Get your veggies

Oct. 1 was World Vegetarian Day and Nov. 1 being World Vegan Day, and with 15.5 million U.S. adults having a vegetarian or vegan diet, the personal-finance website WalletHub has released its report on 2022's *Best Cities for Vegans & Vegetarians*, as well as accompanying videos and expert commentary. To determine the best and cheapest places for following a plant-based diet, WalletHub compared the 100 largest cities across 17 key indicators of vegan- and vegetarian-friendliness. The data set ranges from the share of restaurants serving meatless options to the cost of groceries for vegetarians to salad shops per capita. El Paso was rated 14th in the report. Some stats:

- Plano, TX has the highest share of restaurants serving vegetarian options, 63.65 percent, which is 21.6 times higher than in Laredo, TX, the city with the lowest at 2.95 percent.
- Scottsdale, AZ has the highest share of restaurants serving vegan options, 16.26 percent, which is 19.6 times higher than in North Las Vegas, NV, the city with the lowest at 0.83 percent.
- San Francisco, CA has the most community-supported agriculture programs (per square root of population), 0.0182, which is 22.8 times more than in San Antonio, TX, the city with the fewest at 0.0008.
- Atlanta, GA has the most salad shops (per square root of population), 0.2296, which is 17.8 times more than in San Bernardino, CA, the city with the fewest at 0.0129.

Mexican American children experienced segregated education for generations

WEST TEXAS – In its duty to tell the full American story, the U.S. National Parks System is about to embark on an extraordinary journey to identify and preserve the stories that still dwell within the Blackwell School experience in Marfa, TX. The Blackwell National Historic Site will shed light on this often-overlooked issue in American history.

That bittersweet journey will commence as soon as President Joe Biden signs into law The Blackwell School National Historic Site Act, which was recently passed in the U.S. House of Representatives, clearing the final Congressional hurdle.

Once this landmark legislation is signed into law by the president, a half-acre school campus in that quaint West Texas town will become one of the first national park sites dedicated to interpreting modern Latino history.

“The message that Mexican American students received when they stepped through the doors of the Blackwell School was simple: you are second-class citizens,” stated Theresa Pierno, president and CEO for The National Parks Conservation Association (NPCA).

These beautiful, brown-faced children “were given hand-me-down furniture

and outdated textbooks. They were told to bury their native language and leave it behind. They were threatened with punishments if they disobeyed. The odds were stacked against them, but many Blackwell students persevered and even saw their school as a place of joy,” Pierno recounted.

“Today, Congress stood up for those same students and sent a different message: you matter, and your powerful stories will not be brushed aside or forgotten. Instead, America’s greatest storyteller, the National Park Service, (will) teach visitors from around the world about this little-known chapter of our country’s history,” Pierno asserted.

NPCA and the Blackwell School Alliance (BSA) have worked for years with West Texas communities and advocates across the country to honor the stories of Mexican American students who were segregated from their white peers and sent to “Mexican schools” across the American Southwest.

The Blackwell School National Historic Site in Marfa, Texas will now protect one of the last remaining “Mexican schools” standing in good condition, ensuring the experiences and history here is never forgotten.

The Blackwell School National Historic Site Act was first introduced in 2020 by former Texas Representatives Will Hurd and Filemón Vela amid

challenging conversations about racism across the country. And in an example of rare bipartisan agreement, the final bill was championed by Texas Republican Representative Tony Gonzales and Senator John Cornyn along with Democrat Senator Alex Padilla of California.

Pierno acknowledged that NPCA has urged the passage of this vital legislation at every turn. “We are grateful to our leaders across the aisle for championing the little schoolhouse that will soon become Blackwell School National Historic Site, one of the first national park sites to honor Latino history,” she stated.

Mario Rivera, Blackwell School alumnus and founding Blackwell School Alliance board member, said, “Having access to education was lifesaving for people in my hometown. Marfa was a poor, rural community. Some of us missed weeks of school to pick cotton or moved back and forth for our families to follow work,” he related. “Our teachers taught us, and sometimes disciplined us, too. We played sports, sang in the choir, and looked forward to our junior high graduation, just like they did at the other school across the railroad tracks,” he stated.

“With the Blackwell School National Historic Site, we can commemorate how far we have come, while also remembering some of the wrongs that happened here in

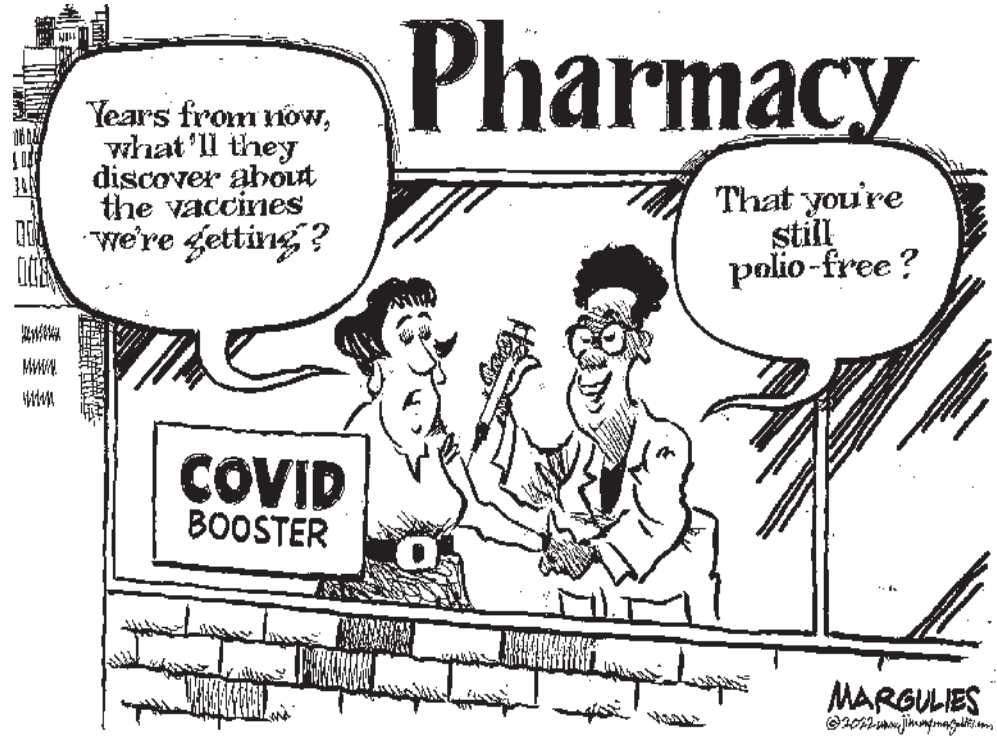
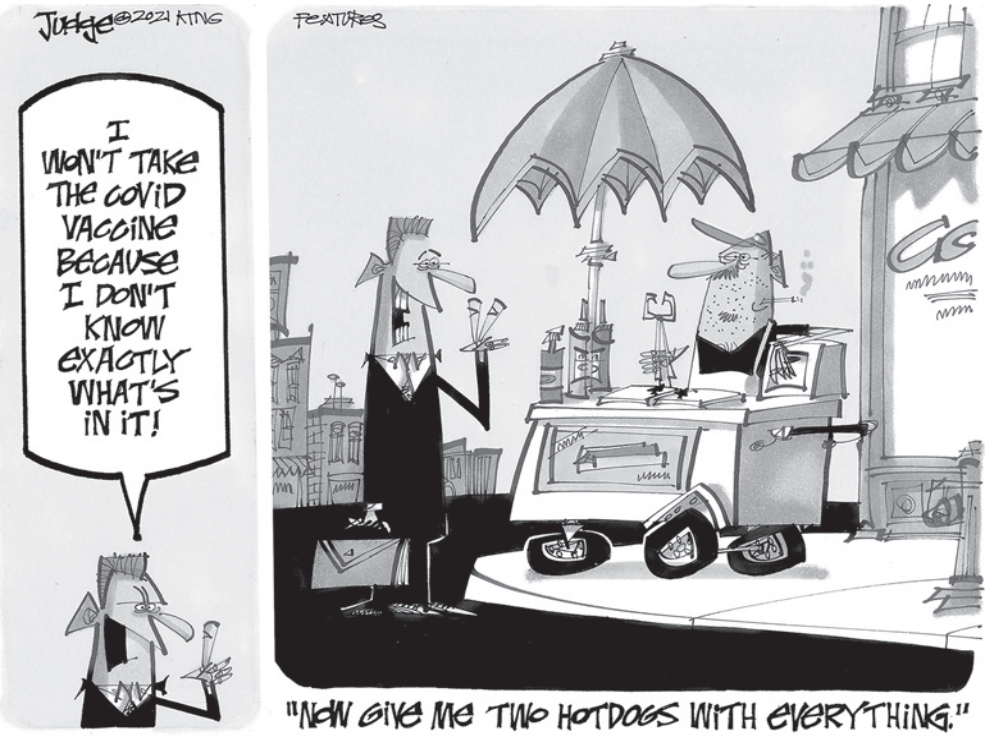
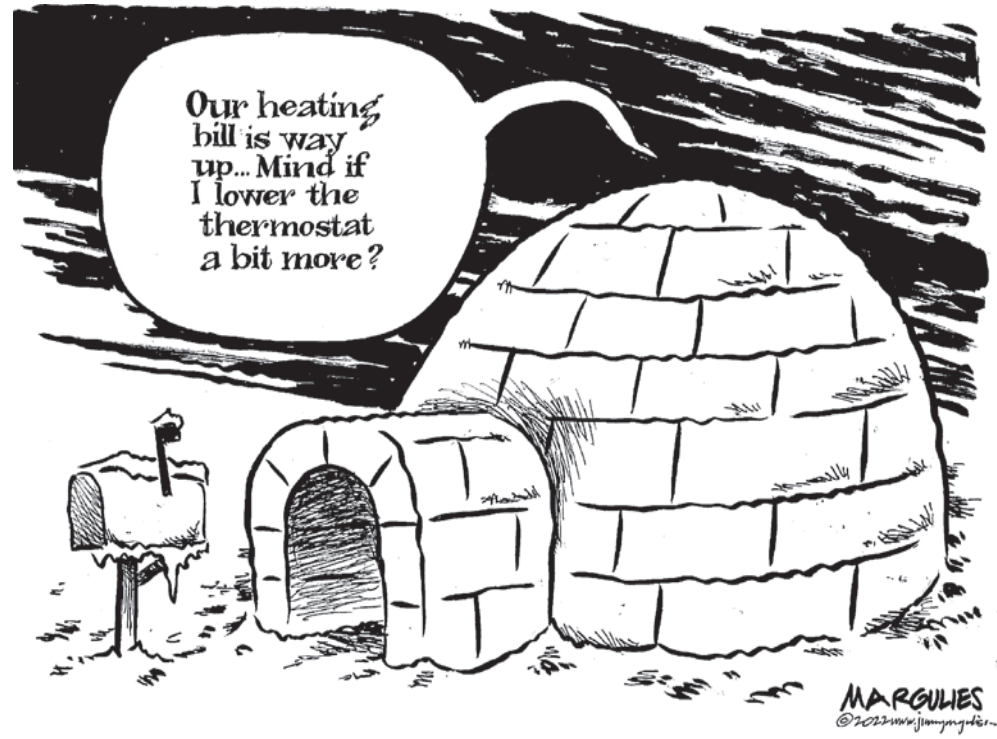

- On Oct. 17, 1986, President Ronald Reagan signs into law an act that approves \$100 million in humanitarian and military aid for Nicaraguan Contras with a goal of overthrowing the Sandinista government. Shortly afterward, however, the Iran-Contra scandal was revealed wherein the U.S. had sold missiles and arms in secret deals with Iran and \$30 million were diverted to the Contras.
- On Oct. 18, 1974, singer Al Green is attacked when an ex-girlfriend pours a pot of hot grits on his back while he was in the bathtub. Green was left with severe injuries but also a spiritual awakening. By 1976, Green had become an ordained Baptist minister and established a Memphis church.
- On Oct. 19, 1931, David Cornwell, known as spy novelist John le Carre, is born in Poole, England. He published his first spy novel, "Call for the Dead," in 1961. The novel, like his second, "A Murder of Quality" (1962), featured spy George Smiley.

Once again, UTEP to open season with a brand new team

It may be hard to believe but the UTEP basketball season is just three weeks away from tipping off. This will be coach Joe Golding’s second year at the helm and all Miners fans are hoping his team can keep the 20-win seasons going.

The coach defied all the odds by leading UTEP to a successful season in 2021 even after the Miners lost their best player, Bryson Williams, who transferred to Texas Tech.

Because the team won 20 games a year ago, it’s a no-brainer that they’ll do even better this time around, right?

Well... who knows?

It’s not that Joe Golding has forgotten how to coach all of a sudden; it’s that 13

of the 16 players on his roster have never played a single second for the Miners.

That’s right, only three players, Jamari Sibley, Ze’rik Onyema and Kevin Kalu are returning. And of the three, Sibley averaged the most minutes of playing time per game at 20, which is just half the game.

Sibley averaged 5.3 points per game while Onyema averaged 2.0 and Kalu 1.5.

So to say that Golding is going to need his new troops to come through is a colossal understatement.

But who are these new guys?

Like I said earlier, the Miners have nearly a whole roster of new players to bring together in 2022-23.

The 13 new guys are freshmen Jamal Sumlin, Antwonne Holmes and Milos Merrick; sophomores Derick Hamilton,

Carlos Lemus, Garrett Levesque and Otis Frazier III; juniors Jon Dos Anjos, Tae Hardy, Malik Zachery, Mario McKinney Jr., and Calvin Solomon; the lone senior on the team is Shamar Givance.

Like any gathering of new people, this team is going to have some growing pains. It’ll take a few games for them to get to know one another and trust what the other does well.

Of the 13, players who are expected to contribute right away are as follows:

Jon Dos Anjos is a Brazilian native who was a two-time first-team all-league performer for Florida SouthWestern College who advanced to the semifinals of the FCSAA State Tournament in both 2020-21 and 2021-22. The 6-8, 205-pound forward averaged 11.3 points and 5.6 rebounds per game,

including shooting 39.6 percent (38-96) from beyond-the-arc.

The Miners already know Tae Hardy, who transferred to UTEP from Conference USA rival Southern Mississippi. The 6-3 guard averaged 13.7 points in seven games a year ago before missing the rest of the season with an injury. The year before that, he averaged 11.0 points while starting 22 of 23 games.

Shamar Givance played four years at Evansville before transferring to UTEP this season. The 5-10 point guard was a 2021 All-MVC second-team honoree and also earned a spot on the 2021 Most Improved Team. He led Evansville in scoring (13.7), assists (3.9) and steals (1.5) last season.

Calvin Solomon, the 6-7 forward who transferred to Stephen F. Austin, averaged 9.3 points, 5.8 rebounds, 1.9 assists, 1.7 steals and 1.0 block while starting all 32 games played in 2021-22. He reached double figures in scoring in 16 games and blocked multiple shots in 10 games.

Of course there will be other players who will emerge as big time contributors for this team. But whether one guy scores well and another can pass and another pulls down a ton of rebounds, every single player on the team is going to have to play in-your-face defense.

Under Golding, if they aren’t willing to do that, they’re going to have to get used to sitting on the bench.

And just like when Don Haskins was coaching the team, if you play good defense, your team will always be in the game even if they’re having a tough shooting night.

It will take the fans a little time to get used to all the new faces. But seeing these guys develop should be fun and eventually, they’ll start to get it right.

This team will be thrown into the fire right away. They open the season at Texas, when the Longhorns play their first game in their new Moody Center arena.

How about that for an opening game?

Last year was great for Golding, but this is when his tenure at UTEP really begins.

Free college courses

In an attempt to keep brain cells active this winter, I have signed up for a college course. The good news is that it’s all online and it’s free. The other good news is that it’s sponsored by a major university.

It’s called Open Courseware, and I found my class on the internet. Yale, Harvard, MIT, Stanford and many others have “massive open online courses,” also known as MOOCs, and their main purpose is to provide learning opportunities. You

have to appreciate MIT especially. They make course material for their 2,600 classes “available on the web, free of charge, to any user anywhere in the world.”

Most of these open courseware classes are self-paced (do them when you want after downloading the lecture). Most don’t get you a certificate or a degree, but then most don’t cost anything either. Beware, of course, scammers who’d like to take your personal information and charge you for a class that’s actually free and doesn’t require you to sign up. Your best bet, until you’re familiar with open courseware, is to stick to the big-name universities.

Read the fine print on the website as you hunt for a class. Read the syllabus (description of the course) and the list of texts to be used. If you’re required to read books, see if they’re free to download online. (Some of the material downloads are huge.) Pay attention to the estimated time commitment for the course you want to take.

If you definitely want to attend in-person college but need financial help, see www.aseniorcitizenguideforcollege.com. Click on “Find Your State Tuition Waivers” and see if any in your state are covered. Some colleges will have a link to an application for a tuition waiver for seniors; some will just have a website and phone number to call for information.

Note: The Great Courses (www.thegreatcourses.com) are not open courseware and will cost money.

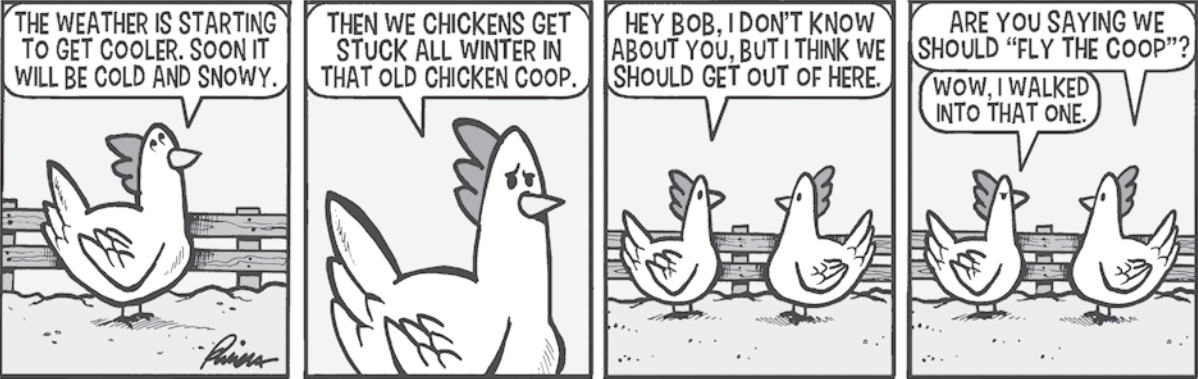

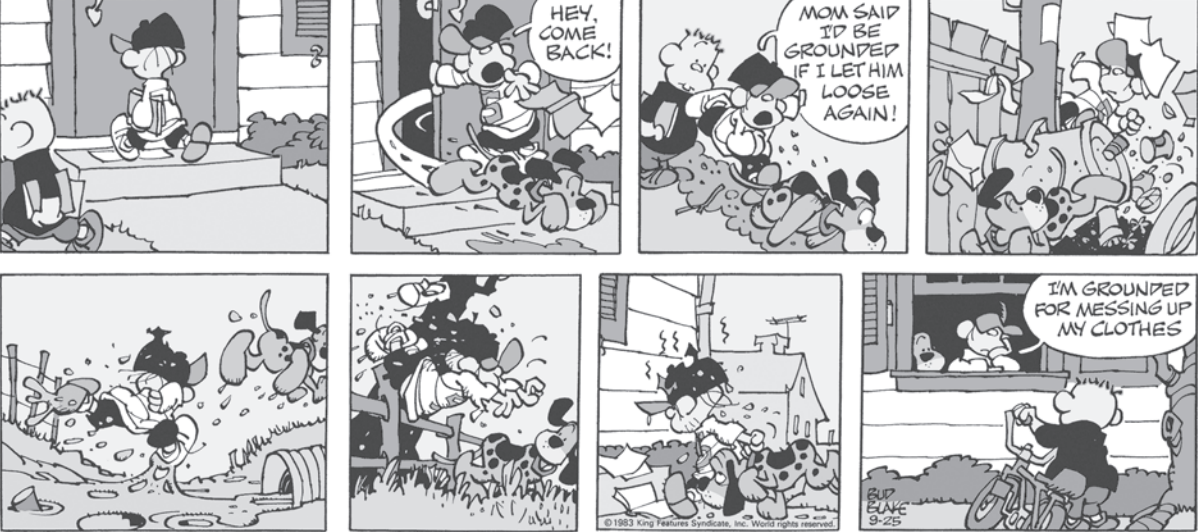

Herbal product may help soothe symptoms

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have had gastroparesis for many years. About two years ago, it led to small intestinal bacterial overgrowth (which I once read about in your column). I worked with a dietician for several months. One of the treatments she suggested was an herbal product called Iberogast. The combination of herbs helps the stomach to empty quicker. I use it each night before bed (as part of a 12-hour fast), or whenever I have overeaten and feel bad. It has been most helpful for me. Iberogast is available online. – L.E.



Iberogast is a combination of nine medicinal plant extracts. Studies in Germany and Austria, where it is most commonly used, have shown the medication to be more effective than the placebo (and about as effective as one common prescription medication) in the treatment of functional dyspepsia and irritable bowel disease. The medication has generally been regarded as safe, but there are rare cases of liver injury associated with this medication, with at least one of which eventually requiring a liver transplantation.

All medications – whether prescription or over-the-counter, natural or synthetic – have the potential for harm. Iberogast is pretty safe, with just a handful of bad outcomes in its 50 years of use, involving millions of doses, but it can still cause rare and severe adverse effects. Iberogast is worth considering in people whose symptoms have not been successfully treated with other therapies.

DEAR DR. ROACH: I've heard a lot about fat-removing procedures, such as CoolSculpting and red light therapy, and I'm wondering if they really work. What is your opinion on these products? – Anon.

The most important point here is that these are procedures designed to improve a person's appearance, and they do little or nothing to improve physical health. They do not cause people to lose significant weight, and removal of the superficial fat right below the skin does not improve diabetes or heart risk factors. The benefits are purely cosmetic.

CoolSculpting is the brand name of a system that freezes and damages fat cells. Red light therapy, also called "cool laser" or "low-level laser therapy," damages the fat cells without having to make incisions, such as for liposuction. There are other technologies used, such as focused ultrasound and electrical pulse devices, among others.

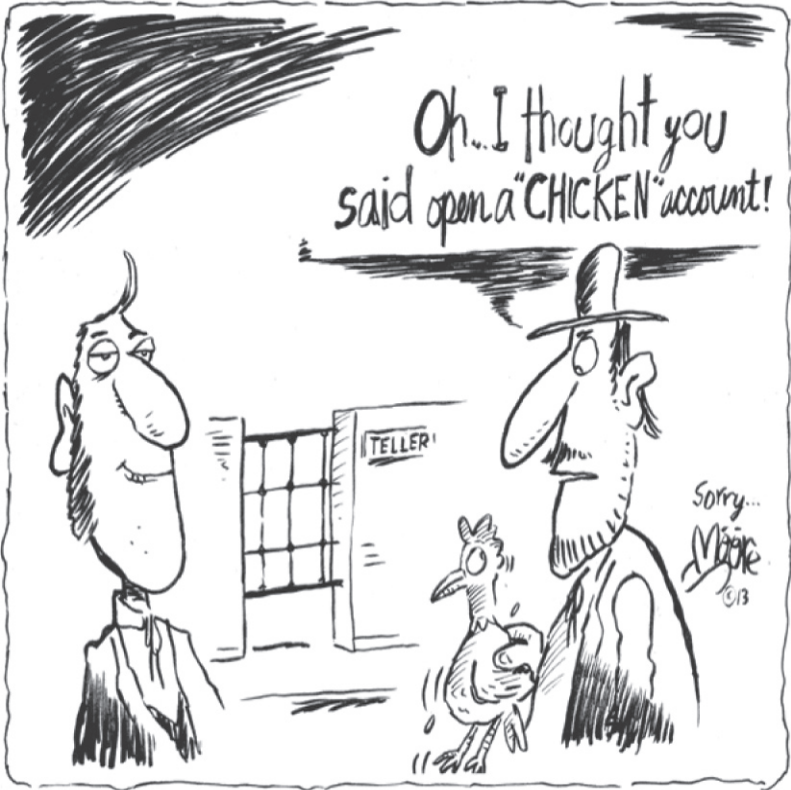
Trials on CoolSculpting showed that 86% of people saw improvement in cosmetically important areas. The laser treatment is not as well-studied. An early trial found that 70% of people treated with laser were satisfied, compared to 26% of those treated with a "sham" device that had no laser, just red lights. The device did show some slimming effects on the hips, thighs and waist.

Unfortunately, not everyone has a good response to these therapies. Several people, including a famous model, have sued the manufacturers due to an uncommon adverse effect of the procedure, called paradoxical adipose hyperplasia, where the fat cells, instead of dying, grow and become hard – and may not even be removable with surgery. Again, these noninvasive procedures really do work to improve appearance for most people, but do not improve overall health. And, they have the potential for significant cosmetic side effects, even if it is only rarely.

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Extension for debt hardship relief period

If you owe benefit debts to the Department of Veterans Affairs, your hardship relief period, previously set to expire on Sept. 30, has been extended to Dec. 31.

Those types of debts can include those for education, disability compensation and non-service pension, and you might have been approved for either a waiver, a compromise or an extended repayment plan, as well as the hardship suspension of debt.

These debts impact half a million veterans and sometimes

can be the result of a clerical error, the veteran not being able to understand the paperwork or a letter being lost in the mail. Worse is when the error occurred when the veteran didn't see the fine print and suddenly started receiving collection bills for debts he didn't know he owed.

By now you might have received a letter from the VA, if you have been making payments. Don't be afraid to open that letter. It's likely extension information for you. Consider using it to apply for a hardship extension that will carry you to the end of the year.

If you ever received an overpayment and were told you have to pay it back, give them a call at 800-827-0648. If the money you owe results from either a pharmacy co-payment or medical

care debt, instead call 866-400-1238 and talk to them.

Get to the bottom of the actual source of the debt. Did a clerk make a mistake? Did you fail to verify dependents or write in a wrong number? Do you have the canceled checks to show that you actually paid? Find out what's wrong.

The VA has taken a number of steps over the years to help veterans saddled with VA-related debt. They canceled co-pays from April 2020 to September 2021. They changed the income to qualify for relief. They took away the Financial Status Report for hardship eligibility. And, a big deal: They cut nearly all the reports to credit agencies for medical debt. That can have a big impact on your future credit score.
