containing them, refined carbohydrates, fruit juices, syrups, and molasses). Subsequently, we also excluded caffeine and fructose."

The Ornish study had a similar completely vegetarian diet, but 10% of calories from fat was allowed. In addition, there was (as there was not in Esselstyn) mandatory stress reduction time, and all smokers in the study quit. This study's results, proven by angiography, showed reversal in coronary blockages by 3% in five years, compared with 12% worsening in the control group in the same time.

Esselstyn analyzed the study by those judged adherent and nonadherent. For any subject who was judged nonadherent, 62% had coronary events. Less than 1% of adherent subjects experienced an adverse event.

Together, these studies show that in a group of extraordinarily motivated study subjects, coronary lesions can undergo regression with a multi-interventional approach including profound diet changes and sometimes other lifestyle interventions. These aren't miracle diets. It's an entire dramatic change in lifestyle.

Extreme lifestyle changes are not necessary to show benefit. In the PREDIMED study, a Mediterranean-style diet was recommended, with high amounts of fruits, vegetables, legumes, olive oil and nuts, with less red and processed meat, less commercial baked goods and spread fats, and less soft drinks. Those who were recommended this diet had fewer heart attacks, strokes and death than those who were in the control group and were recommended a low-fat diet.

Why such a long wait for copies of records

If you've been waiting for copies of military records so you can apply for benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs, you've likely been waiting for a long time. Unfortunately, your wait might continue, depending on the reason for your request.

Due to COVID, the National Personnel Records Center is closed, with a 10% staffing level and a backlog of half a million records requests. Most of the 60 million older records are on paper, so they must be accessed and touched by humans. The only exceptions are emergencies: burials, medical treatments or homeless veterans who are trying to get into a homeless shelter.

For anything else, the NPRC is specifically requesting that you don't ask for records. If it's

records research, corrections to records or replacement medals, it's not an emergency... at least for the NPRC.

I can foresee situations where getting medal replacements for an elderly, ill veteran might well be considered an emergency if that veteran wants to see his medals one last time, and tell stories and maybe give them in person to a grandchild.

If you have a genuine emergency, as defined by the NPRC, you'll need to submit a Standard Form 180, Request Pertaining to Military Records (find it online). Sign it and then fax it to (314) 801-0764.

The good news is that newer records might be online. Check www.archives.gov, click Veterans' Service Records, then click on More Ways to Get Service Records on the left.

It could be much worse: In 1973, up to 18 million files were destroyed in a fire the St. Louis record center. Plus, VA had loaned the NPRC millions of records, which also went up

in smoke.

Over time they've tried to re-create those records using auxiliary sources, but the Certificate of Service they send you contains only basic service information – like a Little League participation trophy.

- It's easy to leave a group text chain on an iPhone. There's a setting for this. It's not as easy on an Android phone, but it's doable. Simply mute the conversation and delete the text thread. If you have a big family group and you're getting too many notifications, you can always mute the conversation until you're finished with whatever you're doing.


