San Eli updates fireworks ordinance

At the City of San Elizario council meeting on June 21, 2022, council voted 3 to 1 to amend ordinance 2007.03, which previously banned the sale and use of all fireworks within the city limits. The City of San Elizario will now follow the action taken at the El Paso County Commissioners Court and moving forward, the ordinance amendment allows the same regulations regarding fireworks in effect in the unincorporated areas of the County of El Paso to apply within the City of San Elizario on an annual basis. The state mandated process allows the County of El Paso to ban fireworks only if the Texas Forest Service determines drought conditions exist, allowing for the determination that a disaster declaration may be made. Texas Local Government Code § 352.051 defines “drought conditions” as the existence immediately preceding or during the fireworks season of a Keetch-Byram Drought Index (“KBDI”) of 575 or greater. Though Mayor Isela Reyes did not have a vote on the item, she presented the agenda item to council for consideration and added, “Our community doesn’t have another means to traditionally celebrate the Fourth of July in the City of San Elizario so we collectively decided this was the best option, while still following the safety recommendations of the state.” All other provisions of ordinance 2007.03 remain in effect. The original ordinance may be found on the city’s website. Fireworks, minus aerials (sticks and fins), can be bought and used in San Eli this year.

Plans underway to improve flood response, infrastructure in El Paso and West Texas

State and regional flood plans will be updated every five years

WEST TEXAS – Efforts are underway for El Paso County to be better prepared for flooding in the years to come as the Texas Water Development Board takes

the lead in coordinating the first-ever, state-wide flood planning process.

The Upper Rio Grande Regional Flood Planning Group (URGRFPG) in Region 14, which includes El Paso and 22 other counties in West Texas, is spearheading the work to address future flooding not only in El Paso but throughout West Texas.

The group, which is slated to submit a draft regional plan by the beginning of August, has been seeking the communities input on several draft plans for the past few

months. Once the regional and state flood plans are adopted, public entities – like El Paso Water, El Paso County and the El Paso County Water Improvement District – will be able to apply for funding from TWDB to implement flood management strategies.

Omar Martinez, chair of the El Paso flood-planning group, related that after the draft plans are approved, participating government entities would have access

The Kamala Harris problem

The media taboo against talking about Joe Biden's age and the obstacle it presents to his running again in 2024 is finally off.

Which should put a lantern on another looming problem for the Democrats – waiting in the wings is a

deeply unpopular officeholder, who makes Biden look like a prospective electoral juggernaut by comparison.

Democrats can be forgiven for considering the possibility of only Kamala Harris standing between them and a return of Donald Trump and telling themselves,

“Well, maybe 80 is the new 75,” or, “Biden's always been gaffe-prone, so what's a few more gaffes between friends?” or, “Biden campaigned from a basement in 2020 – surely, he can campaign from some similarly secluded and safe space in 2024.”

Harris is the single best argument for Democrats trying to prop up Biden no matter what. She has been a disaster as vice president, even as she's done nothing particularly noteworthy either good or bad. She's simply a political black hole, whose abysmal ratings reflect not just


Biden's troubles but her own profound, inherent flaws as a political figure.

Kamala Harris has the authenticity of Hillary Clinton, the charm of Al Gore, and the common touch of Adlai Stevenson.

She could have been engineered in a lab as a convictionless opportunist lacking basic political horse sense – and she more or less was. She came up in a California where the dominance of TV ads makes retail politicking all but unnecessary, and internal Democratic politics is largely based on identity politics. Compared to her, Biden really is Middle Class Joe. The contrast with Chuck Schumer, another Democratic leader from a deep blue state, is instructive – Schumer had a tough statewide race against a Republican within memory and is aware that not all voters are extremely online “woke” progressives.

Harris could have run as an ideologically interesting, tough-minded former prosecutor in the 2020 Democratic nomination fight – a little like Eric Adams in the New York City mayoral primaries last year. Instead, she got sucked into the idea that the winning lane would be a couple of ticks to the right of Bernie Sanders. She co-sponsored his “Medicare for All” proposal, before making a confusing hash of her position when she realized the political

The potentially deadly side-effect of spiraling inflation

Over 15 million senior citizens face 'food insecurity'

The inflation uptick continues to impose serious hardship on hungry senior citizens – particularly and tragically those suffering from malnutrition. The victims are the most vulnerable

of our aging population – those who struggle to make ends meet on minimal fixed incomes at a time when the price of food is skyrocketing as the result of an uncontrolled, record-breaking rate of inflation.

There are many factors that triggered the inflationary surge,

not the least of which was the devil-may-care progressive spending spree of the Biden administration and the Congress it controls. The numbers don't lie. In December of 2020, a month before Joe Biden took office, the rate of inflation stood at 1.4%. Since President Biden assumed office in January 2021 the rate of inflation has ticked up to at least 8.5% and climbing, making life difficult for us all but in particular for the fixed

income seniors who have no alternative other than to live with it or die. Before the surge a quart of milk cost about 90 cents. The

price of that same quart of milk today is more than 20% higher at about \$1.09 per quart.

It's not a matter of conjecture. A new Rasmussen poll shows that a growing number of us put the blame for the increasing cost of living on the president. It was bad

enough in December at the end of his first year in office when only 32% of voters gave him an okay, but the newest survey shows that just 27% think he's doing a good job; 57% give him a poor rating on his handling of the economy. Younger Americans might get

a second job to make ends meet as the cost of living increases. But only a limited number of seniors have that option. For too many of America's seniors, the cost of living is out of reach. According to a report published by the National Institutes of Health, "Although only 1% of older adults who are independent and healthy are malnourished, the Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (HANES) data indicated that 16% of community-dwelling Americans older than 65 years consumed fewer than 1000 calories per day – a statistic that would place these persons at high risk for undernutrition. The nutritional risk increases in the community-dwelling elderly who are sick, poor, homebound, and have limited access to medical care. Malnutrition can become a major concern. The incidence of malnutrition ranges from 12% to 50% among the hospitalized elderly population and from 23% to 60% among institutionalized older adults."

A major cause of malnutrition among our elders is what is called, food insecurity, a "socioeconomic condition" that limits one's ability to afford nutritious food, says the United Health Foundation. It includes more than 15 million seniors in the 65-plus category.

• On June 27, 1985, after 59 years, the iconic 2,200-mile Route 66 is decertified when the American Association of State Highway and Transportation officials votes to remove all its highway signs. Most of the original Route 66 followed a path through the wilderness forged in 1857 by U.S. Navy Lt. Edward Beale at the head of a caravan of camels.

• On June 28, 1940, Gen. Charles de Gaulle, having set up headquarters in England upon the establishment of a puppet government in his native France, is recognized as the leader of the Free French Forces, dedicated to the defeat of Germany and the liberation of France.

• On June 29, 1967, actress Jayne Mansfield is killed instantly when the car she's riding in strikes the rear of a trailer truck on I-90 east of New Orleans. Her three children, asleep on the back seat, survived.

• On June 30, 1971, the three Soviet cosmonauts who served as the first crew of the world's first space station die when their spacecraft depressurizes during re-entry and a critical valve opens.


to a pool of money. "The benefit of this is that local strategies can access the flood infrastructure fund. This is more than a billion-dollar fund by the Texas Water Development Board," he pointed out.

Martinez said that he hopes that these plans will help prevent the loss of life and property. "You can pretty much say that every five years we lose a lot of life and property and put a lot of people in danger because we have these freak stormwater events. With climate change, it seems that these storms are getting stronger, more sporadic, and less predictable," Martinez said.

TWDB's role in the state's flood planning process was expanded during the last state legislative session. Subsequently, TWDB, in conjunction with several flood planning regional groups, implemented the new flood planning process based on river basins.

Region 14's Upper Rio Grande Regional Flood Planning Group (URGFPG), along with fourteen other planning regions throughout the state, will help coordinate the tasks for developing these new regional flood plans. Completion of the plans are slated for January 2023, with the first state flood plans due by September 2024, according to a recent news release.

It also includes portions of Andrews, Crockett, Ector, Edwards, Midland, Reagan, Schleicher, Sutton, Upton, Val Verde, and Winkler counties.

of Governments (RGC) is a political subdivision of a conglomerate of twelve entities and serves as its sponsor. The RGC has been tasked with administering the local program by coordinating communications and activities among the members, the release stated.

As for the maps, plans call for flood mitigation projects, strategies, and priorities that will ultimately be included in the 2023 State Flood Plan, which will serve as a roadmap to ensure the region is working toward common goals to reduce flooding risks.

Already, URGFPG has identified and evaluated various projects to mitigate flooding

for people, property, and businesses across the region. Some of the proposed remedies include increasing flood warning outreach, adopting minimum stormwater infrastructure design standards, and improving flood hazard data across the region.

However, only those projects that make it to the 2023 State Flood Plan list will be eligible for TWDB's next flood infrastructure funding allocations. Draft maps of the proposed upper Rio Grande regional flood plan will be available for public review and comment by this fall, TWDB officials stated.





implausibility of the plan.

She seemed defensive about her record as a prosecutor, which came under withering assault from Rep. Tulsi Gabbard from the left.

Her signature moment – attacking Joe Biden for his opposition to busing based on her own experience getting

bused – didn't pay the expected dividends because of its self-evident calculation.


Harris is a politician who always seems to be reading stage directions out loud. Her laugh, a target of critics, usually sounds forced and highly deliberate, at times bordering on inappropriate affect. It's a valuable political skill to seem at ease even when reaching for the brass ring at the highest level of American politics. Bill Clinton, George W.

Bush and Barack Obama all had this ability. Harris has shown no indication that she has it or will develop it.

Biden has done her no favors with her assignments as vice president. Given the foolhardiness of the underlying Biden policies, there was no realistic way she was going to diminish migration at the Southern border. Nor was she going to do anything to get a voting rights bill passed. That said, Harris hasn't mastered any

DEAR DR. ROACH: When my mother discovered she has a factor V mutation, everyone in the family decided to be tested as a precaution. This is a hereditary item, which I am sure you know. It was determined that I carry the gene. I am 65. I have had no issues, and it probably never would have been discovered if we did not go looking for it. This was discovered over 10 years ago and is listed on all my charts. I would like to donate plasma for extra money. I am not on any type of blood thinners except for a baby aspirin every morning. I take a statin for cholesterol control. Can I donate my plasma? – S.S.



Factor V is a blood clotting factor made in the liver. A common mutation in the gene, called factor V Leiden, confers a small increased risk to developing blood clots. People with factor V Leiden and who have never had a blood clot are generally not started on medication to prevent one; however, they may need more aggressive prophylactic treatment to prevent clot at a time of surgery, for example. Although some experts use aspirin in this situation, there is not good evidence to support it.

People with factor V Leiden may donate blood, platelets or plasma safely, as long as they are not on an anticoagulant such as warfarin.

Only a very few medicines prevent people from donating blood. In addition to anticoagulants, these include medicines that can cause serious birth defects (such as Accutane, used for acne; finasteride and dutasteride, used for prostate enlargement and baldness; and Aubagio, a treatment for multiple sclerosis) and those which might cause infection risk (human-derived growth hormone).

DEAR DR. ROACH: I am 87 and take 10 mg of melatonin every night to help me sleep. I have heard it is perfectly safe. Are there any side effects to melatonin? I know a lot of people who take it, including a child who takes 3 mg. – B.D.

Melatonin is a hormone secreted in the pineal gland of the brain that affects sleep and circadian rhythms. At nighttime, melatonin blood levels are 10 times higher than in the day. Melatonin is used extensively as a sleep aid, as you can confirm.

There is no substance you can put in your body that is perfectly safe at all doses. To paraphrase a wise man, anyone who tells you differently is selling something. However, the risk of major side effects with even high doses of melatonin is low. The major adverse events reported were headache, fragmented sleep and seizures. Rare adverse events reported included confusion, psychosis, autoimmune hepatitis and rash.

Incidentally, the term “side effect” means an unintended effect that occurs from a drug when taken correctly. “Adverse event” refers to any undesired reaction that comes with taking a medication. Adverse events are more common at high doses. With very high doses of melatonin can come additional types of reactions, including poor memory and reduced physical exercise performance.

Ten mg is far more melatonin than I recommend starting with. For older people, I recommend 0.5 mg to 1 mg about an hour before bed. Higher doses are generally not more effective and have higher risk.

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Most VA, DoD health records aren't accurate

It can be a big problem when you need medical care and the electronic health records sent from one provider to another contain inaccuracies. Unfortunately, a Department of Defense Inspector General audit showed this is happening in far too many active-duty and veterans records.

After sending surveys to 7,387 health care providers in late 2020 asking about their ability to access health care information for both DoD and Department of Veterans Affairs patients and whether that information was accurate, the DoD recently reported that:

- 91.2% of DoD patient records were inaccurate or incomplete.
- 67.5% of VA patient records were inaccurate or incomplete.
- 93.9% said that it impacted

patient care, including giving an inaccurate or incomplete diagnosis.

The inaccurate or missing information included problems and conditions, lab results, medications and much more.

Over at the VA, they've known for a long time that they needed to upgrade their 40-year-old computer system and proposed to merge with the DoD's system. That got started in 2018. They would begin with one facility as a test.

In 2020, the VA Office of the Inspector General was tasked with finding out one overriding answer: Is it all going well at the test site before they open the system at the 174 VA medical centers, as well as the 1,577 other sites?

The answer, in a word, no.

The ill-timed pandemic no doubt kept most workers at home, especially in the beginning. But they've made progress. Just recently, the VA brought online its third site with the new system to track and store patient data.

Thoughts: Keep track of your records... and whether they're accurate. Carry a 3x5 card in your wallet listing your drugs and dosages, conditions and surgeries. When you go to a medical appointment at a VA facility, ask for verification that their records are correct. The last thing you need in an emergency is for your medical records to be inaccurate.

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• Having a yard sale? Here's a great way to put out extra signs when you don't have a way to stake them into the ground: "Write your sign advertising your yard sale on the sides of a big box. Place it where you want it, and add a large rock to the inside, then tape shut. We did this when we had no poles to tape signs to or any other way to get them to stand up. It worked really well!" – D.R. in Georgia

• Avoid calling the pediatrician's office on Monday mornings for routine business. Wait until the afternoon. All the parents with mildly sick children over the weekend will be calling to consult with the doctor and nurses first thing when the office opens.

• If you drop an egg, sprinkle with salt before you attempt to clean it up. The salt binds the whites, which will not spread, making pickup easier!

• "My kids had kind of an obsession with colorful Duck tape in the past year, and we made some "beach bags" to keep our electronics safe at the pool, lake and beach. We carefully covered a variety of sizes of zipper-top self-sealing bags with the tape, creating tough, colorful pouches in which we can store cellphones, etc., to keep them safe from water damage." – W.L. in North Carolina

• The best time of day to water your lawn is the evening. The cooler temperatures allow the water to sink into the soil instead of evaporating with the heat of the day. Always follow your city or county guidelines on watering times for your area.


